 - Mrs. Sislak stated that the first project, a path along Corte Road from CR 13 to SR 181, had been submitted by CAC member Mr. Richard Jaehne. Corte Road project: Mr. Richard Jaehne discussed the need for the Corte Road sidewalk and bike path and how it would connect the East side of Daphne to the West side of Daphne. There was a concern stated regarding the walkway not connecting to anything and that it was a walkway to nowhere. The answer to the concern was that the biking corridor should be created for the connection and this project would do that.
 - DISC project: The second project is a multi-modal path in the Daphne Innovation Science Complex area. The walk path would weave through the campus, connect to the High School and would also connect to the walk path created by the FY 2017 Daphne TAP grant.
 - Signal Warrant at 34/98 project: The signal would be adaptive and fit into our system that is being installed. There was a question concerning if the light would be triggered by cameras or ground sensors. The ground sensors do not pick up bicyclists.

- 5. Action Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) Members (Policy Board)
 There has been interest from members of the public to represent Baldwin County,
 Fairhope, and Spanish Fort on the BPAC. Mr. Dewane Hayes, Mr. David Wells, and Mr.
 Kirk Clayton have expressed interest. If these three are appointed, the BPAC will still
 need two members from Baldwin County and two members from Loxley to. There is an
 age requirement of 21 years old.
- **6. Action** Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) members (**Policy Board**) There has been one application submitted for the CAC.

7. Informational – Public Participation Plan

Mrs. Sislak presented the draft Public Participation Plan. The plan is open for public comment. Meeting dates for public forums have been set in Fairhope and in Loxley. There will be a 45 day window for public comment from February 7th to March 26th. The Plan will be available at several locations throughout the MPA, is available on the website and paper copies are available on the table.

8. Informational - Mobile River Bridge Project Update:

Mrs. Sislak has not heard from ALDOT, as expected for a more thorough update. However, it is expected that the project will be a public/ private partnership and it appears that there could be a toll. The project should take off in the next year. The bike path is to be on the Cochran Bridge, with a possible viewing platform (Belvedere). ALDOT has reached out and asked when the next BPAC meetings were scheduled. It was noted that the Mobile Area MPO did not want the bike path to go through the old tunnel. There were many concerns raised concerning the bike path going over the Cochran Bridge from BPAC members. The roads on the other side of the Cochran Bridge are in major disrepair. The road leading to the Cochran Bridge is bad. The height of the new bridge was discussed as to the wind load on top of the bridge. A loud, official letter was discussed to be sent to ALDOT with these concerns. The question was raised as to why ALDOT has made these decisions. Mrs. Sislak offered to draft a letter on behalf of BPAC, if desired. It was asked again, why the decision was made and what forces were behind the decision regarding the bike and pedestrian walk over Cochran. Mrs. Sislak said she would follow up with BPAC desires.

9. Informational – MPO Coordinator's Report

- Adaptive Signal Mrs. Sislak stated that construction was near completion and the system would begin the learning phase. The Adaptive signalization Project should be running by summer.
- Turning lanes on CR 13 The Sehoy and Longue Vue Drive turn lanes are complete.
 However, there is a sidewalk addition needed. The project has come in under budget

- and an administration modification was made so that the sidewalk addition can be completed for sidewalk connection.
- Public Transit Projects Mrs. Sislak informed the group that the Fairhope project is coming along and should be completed before the end of year. The environmental document has been approved.
- SR 181 Widening Federal funding will most not likely be authorized until another month. The project has been pushed back another month.
- US 31 Project has been let. Clearing has started. Utilities are still being relocated.
 The project is a 360 working day contract.
- SR 181 and I-10 Diverging Diamond Interchange (DDI) BPAC wanted to explore the possibility of a safe crossing in design with this interchange. The question was asked of ALDOT at the October meeting. ALDOT has since explained that the bridge deck will not be large enough for a Bike / pedestrian crossing. DDI's have bike/ pedestrian crossings in the center. ALDOT did say that there could be a plan for a separate crossing, if funded by the MPO. It was noted by the board that there are few crossings across I-10. Support for a crossing should be added to the visionary and Mrs. Sislak confirmed that it would be added under visionary list on the next MPO agenda.
- o Mrs. Sislak shared that there is 1,647,000 federal dollars available in the bank account.
- O Planning and Development Update Mrs. Fidler gave an update on all subdivisions or housing complexes greater than 17 lots that have been approved in the MPO Urbanized area during 2017. An update for the fall quarter of 2017 was given and an overview of what will be presented in 2018.
- o FY 2018 Goals The ESMPO's goals for 2018: Adopt Title VI, Public Participation, Freight, and Public Transit plans. Update the Highway Functional Classification Map
- o TAP Grant letters of support Daphne and Fairhope had TAP Grant applications that the ESMPO sent letters of support and they are included in the packet.
- O Highway Safety Program There are three intersections which have met safety thresholds according to ALDOT. The intersections include: US 104 and Veterans in Fairhope; Rigsby and CR 64; and CR 44 and CR 13. Roundabouts are being considered at all locations.
- Shoulder Sweeping Mrs. Sislak informed the group that the maintenance engineer with ALDOT said sweeping is available upon request. The committee talked about possibly asking for cycling routes including 98 to 32, be swept on a two to three-month schedule.
- Signs Jeff Hudson to send out sign locations for the committee to check and verify need for additional signage in the MPA.

OLD BUSINESS

1. Discussion – Preemptive Technology (All)

Mrs. Sislak explained a new preemptive technology feature that could be added to the Adaptive Signal System that would allow emergency response vehicles to move through intersections. The technology uses GPS and Bluetooth technology to clear out intersections well ahead of emergency vehicles arriving at the intersection. She displayed the proposed cost share spreadsheet and went over the proposed cost for each city. Cost per vehicle for this technology to communicate with the signal would be around \$2,800 per vehicle and a \$440 annual fee, and would be the responsibility of the municipality. It was noted that any private vehicles such as

Medstar would need to purchase the in-vehicle technology themselves to be able to communicate with the signals. The MPO would just be equipping the intersections. Mrs. Sislak pointed out that according to the spreadsheet, the initial cost would include the first five years of the service and the communities would start paying after the initial five years. Staff has sent information to municipalities to help determine the usefulness of the technology. MPO staff is waiting on this feedback to be used by the Policy Board in making a decision on moving forward with this purchase.

MOTION: By Mr. Donald Ouellette to fund the preemptive feature for the signals, if the municipalities choose to support the preemptive feature. The motion was seconded by Mr. Richard Jaehne.

- Discussion: ADECA may have funds to help financially for this type of hardware. There
 was a request to have a follow up on the feedback from the city, county, volunteer and
 private organizations that are interested or not interested in the feature.

- 2. Action State Requested Amendments to the Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP) (All) Mrs. Sislak explained that the State had requested projects to be included in the TIP. She reminded the committee that no MPO dollars are involved in the following projects:
- 100068205 (HSIP) 0181: SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS, INCLUDING INSTALLATION OF A COMPACT ROUNDABOUT ON SR-181 AT GEORGE BISHOP LANE. Engineers Estimate: \$90,000. Target Start Date: 5/1/2018; New Target Start Date: 8/1/2018
- 100067642 (UT): I-10/SR-181 INTERCHANGE MODIFICATION TO DIVERGING DIAMOND. Old Engineers Estimate: \$60,000.00; New Engineers Estimate: \$592,000.00

- O Discussion: It was asked why the safety improvements at George Bishop roundabout are necessary. Concerns were shared that the traffic volume in that area would not warrant such improvements. There was discussion and lack of support of the George Bishop roundabout. It was stated that the motion should be passed without the installation of a compact roundabout on SR-181 at George Bishop lane. It was also mentioned that if ALDOT is going to spend that much on the Diverging Diamond, why are they not including the pedestrian crossing at the Diverging Diamond?

3. Action – Adoption of ALDOT System Performance Measure Targets (All)

Mrs. Sislak explained that Performance Measures and Targets was one of the aspecta of the performance based planning as required by the MAP-21 and FAST Act transportation bills. Mrs. Sislak reviewed the performance measures and targets and stated that MPO staff suggests the MPO support the states targets.

MOTION: By Mr. Greg Walker to adopt ALDOT's system performance Measure targets as proposed. The motion was seconded by Rick Davis.

- O Discussion: It was asked if there are there are any additional measures that need to be added. Should other metrics be considered for our specific area? Is there another metric we need that may not be supported by these measures? For Example, Traffic loads during tourism times or Hurricane evacuation routes.

4. Action – FY 19 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) (All)

Mrs. Sislak explained that the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) is the MPO annual administrative budget. The budget for FY 2019 is \$224,000. This is an increase of \$9,000 from FY 2018. She explained that the document was published for public comment from June 1st to July 2nd and there were no comments received from the public. Being that there were no comments received, the document will be adopted as Final.

MOTION: By Mr. Donald Ouellette to adopt the FY 2019 UPWP. The motion was seconded by Mr. Richard Ullo.

- Discussion: Is there anything else that should be included in the UPWP that staff needs? It
 was asked if staff is receiving everything they need, and if this budget works for them.
- o Mrs. Sislak stated that staff is happy with UPWP, and mentioned there had been a line item added for Market Graphic in case we need more planning and development work completed. A question was asked if we use any modeling services that Land-Grant Universities or the

Extension System offer. Perhaps we can work cooperatively in any way and perhaps help us study issues that we may have within our area.

5. Action – FY 19 Cost Allocation Plan (CAP) (All)

Mrs. Sislak explained the Cost Allocation Plan (CAP) is a document used in billing ALDOT for reimbursement for MPO staff and administrative costs. It works with the UPWP. The CAP produces fringe benefit ratio and indirect cost ratio used to bill ALDOT. She stated that the CAP was still under review by the Baldwin County Highway Accounting Department and ALDOT, therefore it is not available to review quite yet. She stated that no action is needed considering the document is not available for review yet.

MOTION: No motion was made.

6. Action – FY 19 Continuity of Operations Plan (COOP) (All)

Mrs. Sislak explained that the COOP is an emergency operations plan for the ESMPO and outlines what steps MPO staff will take in the event of an emergency.

MOTION: By Mr. Richard Jaehne to adopt the COOP. The motion was seconded by Mr. Greg Walker.

- O Discussion: It was stated that the document is very thorough and all procedures are listed. Should the EMA be communicated with by the ESMPO to see how the roadways are used, traversed? This may be helpful during emergencies and evacuation events. It was asked if Mrs. Sislak review emergency procedures and see if the MPO could be a source of helpful input for the EMA.

- 7. Action Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) Appointment (Policy Board) Mrs. Sislak stated that Ms. Gail Yongue had submitted an application to represent Baldwin County on the BPAC. There is one more position open on BPAC, representing Loxley. All other member positions have been filled.

8. Informational – MPO Coordinator's Report

- Amendment to Performance Measures Agreement Mrs. Sislak stated that minor changes had been made to the Performance Measures Agreement after the April MPO Meetings. The changes were minor, and no further action is needed.
- o Project Update

- Adaptive Signal Installation is 98% complete. It is monitoring traffic, you should see a difference.
 Discussion: Will there be data that can be collected? Yes, and this data should be used to help us with modeling.
- o The quote for the new signal addition on US 98 at CR 34 came in much higher than expected. ALDOT has asked for a breakdown of cost and are reviewing the cost now.
- o Turning Lanes on CR 13 Sidewalk Addition is basically complete, with final punch list being completed.
- o Turning Lanes on Gayfer @ US 98 cost estimate is forthcoming from ALDOT. The MPO policy board requested that these turning lanes be put on the Visionary List at the last MPO meeting.
- Public Transit Projects Fairhope: The pre-award authority request for the grant should be completed today..In Spanish Fort, we are working with Cypress Equities again negotiating purchase of property at the Bass Pro Shopping Center. We are reaching out ALDOT and FTA to assure that the appraisal and NEPA are still good.
 - Discussion: It was asked if there are other areas that could be better such as the open spaces
 near JCPenny, Kohls, or Riviera area below the apartments for this stop. It was stated that for a
 Park and Ride, the selected location is strategic and conducive for bus flow.

In Daphne, the Mayor has requested guidance on moving forward with a park and ride location behind Home Depot at Jubilee Square Shopping Center.

- Discussion: It was stated that this location is extremely concerning. The group stated that there are concerns about the safety of the area.
- o SR 181 Widening The project has been let, utilities are currently being moved. This project will last approximately two-years. This project will be start at CR 64 end taper down at Mosely Road. Discussion: Austin and Corte road will also be working on simultaneously. It was also asked to please let ALDOT know to put up additional signage for drivers to know the construction is coming.
- o US 31 Widening The utility relocation is still underway. Pipe should be laid soon.
- SR 181 and I-10, Diverging Diamond This project will be let in August, with construction anticipated to begin in November.
- o Planning and Development Update (J. Fidler) Mrs. Fidler gave an update on preliminary, and final plat development along with building permits in the Metropolitan Planning Area. A more detailed accounting will be presented at the Policy Board.
 - Discussion: is there a way to get the potential buildout for each area? How do we make sure our roads are sufficient for the potential development? How do we make sure we have the school room for all the children moving to the area? In New Mexico, there was a plan for all roads and where they would go. - 1. Action Adding Projects to the Visionary List of the Long Range Transportation Plan
 - o Discussion:
 - Spanish Fort Causeway Master Plan: Mrs. Sislak discussed the trail project segments and the origination point of the trail connection with the Eastern Shore Trail. The segments include a connection to the Eastern Shore Trail at the SR 90 and SR 31 intersection. It includes improved turn lanes into the state facilities, improved lighting and medians, switchbacks with a multi-modal trail, and multi-use trail spans over the rivers. The central segment also includes fishing piers, launches, multi-modal span, and park. The last segment of the Spanish Fort Causeway Master Plan calls for a path from the Central Segment of the Causeway plan (which ends at the I-10 bridge interchange with the Causeway) to the Battleship. This segment

also includes a pedestrian crossing over the Tensaw River. There are plans to replace the West bound segment of the Tensaw River Bridge. It is a possibility that the existing westbound span over the Tensaw River can be left for a future pedestrian and bicycle crossing.

In Fill Sidewalks: Mrs. Sislak discussed a project submittal from the City of Spanish Fort. The project would consist of connecting discontinuous sections of sidewalks within the existing sidewalk network. The project includes walks from SR 225 from School Road to SR 31, west side of Jimmy Faulkner Boulevard from Sibley Creek Bridge to Spanish Fort Middle, and the west side of SR 90/98 and from the terminus of existing sidewalk for 450 feet.

- Project Update
- o Adaptive Signal should be wrapping up in the next several weeks. Some people believe that it could already be working.
- Turning Lanes on CR 13 Turing lanes are completed. Sidewalk Addition should be starting in the next few weeks.
- Public Transit Projects Fairhope- is waiting on FTA authorization so they can put out the project for bid; Spanish Fort – is looking again at the Cypress location again and appraisals are being discussed; Daphne – the discussions are underway to start a Transit project.
- SR 181 Widening an increase to the utility relocation has increased \$900,000. The target let date is May 25th, with an accelerated Notice to Proceed. The project is planned to start within 30 days of the Notice to Proceed
- o US 31- Construction has started. Clearing, grubbing and utility relocation is still ongoing with drainage installation being implemented now.

- o SR 181 and I-10, Diverging Diamond Has been delayed, but will let July 27th, 2018.
- FY17 TAP Grant Project Let Dates have been extended for the sidewalks on Highway 13 in Fairhope, the walks County Road 1 near Mullet Point, and the walks on Pollard in Daphne to December 15, 2018.
- HSIP Highway Safety Funded Projects Fairhope Roundabout is undergoing and has just about finished the numbers for the project.
 - 2019 ATPA Conference The Eastern Shore MPO will be hosting this conference at the New Gulf State Park conference center in April of 2019. Member comments: There was interest from board members on wanting to attend and suggested that Rick Hall would be a good speaker on new urbanism.
 - Preemptive Technology Temple Construction gave a presentation to the policy board work session. Preemptive technology can let emergency vehicles get through the adaptive traffic signaled intersections, allowing them to drive to a crisis as soon as possible. The signals will connect through cellular network through the sirens, providing a method to keep traffic moving when emergency vehicles need to get through an area. This technology can also be used to transmit messages through a cellular application called 'Travel Safety'. Member comments: It was noted that Walton County has this system and it works very well.
 - Planning and Development Update Mrs. Fidler gave the planning and development update for the Eastern Shore's MPO planning area, which includes Silverhill and Robertsdale. Preliminary, Final plats and a good portion of the Building permit numbers (missing a small portion of the county permits) were given for all member communities in the MPA for the first quarter of 2018. Final Building Permit numbers will be presented next week to the Policy Board. A handout was provided to the members and press. Member comments: It was noted that this information should be shared with Bill Harbour, with the school board. It was noted that some real estate companies have numbers that show new home sales, what price range sold at, and existing homes sold. It was noted that the increase on sanitation numbers for each municipality really show an accurate residential housing number. It was noted that Fairhope is adding one sanitation customer every day, including Saturday and Sunday. It was noted that this number falls in line with the number of building permits they had for the first quarter, which was 97.
 - Transit Plan Update/Survey A Transit plan will be developed and ready for your review in August of 2018. A survey is being developed with the goal of sending out in the next few weeks. There will be two months of survey collection with the results being published in the Transit Plan. Members were asked to review the survey and let the MPO staff know of any request for changes. Member comments: The Chamber offered assistance in getting out the survey link on their website. Another suggestion was to put the link with member government utility billing statements.

- Members of the Public: There were no other members of the public present.
- Members of the Press: Mr. James Watkins, Fairhope Times: A question was asked by Mr. Watkins concerning the possibility of a new traffic light at the South Drive and SR 98 intersection. Mr. Richard Johnson explained that the Eastern Shore Academy School is expanding their campus at this location. When the facility physically increases the student number, it will trigger a need for a signalization at the intersection. It was noted that the MPO would then be a part of the process, but the project would not be using MPO money. A question was asked: if SR 98 is now adaptive is that a reason to add more lights. The response was that it would not be a reason, it would be triggered by federal guidelines and warrant process.

• Board/Committee Members:

A concern was raised on if a pedestrian span was to be built at the diverging diamond interchange. It was noted that there is a large workforce that live across from work areas in the Eastern Shore Shopping Center in a walkable radius. It was noted that there should be modifications to the SR 90 and SR 181 Interchange with pedestrian crossing signalization. It was noted that if not a span across I-10, then at least for the surrounding shops on the South side of I-10 is needed in this project. It was noted that the federal policy on all new infrastructure should include all modes of transportation, including biking and walking. It was noted that the municipalities must assure all modes of transportation are accounted for when they build new infrastructure and this state project is not calling for pedestrian infrastructure. It was noted that this is one way to remove the number of cars off the roadway and it should be something the MPO is striving for – encouraging a walk/ bike to work/shop. It was strongly suggested by most board members that this was a definite need in the area. Mrs. Sislak explained that ALDOT had been approached, ALDOT had priced the pedestrian span and that the policy board felt like the cost benefit would not justify the infrastructure. Mrs. Sislak referred to the minutes of the January Policy Board meetings. The board noted that if the project design is finished and does not call for installation now, that it should be planned. Mrs. Sislak stated that she would follow up again with the policy board on including this on the visionary list.

• Ms. Adrienne Jones stated that a 909-lot subdivision is on the planning commission next week with the last three phases coming in. The property is planned to be annexed

- into the City of Daphne. Ms. Jones announced that this meeting could be her last meeting because of position changes at the City of Daphne.
- It was noted by several members that connecting roads may be uncomfortable or controversial with the public but it helps with transportation issues within subdivisions and developing areas.
- Ms. Casey Gay Williams from the Chamber of Commerce extended an offer of assistance to members and the community in communicating information, gather or distribute communication and hold communicative sessions that may benefit the Eastern Shore. The Eastern Shore Spotlight is an electronic newsletter that is put out each Friday and would like to highlight and provide a link for information such as the DDI brochure or the MPO brochure.
- A question was asked on why the Policy Board has a work session before the advisory boards have their meetings. It was stated that the advisory boards would prefer to meet and then the work sessions would be held so that issues the advisory boards are concerned with can be discussed at the work session. Mrs. Sislak noted that it had been held in different ways over the years and this is the process that the board settled upon. The concern was that the policy board debates, deliberates and considers action before getting the advisory committee input with the current manner meeting setup. Mrs. Sislak offered typing up a list of suggestions from the advisory boards for the Policy Board members consideration.

OLD BUSINESS

1. Discussion – Preemptive Technology (All)

Mrs. Sislak explained a new preemptive technology feature that could be added to the Adaptive Signal System that would allow emergency response vehicles to move through intersections. The technology uses GPS and Bluetooth technology to clear out intersections well ahead of emergency vehicles arriving at the intersection. She displayed the proposed cost share spreadsheet and went over the proposed cost for each city. Cost per vehicle for this technology to communicate with the signal would be around \$2,800 per vehicle and a \$440 annual fee, and would be the responsibility of the municipality. It was noted that any private vehicles such as Medstar would need to purchase the in-vehicle technology themselves to be able to communicate with the signals. The MPO would just be equipping the intersections.

Mrs. Sislak pointed out that according to the spreadsheet, the initial cost would include the first five years of the service and the communities would start paying after the initial five years. Staff has sent information to municipalities to help determine the usefulness of the technology. MPO staff is waiting on this feedback to be used by the Policy Board in deciding on moving forward with this purchase.

O Discussion: It was asked if there is potential for misuse of this technology feature by private agencies. It was asked if buses could obtain the technology to improve efficiency. Has ALDOT been asked if they want this technology? Is it effective in other areas? How well does it work, since its already like a parking lot on I-10. Who would be responsible for maintenance of the technology? Has there been any polling of emergency agencies to see if it would be beneficial? It was noted that the cost could be more expensive if we purchased it down the road and not now.

2. Informational – MPO Coordinator's Report

- Amendment to Performance Measures Agreement Mrs. Sislak stated that minor changes had been made to the Performance Measures Agreement after the April MPO Meetings. The changes were minor, and no further action is needed.
- o Project Update
 - Adaptive Signal Installation is 98% complete. It is monitoring traffic, you should see a
 difference. Discussion: Will there be data that can be collected? Yes, and this data should
 be used to help us with modeling.
 - The quote for the new signal addition on US 98 at CR 34 came in much higher than expected. ALDOT has asked for a breakdown of cost and are reviewing the cost now.
 - Turning Lanes on CR 13 Sidewalk Addition is basically complete, with final punch list being completed.
 - Turning Lanes on Gayfer @ US 98 cost estimate is forthcoming from ALDOT. The MPO
 policy board requested that these turning lanes be put on the Visionary List at the last MPO
 meeting.
 - Public Transit Projects Fairhope: The pre-award authority request for the grant should be completed today. In Spanish Fort, we are working with Cypress Equities again negotiating purchase of property at the Bass Pro Shopping Center. We are reaching out to ALDOT and FTA to assure that the appraisal and NEPA are still good. In Daphne, the Mayor has requested guidance on moving forward with a park and ride location behind Home Depot at Jubilee Square Shopping Center.
 - SR 181 Widening The project has been let, utilities are currently being moved. This project will last approximately two years. This project will start at the CR 64 end and taper down at Mosely Road. Discussion: Austin and Corte Road will also be working on simultaneously. It was also asked to please let ALDOT know to put up additional signage for drivers to know the construction is coming.
 - US 31 Widening The utility relocation is still underway. Pipe should be laid soon.
 - SR 181 and I-10, Diverging Diamond This project will be let in August, with construction anticipated to begin in November.
 - o Planning and Development Update (J. Fidler) Mrs. Fidler gave an update on preliminary, and final plat development along with building permits in the Metropolitan Planning Area. A more detailed accounting will be presented at the Policy Board.
 - Discussion: The question was asked to Mr. Bill Harbour regarding the number of children calculated per household. Mr. Harbour stated that the school system assumes a half child per house. However, a home that would be built in Valamor, for instance, would be at least one child per house. It depends on where you are located within the county (distance to town, schools) as to what calculation or number assumed per household. Mr. Harbour also explained that the school board uses a company named Market Graphics to get the information.

The first one is a safety improvement project. And this is for a compact roundabout on 181 at George Bishop Lane. And so you can see, this is 98 down here. This is 181 where it kind of doglegs around. So it would be right there. That's ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000); target start date of 8/1.

The second is a cost increase for utilities. And since the work session, it actually has gone back down to four hundred and fifty-five thousand, seven hundred and thirteen dollars (\$455,713). But it's still a pretty good increase from the original engineer's estimate.

And then construction actually went down as well, but still an increase from the original cost. So now we're looking at eight million, three hundred and ninety-nine thousand, one hundred forty dollars (\$8,399,140) for construction.

TRANSIT SURVEY FINDINGS (J. FIDLER)

MS. JENNIFER FIDLER: Okay. Moving on to the public transit survey that we did. We're writing a

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And we sent them to all our flyer list, which is about sixty-five (65) people. We actually reached out to like apartment complexes, schools. And we put about eight (8) surveys or ten (10) surveys in each one of those envelopes.

This is the first question:

What is your primary means of transportation?

Most people use their personal automobile, ninety percent
(90%), so two hundred seventy-two (272) respondents. So
the next highest number was BRATS at
eight-point-three-one percent (8.31%); friend, relative,
or neighbor at seven-point-six-four percent (7.64%).

Thirteen percent (13%) was walking, so I guess that was
the next highest.

Public transportation awareness: Were you aware or are you aware that Baldwin County residents have access to public transit?

Yes, I have heard of BRATS, got it at forty-five percent (45%); twenty-five percent (25%) said, yes, I have used BRATS and would consider riding again.

Which town or city of the Eastern Shore Metropolitan

Planning Area do you reside?

Most of these people came from Fairhope with

forty-three percent (43%). Daphne was the second highest at twenty-two percent (22%), and Spanish Fort at

WHEREAS, MPO staff, in coordination with the Federal Highway Administration, Federal Transit Administration, and the Alabama Department of Transportation has reviewed the requirement to adopt these Bridge and Pavement Performance Measurement (PM2) Targets for use in the transportation process as required by 23 CFR 490.105;

WHEREAS, MPO staff recommends the Eastern Shore MPO support and adopt the statewide Bridge and Pavement Performance Measurement (PM2) Targets approved by the Alabama Department of Transportation as follows:

 - Percentage of poor condition bridge deck area for 2017: 2.0 %
 - Explanation of Condition Grade: The condition grade is based on the National Bridge Inventory (NBI) condition ratings for Bridge Deck, Bridge Superstructure, Bridge Substructure, and Culvert.
 - 2-year Performance Target: No greater than 3 % (2019)
 - 4-year Performance Target: No greater than 3 % (2021)
- PM2 Measure: % of Interstate pavement in good condition
 - ALDOT's Internal Pavement Condition Rating Score for 2017: 76.98 %
