





#### Thanksgiving: From 1621 feast to modern tradition

#### STAFF REPORT

Thanksgiving, celebrated each year on the fourth Thursday of November, traces its origins to a three-day harvest feast held by the Pilgrims in

Plymouth Colony in the fall of 1621.

That gathering, regarded by many as the nation's first Thanksgiving, laid the foundation for a holiday centered on gratitude and shared meals.

The celebration became a national holiday on Oct. 3, 1863, when President Abraham Lincoln pro-claimed the last Thursday of November as a national day of thanksgiving. Later, President Frank-lin Roosevelt moved the holiday to the fourth Thursday of the month to encourage earlier holiday shopping, noting that some Novembers have a fifth Thursday.

#### TOP TURKEY-PRODUCING STATES

While the Pilgrims' feast featured foods of the harvest, the modern Thanksgiving table often showcases turkey, a staple that has shaped entire regions of the United States. In 2024, the top six turkey-producing states were forecasted to account for 67% of national production. Minnesota leads with 33.5 million birds, followed by North Carolina at 27.5 million, Arkansas at 25 million, Indiana at 20 million, Missouri at 15.5 million and Virginia at 15 4 million

#### TURKEYTOWN, USA

Several U.S. towns carry the names of Thanks-Several U.S. towns carry the names of Thanks-giving favorites. Four places are named after the holiday's main dish: Turkey Creek, Louisiana (population 402); Turkey, Texas (325); Turkey, North Carolina (214); and Turkey Creek, Arlzona (457), according to the 2022 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates. Five communities are named Cranberry, including Cranberry Township in Butler County, Pennsylvania (34,516), and Cranberry Township in Venango County, Pennsylvania (6,242).

The nation's food infrastructure supports the holiday's large-scale celebrations. In 2022, there were approximately 63,000 supermarkets and grocery stores (excluding convenience stores), 2,800 baked goods shops and 3,900 fruit and vegetable markets across the United States.

retail licenses can sell for off-premises

consumption.

He said those adjustments represent the full extent of what the agency can manage under current authority. Addi-tional ideas he recommended for law-makers include curfews for minors in entertainment districts, restrictions on alcohol giveaways at large public events and allowing the state to suspend or ter-minate an entertainment district that fails to meet public safety standards.

Stewart wrote that the effort is aimed at improving safety statewide.
"My team and I have consulted with stakeholders, both in and out of state government, to identify sensible poten

tial regulatory changes that can improve oublic safety," He wrote.
In Baldwin County, entertainment dis-

tricts draw steady crowds during events and tourist seasons to places such as The Wharf in Orange Beach and downtown Foley, both centers of activity that are growing.

"There are many safeguards already in our entertainment ordinance that are for the safety of the public," Foley Main Street Executive Director Darrelyn Dun more told Gulf Coast Media, "The big one is the law is still the law. You have to abide by all city laws within the district." She said Foley officials spent months

shaping the rules.

"We pulled other ordinances in small cities that we have seen work well and then created our own," Dunmore said. "If the police department, fire department, city officials or ABC feel it is nec essary to add more rules to increase the safety of those visiting our downtown, we would certainly welcome them." Foley Mayor Ralph Hellmich said

"there has been zero" incidents down-town since the Foley Arts and Entertain-ment District opened in November 2024.

"I believe we already exceed the mini-mum safety standards," he said. Hellmich noted that festivals attract thousands and said that laws remain in effect. He also said Foley does not allow "free liquor" unless it is a restricted, ticketed event staffed by police and fire personnel.

Foley's six-page Entertainment Disroley's any age liner trainment of the trict Ordinance lays out boundaries, operating hours from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. daily and limitations on open containers. Only approved 16-ounce non-glass cups are allowed, and containers cannot be re-used. The ordinance also says the police chief may close the district at any time if safety concerns arise and may also limit

the number of permits issued.

The district covers blocks surrounding
Highway 59, West Rose Avenue, North and South Alston streets, Pine Street and West Laurel Avenue.

## Foley mailman arrested for mail theft

### 72 homes impacted in Gulf Shores, Fort Morgan area

#### STAFF REPORT

A 29-year-old postal work-er has been accused of steal-ing mail from around 72 residences in Gulf Shores

U.S. Postal Inspection Service inspectors contacted Gulf Shores Police Depart-

ment's Criminal Investiga-tions Division on Nov. 17 regarding stolen mail. Gulf Shores and Foley Police De-partment detectives worked with postal inspectors to locate the stolen mail and recovered mail from a postal service contractor's vehicle, according to a press release from the Gulf Shores agen-

Detectives from Foley and Gulf Shores executed a search warrant at a resi-dence in Foley, where offi-cials say additional stolen mail was found. Bryant Douglas Nugent was arrest-ed and charged with two counts of felony mail theft.

Under Alabama's new mail theft law, which took effect Oct. 1, mail theft is ei-

ther a misdemeanor or felony depending on the num-ber of addresses affected. Detectives identified approximately 72 residences impacted by the theft, mostly in the West Fort Morgan

area of Gulf Shores.
According to the Gulf Shores department, the U.S. Postal Service has notified those affected.

This case underscores the importance of interagency cooperation," Gulf Shores Police said in a state ment. "The professionalism and commitment of our federal and local partners were key to keeping Baldwin County residents safe from the impacts of these offens
