After the motion and before the vote, Commissioner Davis said for those who drive cars there are a series of things they are supposed to do. Those who drive and ride in boats have a similar list. Everyone must continue to communicate this to all segments of society, particularly the younger people because they will watch the adults. If the adults are not doing it right, it is possible the younger people will not do it right. Commissioner Davis said everyone should take responsibility to share this information at every opportunity. Commissioner Davis thanked Ms. Brewer for what she does.

CA2 Resolution #2019-081 - Stepping Up Initiative: A National Initiative to Reduce the Number of People with Mental Illnesses in Jails

Representatives from Leadership Baldwin County appeared before the Commission to accept the resolution as presented by Sheriff Huey Hoss Mack and Commissioner Underwood on behalf of the Commission.

After Wayne Dyess, County Administrator, read the resolution, Commissioner Underwood said the representatives are from the Leadership Baldwin Class of 2019 who will graduate this week. Commissioner Underwood said they came to her a few weeks ago and said the Commissioners and Baldwin County should be more aware of this issue. Sheriff Mack may want to say something because this initiative will be a work in progress and everyone

will have to work together. This is a big problem that is just getting bigger.

Mr. Steve Carey appeared before the Commission and introduced Mr. John Hicks, Ms. Christina Brazell, Ms. Claire Blackwell and Ms. Lee Ann Cain. Mr. Carey said a year ago when this path with Leadership Baldwin County started, no one had an appreciation for the mental health issues the County has. They now realize it is a problem that cannot be solved with one or two organizations. Mr. Carey said he read a study that stated most of the solutions to mental health occur when there is a large political body or a large organization that can get their arms around it. Throughout the rest of the State, this action started with the County Commission. That is why they are here to talk with the Commissioners. Mr. Carey said the Commissioners must ask themselves if they are committed to do something about this? Data must be collected and something has to be done with that data. This will come from the Commission. It is a long path and will take many years to fix the system that has atrophied over the last decade. This is a problem that everyone has to pay attention to because it will cost a great deal of time and heart moving forward if no one gets serious about mental health across the board.

Sheriff Mack said May is National Mental Health Awareness month. Today, in the United States of America, over 50 million individuals suffer from mental illness. Over the past few years, there has been a 300 percent increase in the involuntary commitments in Baldwin County as well as a rise of mental health issues among the inmates in the County jail. Sheriff Mack said the "Stepping Up" initiative has actually been in the process for several years across the United States, most recently making its way to Alabama. Baldwin County is actually only one of four Sheriff's Offices in the State that has decided to take on this project. The Sheriff's Office will work closely with Shelby County and Morgan County; they are two counties that are a little further along in the process than Baldwin County. Sheriff Mack said there are only six questions in the project, and the "Stepping Up" initiative's goal is a data-base driven research project to identify ways to evaluate, access and secure, and procure treatment for those individuals as either an alternative to incarceration or to follow-up with them after their release from jail. That is why there has to be a partnership and more people will be brought into this fold as the Sheriff's Office attempts to identify the resources and those plans to do this. Currently, in Alabama, there is only 20 percent of the treatment beds the State had 20 years ago. Alabama is down 80 percent from what it was then. While a lot of the individuals do not go to treatment beds, it is the lack of the treatment beds that force the individuals with issues back into the community that is eating up the local resources. This gives fewer alternatives to address some of the mental issues and the Sheriff's Office will be working on this. Sheriff Mack said he appreciates Commissioner Underwood taking this on and her interest in this. He appreciates Leadership Baldwin County for looking at this issue and stepping up to partner and he appreciates the future partners. As a past graduate of Leadership Baldwin County, he feels it always shows that when a community comes together to address an issue, it will be taken care of. Sheriff Mack said he is very excited about the County's partnership and what everyone will be able to do with this in the future.

Commissioner Underwood said this was not her group, but she is so proud to be able to help them with their projects. Her project is on workforce development. Commissioner Underwood asked the public to check out the workforce development billboard in Robertsdale and thanked the Leadership Baldwin County representatives for coming.

GP1 *Case No. Z-19009 - Seaglade at St. Andrews Bay Planned Residential Development (PRD) Site Plan

David Conner, County Attorney, said he has a conflict of interest on this item. Mr. Brad Hicks with Stone Crosby has been representing the County in this matter. At this time, Mr. Conner left the Chambers and the meeting and did not participate in any discussion regarding Item GP1.

Vince Jackson, Planning Director, appeared before the Commission and provided background information on the subject property. Mr. Jackson said staff has spent a good bit of time on this. Yesterday, the Commissioners received an email from concern citizens in the area and he was copied on that email. Mr. Jackson said he wanted to point out that the email mentioned there was missing information. There was no missing information; had there been missing information, staff would have never brought it forward. Mr. Jackson said there is a good bit of information that goes into staff's file that is not included in the Commissioners' or the Planning Commissioners' packets. Most of the PRD applications staff deals with involves much larger projects. The most recent one he handled was for 600 lots. Mr. Jackson said sometimes the projects involve mixtures of land uses, they may include some commercial areas and they may include multi-families in addition to single-family. In those instances, there are additional details staff looks at. Also, some of the information staff receives is more relevant to the subdivision process. For example, there are utility plans, build-ups of the roads, contour information and those given things. Mr. Jackson said they are submitted to staff on large sheets and it is not feasible for staff to give the Commissioners all this information. What the Commissioners are asked to approve is the layout and it is depicted on the site plan. Staff understands and appreciates the concerns expressed to them and that Fort Morgan is a unique area and the various environmental and safety concerns and traffic access need to be carefully considered. Mr. Jackson said staff feels that with this development there should be no adverse impacts. He has been in contact with Mr. Bill Lynn with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and included some of the emails he received from Mr. Lynn with the information provided to the Commission. Mr. Lynn is satisfied with the applicants' effort. Mr. Jackson said Mr. Lynn has worked with the applicants for over two years and has stated the applicant has done everything he has asked them to do. Mr. Lynn has worked with the applicants on other projects in which they did everything he asked them to do. Mr. Jackson said Mr. Lynn stated to him that if the Commission approves this Site Plan, this will be the Site Plan he will approve in issuing the Incidental Take Permit. That process will take approximately six months to one year, so there will be other things that will need to be done. The applicants will have to go through the subdivision process. At the point the applicants are ready to build houses on the 27 lots, if they are approved, if the applicants come to the Planning and Zoning Department for a Land Use Certificate, which is the first step in issuing a building permit, staff will not issue anything unless all of the approvals are in place. Mr. Jackson said staff will make sure the applicants are following the Site Plan, if it is approved. Staff will make sure that all zoning requirements are followed. He feels comfortable with what has been submitted and staff stands by its recommendation. Mr. Jackson said in looking to the future, staff

is working on possible zoning amendments to the local provision for Planning District 25. Staff is also looking at some master planning efforts. Staff plans to go back to the Fort Morgan Zoning Committee next month to begin discussions with the Committee and residents. Staff is working on things that will help address some of the concerns. He feels the residents will be pleased with the planning efforts going forward. Mr. Jackson said in the original recommendation, staff included a condition pertaining to the access drive being paved with either asphalt or concrete. He also recommends another condition pertaining to the number of stories. Staff previously limited the number of stories in single-family dwellings to two and a half, but that requirement was removed in 2009. Ten years later in looking back at it, staff will probably reinstate that requirement. Mr. Jackson said if the Commissioners are inclined to approve this development, he feels it will be a good idea if the Commissioners included an additional condition that the height, in terms of number of stories, be limited to two and a half to be consistent with the original requirement and with the requirement staff will probably have going forward. As the final voting authority on a PRD Site Plan, the Commissioners can impose additional conditions if they see fit. Staff recommends approval with the requirement that the private drive be payed with either asphalt or concrete and also with the condition that the number of stories be limited to two and a half. Mr. Jackson said those are all of his comments and he will be happy to answer any questions.

Commissioner Underwood asked if the applicants are okay with Mr. Jackson's last condition, to which Mr. Jackson replied "yes." Mr. Jackson said he mentioned that to the applicants and he discussed it with Wayne Dyess, County Administrator.

Commissioner Underwood thanked Mr. Jackson and said when the Commissioners tabled this before, it was a lot to have in just a few days. When the Commissioners were bombarded from residents of the community, she felt it was important to take additional time to look over this and understand it. Commissioner Underwood thanked Mr. Jackson and said he has done an excellent job in helping her to understand it so that she can make sure the Commissioners take the right action. She is very comfortable in understanding that what the Commissioners are asked to do is to approve a Site Plan.

Chairman Gruber said a public hearing has been held, but he wants to see if there is anyone present who wishes to speak on this. Hearing none, Chairman Gruber called for a motion.

After the motion, before the vote, Commissioner Underwood said there has been some information that this is the desire of the Planning Department to have these functions brought back together related to subdivisions. After talking with both the County Engineer and the Planning Director, it will be a good move to do this and staff will have the summer to get things worked out. This would not take effect until September 6, 2019.

Chairman Gruber said this item is on the next work session in order to discuss what this will entail. He does not have all of the information at this point. He was not involved in none of the decision making. Chairman Gruber said he feels the

Commissioners should take this to a work session so everyone can look at this and make sure they are comfortable with what is going on. This will only be one week's difference in discussion and two weeks before it is approved. He feels that if everyone sits down together to go over this, the Commission will be a lot better off than just trying to make rash decisions with just a couple of people sitting down to decide this is the way it is going to be. Chairman Gruber said he appreciates the Commissioners looking at this, but he feels it is something that needs to have an agenda. This is set up to be on the next work session. Chairman Gruber called for the vote.

After the vote, Chairman Gruber said he is voting "no" because it is not the right thing to do. Without discussing this amongst themselves, the Commission is haphazardly doing something that could have waited one more week in order for the Commissioners to discuss this. Chairman Gruber said he feels this is not the right way to do this.

Commissioner Davis said in talking with the County Administrator and the Commissioners heading into the budgeting process, he feels it is critical for the Commission to have simple reports relative to revenue projections and where the Commission stands six months into the year of where it is operating now. In order for the Commissioners to move forward in creating a budget, he feels the Commission should see where it is on the revenue side relative to the income for the first six months of this fiscal year. He feels this will enable the Commissioners to make better decisions moving forward. Commissioner Davis asked the County Administrator to communicate this with the Budget Director and other necessary personnel. This will be valuable for him and he hopes it will be valuable for everyone else to have this information to add it to the budget process.

Wayne Dyess, County Administrator, said he will be working with Vince Jackson, Planning Director, on the proposed amendments to the Zoning Regulations and to the Master Plan. Commissioner Davis said everyone will see more and more information regarding the Census process. Everyone needs to be actively involved in making sure there is an accurate reflection of the number of people living in this County. Baldwin County is the fastest growing county and the Census is critical to the State. Commissioner Davis said currently, Alabama has two Senators which structure will remain as long as Alabama is a State, but the House of Representatives is based on population and every household needs to be counted. The credibility of the Federal government is at one of its low points relative to people sharing information. In order for the County to maximize its representation and the ability to attract Federal money, every household should be counted. This is a process that people will hear more and more about. This should be done for the County's best interest. It is not helping Washington, DC, it is helping the County get the things it needs from Washington, DC. Commissioner Davis said he will continue to make this comment from time-to-time. This Census is something critical for the County to move forward on. It is next year, but the planning process has started.

Commissioner Underwood said she was at the Census meeting with Chairman Gruber and Commissioner Davis. She was excited to see that the Census wants this to be treated like an election campaign and that they have a Facebook page. She shared a post about this last night and there have been 11 shares from that post. Commissioner Underwood encouraged everyone to continue to help the Commissioners spread the word. It will be easier than ever to do this, it is in an electronic format now. A postcard will be mailed with a code on it and there is the possibility that this will be address driven; she does not have the exact details yet. The Census is also looking for people to work it and is taking applications now. The pay range is between \$14 and \$17 an hour. Commissioner Underwood asked everyone to help get the word out. Alabama counts, but Baldwin County counts even more based on some of the recent legislation passed. Everything Baldwin County needs relates to growth. Commissioner Underwood said this weekend she and Chairman Gruber attended a markers dedication in Lillian, Alabama; she learned a lot about Lillian. She would like to thank the Bicentennial Committees that are around the State, especially in Baldwin County. The Lillian Bicentennial Committee did a great job in gathering support from the community. Alabama is so special, especially to those who were born and raised here. It must also be special to other people because they keep moving in. Commissioner Underwood thanked everyone for allowing her the opportunity to share this information today.

Chairman Gruber thanked staff for getting the agenda ready, allowing the Commissioners to conduct the business of the County.
