CA GENERAL

CA1 <u>Recognition of Senator Trip Pittman for his Sponsorship of Act. 2018-539</u> <u>Simplified Sellers Use Tax Remittance</u>

Senator Tripp Pittman and Kim Creech, Clerk/Treasurer, appeared before the Commission. Ms. Creech said this is a dedication to Senator Pittman and read the plaque presented to Senator Pittman.

Senator Pittman asked if the Commissioners would allow him to say a few words. He knows everyone is eager to get out of here and the Commissioners have done a great job in being efficient with their meetings. Senator Pittman said in Alabama there has always been a requirement to voluntarily pay a use tax. With the change in purchasing habits, the Simplified Sellers Use Tax was passed where the companies are now responsible for remitting those taxes. Legislation has gone a step further to define what the nexus is so that the stores and electronic vendors will be on a level playing field. Senator Pittman said last year approximately \$50 million was collected from the Simplified Sellers Use Tax; this year it has gone up to \$80 million. This is split half-in-half with the State. In one-half, 75 percent will go in General Fund and 25 percent will go to education. The other half will be split between the cities and counties. Previously, it was 25 percent of the total to each. There was a little debate this year where the cities felt they were out-negotiated the first time. There was a compromise and the split was 60/40 between the counties and cities. This is a mechanism where revenues that are due and payable are collected; citizens have to pay for their government, it is the most important thing that they do. Senator Pittman said he was honored to work with Mr. Sonny Brasfield, with the Association of County Commissions of Alabama (ACCA), who is an outstanding individual. Senator Pittman said there is always a political process. He is glad the ACCA awarded this recognition to him, and he appreciates the Commissioners presenting it. He would also like to thank each of

the Commissioners for their service to the County. It is a team effort and everyone works together. Sometimes, there are different views on things, but he has been honored to work with them. Senator Pittman thanked Chairman Burt, as a citizen, for the decades of service he has tended to the County. Commissioner Gruber will continue in that capacity. Senator Pittman said he knows Commissioner Gruber loves this County with all his heart, and he appreciates Commissioner Gruber's service. Senator Pittman said to Commissioner Dorsey that as a businessman he knows there is nothing like being a businessman, and he appreciates what Commissioner Dorsey does. Senator Pittman wished Commissioner Elliott good luck in November and good luck in Montgomery; it is a tremendous challenge. Senator Pittman said God bless the Commissioners, God speed, God bless America, God bless Alabama and God bless Baldwin County.

Ms. Creech said since the start of the program, Baldwin County has received \$2,343,192.00. The Town of Elberta received \$17,000.00 of this amount. This is money the smaller cities would have never received. Ms. Creech said the Town of Perdido Beach is small, but it has a lot of revenue generated businesses and it received \$6,000.00. The Baldwin County Commission received \$1.2 million of the money.

CA3 Introduction of Baldwin County Sheriff's Corrections Center Accreditation <u>18-0941</u> Award

Sheriff Huey Hoss Mack appeared before the Commission and said it is a great day

and a privilege to be here today. Sheriff Mack said he could not legitimately stand here today and talk about a great, monumental accomplishment achieved in the Baldwin County Sheriff's Office and Corrections Center without having the employees present to be recognized. Sheriff Mack said on August 30, 2018, the Baldwin County Sheirff's Office Corrections Center received a Level II Accreditation by the National Institute of Jail Operations (NIJO). Sheriff Mack read a prepared statement on the requirements for a NIJO Accreditation and said the Corrections Center received a Level II accreditation. This is only the second accreditation that has been awarded in the State of Alabama. There is only one other Sheriff's facility in the State that has received this award to date.

Sheriff Mack recognized the employees present who actively participated in this accreditation process with NIJO that started five years ago. Sheriff Mack also recognized John Henry, head of the Sheriff's Office's Maintenance Department, and said Mr. Henry was unable to attend today's meeting. Mr. Henry and his staff were integral in making sure the physical plant was compliant with the Federal and State laws and regulations. Sheriff Mack thanked Chief Deputy Charlie Jones, who was integral in this process, and Major Anthony Lowery who is also present today. Sheriff Mack thanked the Commissioners for their part in the cooperation with the Sheriff's Office that began years ago. The Baldwin County Commission and the Association of County Commissions of Alabama (ACCA) are one of few entities that work together to promote the Jail Training Program. Sheriff Mack said the Jail Training Program was one of the programs recognized in the national accreditation because the Sheriff's Office offered training above and beyond what was required for this accreditation at the local level. That comes from the spirit of cooperation between the Sheriff's Offices and County Commissions in the State of Alabama. Sheriff Mack asked the Commissioners to join him in congratulating the entire Command Staff of the Baldwin County Sheriff's Office Corrections Center for receiving this national accreditation.

Commissioner Dorsey said the Commissioners are proud of the work Sheriff Mack and his entire team does on every level. There is a lot of work that goes into what the Sheriff's Office does every day. Commissioner Dorsey said he has a different perspective of what the Sheriff's Office does daily; he toured the jail and never wants to be there again. It is such a critical component to what the Sheriff's Office does for the community and society. Commissioner Dorsey said he is thankful for the work the Sheriff's Office puts in, not only to do what it does every day, but to increase its training and be better at what is done in Baldwin County every day. He is proud of the Sheriff's Office's work and is proud to call the employees his friends.

Commissioner Elliott said running a tight ship is one thing, but their pursuit of excellence is to be commended. That is what is demonstrated here, it is not just doing what is right or going above and beyond, it is excellence. Commissioner Elliott said he is impressed and continues to be impressed with the leadership in the Sheriff's Office. Baldwin County is the example in the State, there is no question about it. Around the State, people are envious of the organization Sheriff Mack has built and of the relationship the Sheriff's Office has with the Commission and the Board of Education. That is not a small feat. Commissioner Elliott said the Commissioners are genuinely proud of the Sheriff's Office and its leadership.

Commissioner Gruber said the Sheriff's Office has come a long way with the Corrections Center. He can remember years back when the Sheriff's Office was not like it is today. There is a fantastic staff and they are people who care about people and what they are doing with the people. Those who are incarcerated are treated well. They are fed, housed and taken care of medically. Commissioner Gruber said Sheriff Mack made a big change to what is going on there. Staff is doing a great job and they make Baldwin County shine. It is a good place to be.

Chairman Burt said he cannot thank Sheriff Mack enough. When he came on to the Commission, the Sheriff's Office was a little white building with an unfinished addition. Former Sheriff Jimmy Johnson did a good job. Sheriff Mack came along and picked up the mantle from him and never looked back. Chairman Burt said it is a good day for the viewing public who paid their tax dollars for Baldwin County to become what it has become and let them know how those tax dollars have been spent. The Sheriff's Office is one of the best in the nation and the second in Alabama to ever receive this accreditation. Chairman Burt thanked the Sheriff's Office and said he picked a good time to retire from the Commission because Mr. Henry and Chief Deputy Jones have been with the Sheriff's Office for a long time and are both retiring at the end of the year. It is good to have good employees.

At this time, Commissioner Dorsey left the meeting and the Chambers and did not participate in any discussion regarding this agenda item.

Joey Nunnally, County Engineer, appeared before the Commission and said there is a long history with this area and the unmaintained road.

David Conner, County Attorney, said Mr. Brad Hicks, with Stone Crosby, is here as Conflicts Counsel. Mr. Hicks has requested the Commission to enter into an executive session before this item is discussed in order to address some concerns he has. Mr. Conner said there are two other executive session items to discuss. It is anticipated the executive session will last approximately 25 minutes for all three items. If the Commissioners would like to enter into an executive session now, they can and then reconvene the meeting and resume discussion on this item when it is over.

Chairman Burt said he feels that will be more appropriate. The Commission will come back and vote after the executive session.

At this time, Commissioner Dorsey returned to the meeting and the Chambers.

GN1 Baldwin County Sewer Service - Utility Permit #18192-S - Sewer 18-1051 Installation on Pine Drive and Bluewater Drive in Elberta 18-1051

David Conner, County Attorney, said his firm Blackburn and Conner, has a conflict of interest on two items and Mr. Brad Hicks with Stone Crosby, is here as Conflicts Counsel, to handle those items along with Joey Nunnally, County Engineer. At this time, Mr. Conner left the Chambers and the meeting.

Chairman Burt said Commissioner Dorsey has left the Chambers and the meeting and will not participate in any discussion regarding this item.

Mr. Nunnally appeared before the Commission and said staff received an application from the Baldwin County Sewer Service to install a 2" water main down Pine Drive and Bluewater Drive, located in the south end of the Town of Elberta. The roads are totally within the town limits of the Town of Elberta, and it is a non county-maintained right-of-way. Mr. Nunnally said the Town of Elberta annexed the property in 2005 but has not accepted the roads for maintenance, at this time. Since the right-of-way was deeded in Baldwin County's name from years past, the permit came to the County. The recommendation before the Commission is to either accept or deny the permit for the Baldwin County Sewer Service to install the 2" water main down these two roads.

Motion by Commissioner Chris Elliott, seconded by Vice Chairman Charles F. Gruber, to authorize the Chairman to execute Utility Permit #18192-S for Baldwin County Sewer Service to install approximately 2,630' of 2" PVC/HDPE SFM pipe on the east side of Pine Drive and the north side of Bluewater Drive.

After the motion, before the vote, Commissioner Elliott said in accordance with what Mr. Nunnally is saying, this easement and right-of-way is within the town limits of the Town of Elberta. He does not believe the Commission has the authority to issue a license permit on this matter, and he will be voting "no" on this issue.

Chairman Burt said that is the reason for this motion. The Town of Elberta would have the authority to issue this. Chairman Burt asked if Mr. Hicks has a draft response to the Baldwin County Sewer Service with a copy to the Town of Elberta?

Mr. Hicks appeared before the Commission and said if the motion fails, he will draft a letter on behalf of the Commission to the Town of Elberta explaining that under Section 11-49-80 of the Code of Alabama, the Town is required to have responsibility for this road, and the Commission does not have the authority to grant what has been requested of the Commission today.

Chairman Burt asked if the motion fails then what?

Mr. Hicks said if the motion fails, he will draft a letter on behalf of the Commission to the Town of Elberta.

Chairman Burt asked if there is a copy of this letter, to which Mr. Hicks replied he has not drafted it yet. Chairman Burt said the motion would need to include authorization for the Chairman to sign the letter. When will Mr. Hicks have the letter prepared?

Mr. Hicks said he will have the letter prepared by the end of the week or as soon as he can. The motion has been made and seconded and will be called for a vote. If the Commission votes "no" on the motion, then he will inform the Town of Elberta. He will be happy to write the letter for the Chairman to sign or for his signature.

Commissioner Gruber asked if the Commission can just deny the permit and send it to the Town of Elberta to make things easier?

Commissioner Elliott said the standard practice would be to deny the permit and have counsel communictate with the Town of Elberta. He is unsure if the Chairman has to execute anything on this.

Chairman Burt asked staff to repeat the motion and said the Commission has the opportunity to

either approve the request or disapprove it.

After the vote, Mr. Hicks said the Chairman called for the "nays" and everyone indicated "nay" so the motion has failed. He will communicate this to the Town of Elberta.

Chairman Burt asked if the Chairman will sign the correspondence, to which Mr. Hicks replied he is unsure if the Chairman needs to sign it.

Mr. Hicks said the vote is on the record so the action of the Commission is clear. He will communicate what has already happened to the Town and will send the Commission a copy of what he sends.

Chairman Burt said it is customary for staff to send a letter of approval or denial with the Chairman signing the letter.

Ron Cink, County Administrator/Budget Director, said in the outbound correspondence from today's meeting, staff will notify the parties that the agenda item failed. This is normally customary.

Chairman Burt said normally the Chairman signs it, to which Mr. Cink replied in that instance "yes."

Mr. Nunnally said for clarification, the letter Mr. Cink is talking about will go to the Baldwin County Sewer Service. They are the applicants for the permit. The Town of Elberta can be copied, that will take care of everyone.

Chairman Burt said he believes he previously stated that. The motion failed, and staff will inform the Baldwin County Sewer Service and copy the Town of Elberta.

At this time, Commissioner Dorsey returned to the Chambers and the meeting.

Baldwin County Intracoastal Waterway (ICW) Boat Launch Project

Mr. Brad Hicks, with Stone Crosby, appeared before the Commission and said he received an executed Purchase and Sale Agreement offering to sell approximately 40 acres on the Intracoastal Waterway to the Baldwin County Commission for a purchase price of \$7.5 million. The property will be used as a boat launch. Mr. Hicks said the terms of the Purchase and Sale Agreement have been reviewed, if the Commission is in favor of this, there should be a motion to authorize the Chairman to execute the Purchase and Sale Agreement, a second, discussion and then a vote. He will be happy to answer any questions the Commission has.

Motion by Commissioner Tucker Dorsey, seconded by Commissioner Chris Elliott, to authorize the Chairman to execute the Purchase and Sale Agreement for approximately 40 acres on the intercostal waterway for a purchase price of \$7.5 million and submit the earnest money required from the Gulf of Mexico Energy Security Act (GOMESA) funding.

After the motion, before the vote, Commissioner Elliott said this is a process the Commission has worked on for some time to fill a very dire need in the south end of the County for access to the water for the residents who live inland. This is a great piece of land that will serve the County long into the future. The goal is to use GOMESA funding that is currently housed with the State, specifically under control of the Governor's Office. The State has approximately \$25 million from last fiscal year to spend in Coastal Alabama for activities such as water access. Commissioner Elliott said this project has the support of the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources and State Lands and the support of local people as well as the support of representatives in the Cities of Gulf Shores, Orange Beach and Foley. He is proud to see it move forward. The next step will be to make sure the funding is secured from the Governor's Office. Commissioner Elliott thanked Mr. Hicks and Joey Nunnally, County Engineer, for their work on this and said this is wrapped up in a bow for the Governor's Office to approve and he encourages Governor Kay Ivey to do so at her earliest possible convenience.

Commissioner Dorsey said he appreciates Commissioner Gruber and Commissioner Elliott working on the politics with the support the County has received from the municipalities as well as the work that has been going on at the Governor's level. He is encouraged by that activity to get this funded. This is a real project and will have a great impact for people to gain access to the waterways. The location and the layout are perfect and for the visitors, it has better access to the water. With the design criteria, this will reduce the traffic impact on the island which can be challenging at times. Commissioner Dorsey said this should help the boat industry and Baldwin County. It is a big, major infrastructure project to give people access to the waterway. This is a win-win-win for Baldwin County, and he is proud to be a part of this project.

Commissioner Gruber said the money set aside for GOMESA funding can only be spent in Mobile and Baldwin Counties. It is a win-win for everyone and he hopes the Governor's Office will approve it for Baldwin County to get this project on the way.

Chairman Burt said there has been considerable conversations from Commissioners with the Governor's Office, State Lands and the municipalities of the Cities of Foley, Orange Beach and Gulf Shores. Is there anything in writing stating their support?

Commissioner Gruber said he spoke with the City of Foley and was informed that the City passed a resolution a while back supporting the purchase of the property. The City is willing to send another letter to the Governor's Office stating the importance of this boat launch. Commissioner Gruber said he will contact Mr. Mike Thompson, City Administrator, to see if the City of Foley will send that letter to the Governor's Office.

Chairman Burt asked if there is a letter on file?

Commissioner Elliott said the first step is to have the purchase agreement. It is his understanding that the Councils are willing and able to pass a resolution supporting this and send to the

Governor's Office as soon as the Chairman executes the purchase agreement.

Chairman Burt said there is nothing in writing. What is the price?

Commissioner Gruber said the price is \$7.5 million.

Mr. Hicks said the agreement is a 22 page purchase agreement with the terms expressed within it. Other than that, he is unsure of what other writing staff would have.

Chairman Burt said those were questions he needed answers to.

After the vote, Mr. Conner returned to the Chambers and the meeting.
