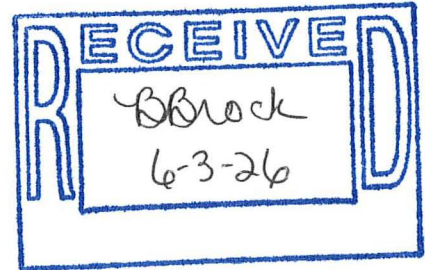

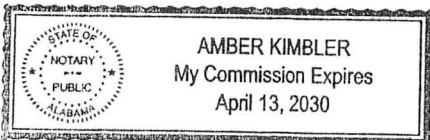

# Education

## Bayside Academy students earn top honors at AISA art competitions

### STAFF REPORT

Bayside Academy art students earned widespread recognition at both the Alabama Independent Schools Association District I Art Competition and the AISA State Visual Arts Competition, collecting dozens of awards across multiple categories and grade levels.

At the District I competition, Bayside students brought home 54 ribbons, including 17 first place finishes and a Best in Show honor, spanning painting, drawing, sculpture, photography, printmaking, collage and mixed media.

Frances Pilot earned Best in Show in 3D/Sculpture for the K-1 division and also captured a first place finish in that category.

In painting, winners included Violet Laymon, first place K-1; Allie James Prince, second place K-1; Robert Bruckmann, first place 2nd-3rd grade; and Grayson Landry, first place 4th-5th grade.

In waterbase work, David Walker earned first place K-1 and Zoe Clemons placed second. Juliette Hulick earned second place in 2nd-3rd grade. Crawford Miller placed third in 4th-5th grade and Ann Porter Kipp received honorable mention. In the 9th-12th grade division, Alice Ogburn earned first place.

Printmaking awards went to William Knight, first place K-1; Hammie Gibbles, first place 2nd-3rd grade; John William Hofferber, honorable mention 2nd-3rd grade; Zora Lumsden, second place 4th-5th grade; Sadie Pilot, third place 4th-5th grade; and Sam Kapeluck, third place 6th-8th grade.

In drawing non-color, McGriff Walters earned first place K-1 and Andrea Green placed second. Birch Whitaker earned first place 2nd-3rd grade and AJ Stubbs placed second. Mary Bo Nichols earned first place 4th-5th grade. Hart Wilson placed second in 6th-8th grade. In 9th-12th grade, Tbug Baker placed third and Penny Snell received honorable mention.

In drawing color, Grey Smith earned first place K-1 and Mamie Powell placed third. Drake Messenger earned first place 2nd-3rd grade. Bessie Achee received honorable mention 4th-5th grade. Kara Jordan placed third in 6th-8th grade. In 9th-12th grade, Addie Babcock earned second place and Marley Ullock received honorable mention.

In 3D/Sculpture, Frances Pilot earned first place K-1 and Best in Show, while Henry Stewart placed third. Mary Owens Grider earned first place 2nd-3rd grade and Ann Copeland Shead placed second. Joshua Deupree placed third 4th-5th grade and Merri Grace Bass received honorable mention. Eva Solomon placed third in 6th-8th grade and Phoenix Vivier received honorable mention.

In photography, Mamie Powell earned first place K-1 and Evelyn Parris placed third. Victor Lucas placed third in 2nd-3rd grade. Anne Westbrook earned second place 4th-5th grade. In 9th-12th grade, Tbug Baker placed second and Lizzie Noble received honorable mention.

In collage, Crosby Mitchell earned first place K-1 and Molly Laymon placed second. Walker Watkins placed third in 2nd-3rd grade and Conner Barton placed third in 4th-5th grade.

In mixed media, Embray Cotten earned first place K-1. Leighton Smith earned first place 2nd-3rd grade and Salome Grandmaire placed third. Eleanor Newman earned second place 4th-5th grade and Addison Williams placed second in 6th-8th grade.

At the AISA State Visual Arts Competition held at Eastwood Christian School in Montgomery, Bayside Academy students earned five first place awards.

Tbug Baker earned first place in photography for the 9th-12th grade division. Alice Ogburn earned first place in water base for the 9th-12th grade division. Violet Laymon earned first place in painting for K-1. Mamie Powell earned first place in photography for K-1. McGriff Walters earned first place in drawing non-color for K-1.

## Baldwin Preparatory Academy celebrates 1st graduating class, workforce success

Baldwin Preparatory Academy marked a major milestone May 18 as the school celebrated its first graduating class, honoring 190 seniors who leave campus with college credits, industry certifications and hands-on career experience already in place.

School leaders said in a news release the inaugural class reflects Baldwin Prep's mission of blending academics with workforce preparation, giving students a direct pathway into high-demand careers and higher education opportunities.

Among the graduating seniors, 67% plan to enter the workforce while 19% intend to attend a two-year or four-year college. Students in the class collectively earned 75 scholarships totaling \$733,000, secured 12 apprenticeship opportunities and completed 106 industry credentials and certifications across the school's 12 career pathways.

Students earned credentials in fields including health care, mechatronics, aviation, education, graphic design and advertising, HVAC, cybersecurity and construction. Many also received honors in regional, state and national competitions during the school year.

Principal Adam Sealy said the accomplishments demonstrate the vision behind the school's creation.

"This first graduating class represents exactly why Baldwin Prep was created," Sealy said in the release. "Our students are leaving here with more than a diploma. They have college credit, industry certifications, real-world experience, and a clear direction for their future. We are incredibly proud of what they've accomplished and excited to see the impact they will make in our community and beyond."

The academy was founded to provide students with academic rigor, workforce exposure and career-connected learning opportunities. Throughout the year, students participated in job site visits, industry tours and weekly conversations with local professionals who mentored students and shared career insights.

Sophia Hall, a graduate in the school's health care pathway, earned certification as a medical assistant after passing the Healthcare Medical Assistant exam.

"My favorite thing about Baldwin Prep is

probably the innumerable opportunities I've been given throughout my time here. I've had plenty of opportunities for dual enrollment, as well as in the healthcare pathway. I am now a certified MA, so I can do things like take vital signs, I can work in a managerial position as far as coding goes. I can take patient intake, and I can perform lab tests. After graduation, I'm heading to UAB in pursuit of a neuroscience degree and then on a pre-med track."

Cybersecurity student Ben Earl also credited the school's career-focused approach for helping shape his future plans. Earl participated in a Hatchathon competition and is developing an app for Ammons & Blackmon Construction.

"Baldwin Prep prepares you for the workforce and allows you to develop real connections and pursue internships in your field. It helps you develop a future outside of high school, with opportunities to work, and to learn, and to just further your education. After graduation, I want to further my knowledge and work for companies, and hopefully start my own business at some point," Earl said.

Lee Lawson, president and CEO of Baldwin Alliance, said the academy is helping address workforce needs in Baldwin County.

"Baldwin Prep is one of the most exciting education innovations we've seen a part of in our region," Lawson said. "It's producing students who are both academically prepared and workforce ready, and that's a huge win for Baldwin County."

The school has also expanded dual enrollment opportunities through Coastal Alabama Community College during the 2025-2026 school year. In its second year, Baldwin Prep reported 563 students enrolled in dual enrollment courses, 6,929 dual enrollment credit hours earned and more than \$1.1 million in tuition value provided to students and families.

As the academy closes its first graduation chapter, school leaders said they plan to continue expanding programs, strengthening partnerships with industry leaders and creating more opportunities that connect students directly to careers.

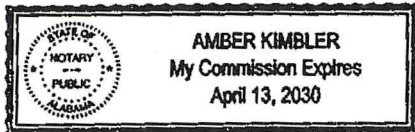

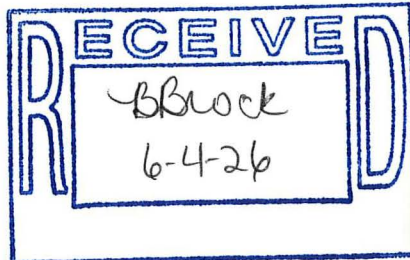
