(SKIP) GRUBER: 4 5 All right. 6 MR. RON CINK: Okay. 7 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 8 Next. 9 C-1 - CITY OF DAPHNE - CORTE ROAD AND AUSTIN ROAD IMPROVEMENTS -10 11 FISCAL YEAR 2017-2018 BUDGET APPROPRIATION MR. RON CINK: Next item is Highway. 12 13 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 14 Joey. MR. JOEY NUNNALLY: Good morning. Item C-1 is 15 going to be an item for just discussion, if we can get it 16 17 to come up. This is going to be City of Daphne, Corte 18 Okay. Road and Austin Road improvements. And I just kind of 19 20 wanted to go through a little brief -- a little briefing, 21 I guess, on where -- how we got to this point. 22 This particular section of road runs between County 23 Road 13 and -- and 181. It's about one-point -- it's a 24 little over a mile. I'll get up so I can point a little 25 better. 26 So -- so this is -- this is Corte Road's alignment 27 here. This is County Road 13. And this is 181. And 28 this little section over here is Austin Road. And it's

1	just got a realignment going on.
2	So since November of 2016, this road has been
3	discussed at numerous work sessions, I think a Road and
4	Bridge, some budget deliberations meetings, and and
5	also a Commission meeting on August the 7th.
6	The City of Daphne approached us back in November of
7	2016 to to try to enter into an agreement with us to
8	pave this road. This is currently a dirt road, and they
9	wanted it paved.
10	There's some developments going in, in this area.
11	We have an existing development here. There's lots of
12	widening and stuff going on, on 181. Traffic volume is
13	picking up. 13 is now paved. It's a good east/west
14	corridor.
15	Daphne wanted to to to pave it, but it's in
16	the County. So they've asked us to work together on it.
17	The developer actually kicked in some money to the City
18	of Daphne to get the road paved up to to about where
19	the curve is there.
20	The the the City of Daphne actually asked the
21	County for for help in four different areas. One was
22	to help use our expertise in acquiring the right-of-way
23	in this section. The other was to help donate labor and
24	equipment to base the road out; okay?
25	They were supposed to supply all the materials. We
26	were going to supply the labor and equipment. The third
27	one was transfer of maintenance, and then the forth would
28	be let them maintain it from here on out.

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1	So, oh, I'm sorry. The forth one would be the two
2	hundred thousand dollar (\$200,000) financial assistance
3	that they wanted the County to give to the City to help
4	do the project.
5	Through all the deliberations and discussions that
6	happened, just to cut through all the chase, three of
7	those four were approved. Y'all approved the
8	Commission approved us to help with acquisition, approved
9	the equipment and labor to get the road based out, and
10	approved to transfer the maintenance through a quit claim
11	deed. But the two hundred thousand dollar (\$200,000)
12	financial assistance failed to pass at the Commission
13	meeting.
14	During the budget, two hundred thousand dollars
15	(\$200,000) was set aside for this project. But when
16	when it came time for a vote to transfer the money, it
17	did not pass. So the two hundred thousand dollars
18	(\$200,000) Ron, correct me if I'm wrong. The two
19	hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) is still sitting in
20	the budget.
21	MR. RON CINK: No, not sitting in the budget.
22	It's sitting in fund balance now.
23	MR. JOEY NUNNALLY: Fund balance. I'm sorry.
24	Fund balance. So so I think the City of Daphne is now
25	asking some questions, what what what to do with
26	that two hundred thousand (\$200,000). Is it still
27	available? Is there a point in time they can go back and
28	ask for this money?

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1	The City of Daphne has put together a set of plans,
2	let the project out, and the project is now under
3	construction and being done. I did reach out to the City
4	of Daphne to try to get an update on that, because
5	they're they're running with that project now. I
6	didn't get any information back for this meeting, so I
7	apologize.
8	But that's kind of where we're at now. Kim, do you
9	have anything to add? There was there was a time in
10	which the right-of-way reimbursements were not coming in,
11	in a timely manner. That all got resolved. They have
12	fully paid us for all the right-of-way expense that
13	that that we expended on this project.
14	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
15	Joey, now, are they the whole thing is under
16	construction at this point?
17	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Yes.
18	MR. JOEY NUNNALLY: Is Austin Road also
19	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Austin Road, the
20	cut-through. If you could show people where Austin Road
21	currently goes and then the transition and what will
22	happen at the intersection.

4	Back in August the 21st of 2018, we'd gotten
5	notified, and Commission accepted a grant from ALDOT
6	called the Highway Safety Improvement Program.
7	We had submitted for this grand through ALDOT to put
8	this roundabout here. They they have awarded us that
9	grant in the amount of a little over two million dollars
10	(\$2,000,000). So we're in the process of trying to get
11	that thing designed, move utilities, and and get this
12	thing going.
13	The City of Fairhope actually maintained County Road
14	13. The County maintains County Road 44 or Twin Beech
15	Road. So this intergovernmental service agreement is
16	basically just kind of making sure that everybody that
17	the City of Fairhope knows what its responsibilities are,
18	and the County knows what their responsibilities are, and
19	who is going to do what at the end.
20	In the end, the City of Fairhope will put up
21	lighting and landscape and maintain this particular
22	roundabout, just like they did the other two at 48 and
23	Gayfer. So it will be almost the identical agreement.
24	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
25	All right. And the cost estimate of two million
26	(\$2,000,000), that's coming from Federal? Is that
27	Federal money, or we've got to pay that out of ours, or
28	is that MPO money?

21	is to discuss the tipping fees and commercial account
22	late fee policy.
23	And my recommendation during the budget
24	deliberations this year was to abolish the cubic yard
25	rate discounted option that we had been offering to the
26	commercial roll-off customers.
27	I know there is a lot of people here that want to
28	talk to you guys about that. But my recommendation would

1	remain the same.
2	I just we offered that rate in 2011, after oil
3	spill, to help these guys out. They business was bad
4	back then. The the decrease in the rate has served
5	its purpose. I don't think that the building in Baldwin
6	County is hurting.
7	And if we were to have a storm event, our stated
8	gate rate for cubic yard during a storm event is four
9	dollars and fifty cents (\$4.50), which would be what we
10	expect all the Municipalities and CrowderGulf and
11	everybody else to pay.
12	You know, that those are my reasons for wanting
13	to do away with the rate, put everybody back on the same
14	level playing field. At the time that We did decrease
15	the tonnage rate, too. We went from twenty dollars (\$20)
16	a ton to eighteen (\$18) dollars a ton. You know, still
17	offering that eighteen dollars (\$18) a ton to everyone.
18	But if you guys want to hear what they have to say,
19	and I can follow back up, but that that is my
20	recommendation.
21	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: And, Mr. Chairman,
22	there is a component of this that I think is appropriate
23	for discussion in executive session.
24	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
25	Okay.
26	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: So at some point in
27	time, I do have some executive session items. And that

17	who have showed up to talk, I was trying to read the
18	minutes from the 2011
19	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
20	Uh-huh. (Indicates affirmatively.)
21	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD:
22	meeting. And it it sounded like to me, from the brief
23	amount that I just got these when I got here. It hit
24	me this morning at eight o'clock, when I was driving up
25	here, that maybe I should have looked at those.
26	There's been a lot going on the last few weeks.
27	But, anyhow, the discussion that came from the then
28	director of the landfill was that a lot of this business

1	was going out of the county because of our rates were so
2	high.
3	And so just looking back at that, how can I don't
4	know where they were going, because I didn't get that
5	far. But it was like from the little bit that I read,
6	it was five hundred dollars (\$500) to dump here and only
7	like a hundred and twenty-five (\$125) to dump somewhere
8	else.
9	MR. RUSTY WALTER: Right.
10	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Okay. So
11	I'm sitting here going, how can that be? How can someone
12	outside the county afford to do that? And then that's
13	why I was asking the reasonableness of our I don't
14	even know if we're at the point right now where that I
15	have enough information to move with a decision on this.
16	I know we tabled it once before. I was on the phone
17	until ten o'clock last night with some people talking
18	about this. And this is a big decision
19	MS. KIM CREECH: Uh-huh. (Indicates
20	affirmatively.)
21	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD that it
22	doesn't seem fair to me other people are having to pay
23	it. Why can there be such a big difference in hauling it
24	somewhere else? Is that still the case? Can you still
25	haul outside of the county for that kind of rate?
26	I'm not sure we have enough information today, data,
27	unless somebody has that and can pull it up for me. Of
28	course, I know we have a meeting next Tuesday, if we

1	decide
2	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Two weeks.
3	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: That's
4	all
5	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
6	Two weeks.
7	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Oh, two
8	weeks. Excuse me. Two weeks.
9	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
10	Yeah.
11	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Mr. Chairman.
12	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Excuse me.
13	Fifth Tuesday.
14	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Mr. Chairman if I
15	could.
16	And this is just maybe from a layman's perspective.
17	When does FEMA get involved in rate changes? Do we
18	notify them of rate changes, or do they wait until the
19	audit?
20	It's real easy to second guess and follow behind
21	something. If you've got to call the game as it happens,
22	you see it right then. If you wait until the game is
23	over and go back and watch the film, you might do it a
24	little differently.
25	I'm a layman in this part of things. But it seem
26	that if we felt justified in changing the rate, then all
27	we have to do, based on the audit And I've dealt with
28	a few audits over my career as well.

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1	And sometimes auditors comes in with an objective.
2	Sometimes they come in with a clear, open mind. Either
3	way, if you're doing it right or doing it the way you
4	think it's right, then you shouldn't be concerned about
5	what they, quote, find.
6	Now, did they have a finding, or are they
7	criticizing our rate? The fact that we've got two rates,
8	how long was that second rate to last? Did we say?
9	Because
10	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
11	Uh-huh. (Indicates affirmatively.)
12	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: There
13	was
14	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: at the time we
15	didn't know how long
16	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
17	Six months.
18	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: This was
19	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
20	Six months.
21	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: a
22	six-month period. But I guess why was it extended?
23	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: How was it
24	extended?
25	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: How was it
26	extended?
27	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Should it have
28	been extended?

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1	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Right.
2	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Was it legal to
3	extend? I mean, these are the kind of questions
4	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: It's just
5	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: that you have
6	to
7	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: so
8	much that's happened
9	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Oh, yeah.
10	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: in
11	the last eight or nine years, whatever
12	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Oh, sure.
13	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: this was
14	going on.
15	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Oh, sure.
16	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: And
17	I I want to make sure how My data and my facts, I
18	know y'all are getting tired of me saying that.
19	COMMISSIONER TUCKER DORSEY: I'm the same way.
20	I'm the same way.
21	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: It's just my
22	analytical nature.
23	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: And I'm not about
24	pleasing somebody sitting in Atlanta or Washington or
25	someplace like that, that feels like they've justified
26	their compensation. I'm concerned about how our people
27	on the ground and the people on the frontline and the
28	people that have to deal with this stuff

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1	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Well, I can
2	see a gut instinct of, okay, if everybody else is paying
3	the higher rate, and they come through I understand
4	that there's two hundred (200) and something customers.
5	This only represents a small fraction of the customers,
6	but it's forty percent (40%) of the business. Well, I
7	don't know why there's such a big difference between
8	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Yeah.
9	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: what
10	these guys were paying and what these guys were paying.
11	Because even if you're the other sixty percent (60%),
12	that's not fair to them, either.
13	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: That's right.
14	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: So is the
15	is the higher rate fair? That's really where I'm at. I
16	don't know I understand the operation.
17	Maybe, Terri, you do you have and input on that now?
18	MS. TERRI GRAHAM: Um
19	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Other
20	than I know okay. Go ahead.
21	MS. TERRI GRAHAM: So I did reach out to the
22	landfills across the bay That was the question you had
23	before to see what their rates were. And they are
24	three dollars (\$3), three twenty-five (\$3.25) and three
25	fifty (\$3.50). Now, if they're getting volume discounts
26	or something like that, I don't I don't know. So two
27	seventy-five (\$2.75) is lower
28	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Lower

1	than
2	MS. TERRI GRAHAM: than
3	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Currently.
4	MS. TERRI GRAHAM: what they currently.
5	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: And
6	there's no contract incentives, like what we threw out in
7	2011?
8	MS. TERRI GRAHAM: Right.
9	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Okay.
10	MS. TERRI GRAHAM: Now, as far as the the
11	cost, it is low. It is a little bit. What it's costing
12	us to do, two seventy-five (\$2.75) is not is not
13	really covering that.
14	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Okay. That
15	was another question. I didn't want to get into a
16	situation like with BRATS where we were not We won't
17	go there but, you know, where we were footing part of
18	the bill for something that the customer should have
19	about footing, the taxpayers to be paying for a portion
20	of that.
21	So I'm just kind of rocking on. That's a huge gap
22	between what everyone is paying, what the contracts
23	that we need to figure out where the best price is for
24	everybody, instead of it just saying, we're just going up
25	on everybody, and we're scared to death of FEMA.
26	That's not how life I like to live. But I want to
27	have a justification for it. But if you guys have
28	anymore questions, or if there's people here from the

1

2 MS. KIM CREECH: I -- I can try to answer the 3 question. FEMA -- FEMA is going to look, when it comes 4 to an audit, after the fact. It's after the fact. And 5 what needs to happen is one rate, not that you, you know -- if you're going to post a lower rate -- you --6 7 you need to have one rate. Because they are going to go and look at the -- the lower rate. So that would be --8 9 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: So that question is badder [sic] than if we find --10 11 MS. KIM CREECH: Yeah. COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Okay. 12 13 COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Mr. Chairman --COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Either the 14 15 higher rate or somewhere in between. COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: -- if I could. 16 17 We had a rate. Then we had an emergency situation, and we created a second one. Then it was for six months. 18 19 And for whatever reason, we didn't address that question. 20 Now, are we talking about raising this rate, or --21 because there are two different rates. 22 I'm about options. I want to know what the County's 23 options are. And, more importantly, I want to know what 24 the options are for the people that deal with this on a 25 day-to-day basis. 26 What are their options? What are our options as a 27 County? And then that's the way, to me, you get 28 consistency and agreement about where to move forward.

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1	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: And I can help you on
2	that.
3	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: All right.
4	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: Correct me if I'm
5	wrong. The setting of the rate is the discretion of the
6	County Commission. You decide what the rate is, based on
7	information that you're provided.
8	And so if you determine that all rates should be
9	lowered, based on the information that you have, that's
10	your discretion. If you determine they should be raised
11	or in the middle, that's also in your discretion. It's
12	your authority. And
13	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Part
14	Mr. Chairman, if I could.
15	Part of our option is to know how was this original
16	rate in place? What was it based on? It's just like a
17	gallon of gas or a postage stamp or a quart of milk. The
18	price varies over time. And you need to have it
19	contemporary, but not trying to chase something that's
20	out in the future somewhere.
21	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: And the two the two
22	inquiries that FEMA would look at that she's touched on
23	is, one, whatever rate you set, is it reasonable? They
24	would come back in and do research.
25	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: You've got to
26	justify it.
27	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: And the second one is
28	they're going to want to know why you're not giving them

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1	the lowest published rate. So those are the two kind of
2	things you need to look at. But the ultimate decision of
3	that is you-all.
4	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Okay.
5	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: So they
6	would question a four fifty (\$4.50) rate, regardless of
7	who's paying it, you know, if that's our one established
8	rate.
9	Did you have any idea on anything other than just
10	raising it all to four fifty (\$4.50)?
11	MS. TERRI GRAHAM: I the reason I said
12	abolish the cubic yard rate altogether is because four
13	fifty (\$4.50) is too much for them to pay. It it
14	it would have cost them more.
15	So when I looked at And I actually looked at
16	every customer, what they would have if they had paid
17	four fifty (\$4.50) versus eighteen dollars (\$18) a ton,
18	it was going to be cheaper for them across the board to
19	pay eighteen dollars (\$18) a ton.
20	That's why I said the only time we would have four
21	fifty (\$4.50) would be in that storm event, because I
22	didn't I didn't think they would take that option,
23	because it would have been more expensive for them, based
24	on what they actually weighed.
25	Because, right now, when they come into the
26	landfill, they're still having to weigh. Our permits are
27	by the ton. So every truck that comes in, they are
28	weighed. So I know I know what they're I know what

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1	they would have paid us by the ton. And that's why I
2	said no no yardage rate unless it was during a storm
3	event.
4	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Is there a
5	way that we can see that information of how you
6	calculated that to show
7	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
8	Yeah. We can get you can get that information, yeah,
9	because it's all in
10	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: I honestly
11	feel like that we're in a situation right now that we
12	just don't have quite enough information. But I I
13	we've got people here, so
14	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: That's what I'm
15	interested in hearing, is
16	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
17	Well
18	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: people dealing
19	with this every day.
20	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Yeah.
21	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
22	If you go back to 2011, you'll see where they the
23	Solid Waste took money out of its pocket and reallocated
24	fifty-five thousand dollars (\$55,000) from
25	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Fifty-five
26	thousand (\$55,000).
27	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
28	Yeah. So, I mean, I don't think it's been have y'all

51 BALDWIN COUNTY COMMISSION WORK SESSION 01/22/2019 1 still been reallocating that money? I don't think so. MS. TERRI GRAHAM: No. 2 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 3 No. So, you know --4 5 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Business is a little better now. 6 7 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 8 It is. It is. It is what it is. I mean, you know, you 9 see where it was being allocated to make up for that loss for the -- for the landfill. Because this money came out 10 11 of the Solid Waste fund. MS. TERRI GRAHAM: This came out of fund 12 13 balance. COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 14 Fund balance. 15 MS. TERRI GRAHAM: And I think it's just 16 looking at it different -- at it differently. We don't 17 18 separate the garbage versus the C and D. It's all one 19 bucket. 20 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 21 All one bucket. 22 MS. TERRI GRAHAM: But I did want to --23 Commissioner Davis asked about the dates. 24 COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Uh-huh. 25 (Indicates affirmatively.) 26 MS. TERRI GRAHAM: So they approved it in October of 2011. We revisited it in March of 2012 to 27 28 extend it. And we extended it until September of that

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1	year. And on $9/4/12$, they took the option to extend it
2	again. And then during the budget, they took in 9 of
3	2012, they did it for a year that time.
4	So then at the budget deliberations for that year,
5	on September of 2013, we made it part of the rate, rate
6	schedule. And in the minutes it says until the
7	Commission decides to do something different.
8	So that's how it transpired over time. I just
9	wanted to answer that question.
10	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
11	Okay. I know we've got all these folks here. Any of
12	y'all want to start? Anybody want to start off
13	discussing it?
14	(An audience member indicates.)
15	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
16	All right. Please state your name so the reporter knows
17	who you are.
18	MR. MICHAEL MCRANEY: Michael McRaney. I'm the
19	owner of Big Red Container. Appreciate the opportunity
20	to speak.
21	I hear everything, you know, that's being said.
22	And, again, I want to thank you for what you said about
23	let's worry about us.
24	But the key to this, the key to this is that we
25	can't go to a per-ton, because I can't quote my customer.
26	My customer can't budget based on an unknown. If he has
27	a flat rate, regardless of whether you choose to go up a
28	little bit We we could probably accept that, if

1	that be the case.
2	But the fact remains is I I just went through
3	yesterday, and every ticket that I've gone across the
4	scales this month, over eighty (80) tickets so far this
5	month, probably sixty (60%) to seventy percent (70%) of
6	those are below eighteen (\$18) a ton.
7	So I'm paying you more One ticket I was paying
8	fifty-five dollars (\$55) a ton. Another one I may be
9	paying a little less. The balance the average is
10	there at our rate now.
11	If you choose to go up a quarter (\$.25) or fifty
12	cents (\$0.50) or whatever, we could possible live with
13	that. But the bottom line is our customer cannot work
14	off an unknown.
15	Homebuilders, I've got a flat rate for my customers.
16	Well, all of a sudden, you know, they have a container
17	that weighs twenty (20) tons, and I've got to charge that
18	them that difference. I can't eat it.
19	It's not going to work. The bottom line is common
20	sense. The contractors can't absorb that unknown going
21	into every job. It's going to be accounting nightmare
22	for all of us. It it just Again, we can't operate.
23	I can't quote anybody if they call me on the phone. I
24	can't quote them. I have no idea what it's going to
25	weigh.
26	Most of our loads, like I said, y'all are making
27	money at the current two seventy-five (\$2.75) on sixty
28	(60%), seventy percent (70%) of my tickets. I can show

1	you.
2	That's fine. I can accept that, because it does
3	balance out. But, again, we've got so have a flat rate
4	so that we can operate, the contractors know what to
5	expect.
6	And that's really our argument. It's hard for me to
7	believe that you know, I know what I paid the Baldwin
8	County Landfill last year, just me. And there's a lot of
9	people in this room that paid probably more than I did.
10	It's just hard to justify this large of an increase
11	overall for us to be able to function. And, like I said,
12	I've run the numbers. I I know. And it's I'm
13	paying much more on some tickets, which is fine.
14	But we've got to have a flat rate. I've got to know
15	what my cost is, period. If I don't, I'm I'm
16	I'm I mean, I'm in trouble. And our customers are not
17	going to know how to do it. And I will be glad to answer
18	any questions based on that.
19	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
20	Commissioners?
21	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Well, you
22	said you could answer questions. If if you were not
23	hauling to Baldwin County, would you haul to Mobile?
24	MR. MICHAEL MCRANEY: Absolutely. To make a
25	living?
26	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: But I'm
27	just saying
28	MR. MICHAEL MCRANEY: Yes, ma'am.

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1	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: the
2	rates, she said they were three dollars (\$3) or
3	something. So it's more
4	MR. MICHAEL MCRANEY: Well
5	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: to
6	take it to Mobile?
7	MR. MICHAEL MCRANEY: trust me. I can
8	negotiate with those guys. If I start hauling directly
9	to them, I can get a deal.
10	My point is we're a local Baldwin County company
11	trying to survive, make a living. Yes, the
12	homebuilder If you think about this segment of the
13	market right now, it's huge. It's probably the number
14	one economic boost in this county right now is
15	homebuilders and what's going on around it, construction.
16	But if I have to try to make a living based on what y'all
17	change, of course, I'll go to Mobile.
18	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: I'm just
19	trying to get information.
20	MR. MICHAEL MCRANEY: I understand. But if I
21	have to, that's my point. I don't want to be forced to
22	do that. That is going to be a nightmare itself. But if
23	we have to do that, again
24	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: You would.
25	MR. MICHAEL MCRANEY: I would. I would
26	consider it. I would have to.
27	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Thank you.
28	MR. MICHAEL MCRANEY: Yes, ma'am.

1	MR. BRIAN ARMSTRONG: I'm Brian Armstrong. I'm
1	
2	the third Vice-President of the Baldwin County
3	Homebuilders Association. And I just wanted to let y'all
4	know we're, you know, not for increasing these guys'
5	prices. We depend on them to provide us a service. It
6	passes on to all to consumers here.
7	So if we raise the taxes, basically, if we raise
8	taxes on those guys and on the community, it's going to
9	have a bad effect, you know, for us to be able to
10	estimate the houses.
11	Prices are going up. We've got to have consistent
12	pricing so that we know exactly what we can put in our
13	budgets for the customers.
14	So one question I have is how much money is the dump
15	losing? Is it not being profitable? Is there a reason
16	that we have to go up on the prices? Thank you.
17	MR. GRANT RISH: Grant Rish with 68 Ventures
18	and Truland Homes. I'll be short. You know, we need a
19	flat rate for us. There's no way for us to budget at
20	all. And it's an accounting nightmare for us to change,
21	going away from the flat flat rate.
22	MR. RUSTY WALTMAN: Rusty Waltman, Alabama
23	Container. You know, I had just a discussion with Ed in
24	August. And it wasn't about money, he said. It was
25	about making an equal playing field for the people doing
26	demolitions.
27	Well, if you look at people coming in here doing
28	demolitions, they don't dump every day. You see them

1	once a year, maybe two or three times a year. We dump
2	
	every day.
3	And this helps us, a cubic yard, like he was saying
4	and Mike was saying, so we can quote our customers. And
5	if it's not about money, I'm in the same boat as Michael.
6	You know, we have to consider making a living.
7	We might have to take it somewhere else. We don't
8	want to. But, again, you know, if it's not about money,
9	why are we doing it? Because I'm like Michael. I bring
10	in a lot more light loads than heavier load. And, Terri,
11	that's what she's saying.
12	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Thank you.
13	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
14	Okay.
15	MR. ALLEN WADE: I'm Allen Wade with West
16	Waste. I agree with those other guys. I basically do
17	the same things they do.
18	There is no way anybody in this room if you called
19	on the phone and called my office and said, look, I need
20	to get a thirty (30) yard container delivered to my
21	house Let's say COD customers. Let's not say, for
22	instance, Truland or Horton or any of these guys.
23	You've got to see it across the board. Even a COD
24	customer, anybody that comes in, that's called you up on
25	the phone and said, I need to get a thirty (30) yard
26	delivered dump dumpster delivered to my house, we, any
27	of us, cannot quote a price without knowing a certain
28	yardage price.

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1	You can't you can't quote a price over the
2	telephone on a project. You've got to have a set fee so
3	you know what to quote. There is no way to quote it.
4	There's no way in the world to price it, so you need a
5	set rate. And I'm like these guys. I haul way more
6	light loads than I do heavy loads.
7	MR. ROBERT RADCLIFF: I'm Bobby with Benchmark
8	Homes. I've been listening. I've never been here
9	before. But so far I've heard that we've done this since
10	2009, and y'all have been redoing it. It's going through
11	FEMA and everything else.
12	I don't hear where it's broke. I don't see where
13	the system is broke. I don't see where the dump is
14	losing money. I don't see why we're doing this just to
15	be doing it for FEMA if we're not having any trouble with
16	FEMA. It sounds like we're running scared from FEMA.
17	Since 2009, there hasn't been an issue with FEMA that
18	anyone has said; is that correct?
19	MS. TERRI GRAHAM: We haven't
20	MR. ROBERT RADCLIFF: Have we had an issue with
21	FEMA?
22	MS. TERRI GRAHAM: So in that time, any any
23	FEMA event we've had, Baldwin County Solid Waste, we've
24	handled it ourselves. And we ran everything across the
25	scale, so the yardage didn't come into play.
26	MR. ROBERT RADCLIFF: So we're not really
27	worried about FEMA at this point in time. We just
28	looking for the future that we might be have to be

1	worried about FEMA.
2	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: Just just so the
3	discussion is in the right place, I mean, we're Mexico
4	Beach, Panama City, all of those are dealing with those
5	issues now. We've just been blessed by God that we
6	haven't had a hurricane like Hurricane Ivan since 2004.
7	What's got to be in place is the proper procedures
8	for when that storm does happen. And that's what they're
9	trying to address and make sure whatever we're doing is
10	in compliance.
11	So when the storm hits, we're not trying to back up,
12	change rate, tell FEMA why we're changing rates now, why
13	the rate was good then, but it's not good now. Because
14	then it looks like on it's on the surface that we're
15	trying to stick it to the Government by raising rates.
16	So they're just trying to get everything straight and
17	right, whether it's raising it or lower it or whatever
18	this is.
19	MR. ROBERT RADCLIFF: But right now, the dump
20	is not losing any money; is that correct?
21	MS. TERRI GRAHAM: No, sir.
22	MR. ROBERT RADCLIFF: And if we were hit with
23	FEMA I mean, with a hurricane or whatever, would we be
24	losing any money taking in what we're taking in at the
25	present rate?
26	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
27	Yes.
28	MR. ROBERT RADCLIFF: And do we have a value on

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1	that or an estimate based on some other information?
2	MS. TERRI GRAHAM: I think the question is
3	is is the landfill okay with the rate that we have
4	established. And you've got to understand that the
5	garbage customers are in that, too.
6	So is it that the garbage is kind of making up for
7	what we're not charging on the C and D? And that's kind
8	are where where we're at.
9	MR. ROBERT RADCLIFF: Okay. Next question:
10	Right now we're we're doing fine. We you implement
11	it. You go up on your prices. Where does that money go
12	for the difference?
13	Because you're going to be making a profit now.
14	We're over what you're doing now until we get hit by a
15	hurricane. So where is that additional income to the
16	dump going to be going?
17	MS. TERRI GRAHAM: It would go to the fund
18	balance.
19	MR. ROBERT RADCLIFF: And stay there until
20	something bad happens; is that correct?
21	MS. KIM CREECH: Well, it it replenishes the
22	equipment.
23	MR. ROBERT RADCLIFF: You've already got all
24	that with what you're doing now if you're not operating
25	at a loss.
26	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: It stays
27	it stays at the landfill. It doesn't go anywhere in the
28	County.

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1	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
2	It can't go anywhere else.
3	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: It
4	can't go. It can't go. And they don't receive money
5	from the rest of the County, either. It's a proprietary
6	type government function, kind of different than any
7	other it's not like Highway or
8	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
9	It's about like y'all. It's about like y'all's business.
10	It's stays
11	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: It's
12	more like a
13	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
14	All that money stays at that at that facility. The
15	County Commission cannot spend any of that money on
16	anything else other than the landfill for cover or
17	whatever, you know, if we have to buy material.
18	All that money stays in. It's proprietary. It's
19	just like a private business, expect it's, you know
20	it's managed by the County.
21	MR. ROBERT RADCLIFF: But, now, all things
22	being said, everything is paying for itself without an
23	increase?
24	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
25	As far as I know, yes.
26	MS. TERRI GRAHAM: Yes, it is paying for
27	itself, but there are, you know, pollution insurance and
28	things like that. We we are self-insured for those

1	type situations.
2	MR. ROBERT RADCLIFF: So, once again,
3	everything's good right now. We're preparing for the
4	future and worried about the FEMA situation in a
5	hurricane. We don't know where that's coming from, but
6	we want to go up on our rate, just like any other
7	business would, and have a cash flow difference, a
8	savings for a bad day; is that correct?
9	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: I want to add one more
10	component to that to make sure everybody's on the same
11	page. Because a component of that rate and where that
12	money goes is not to buy the gas in the trucks today, to
13	bring it across to pay for salaries.
14	It's also for monitoring and closing those
15	facilities in the future, wrapping them up, well
16	monitoring, all of those things that will go into
17	perpetuity once those particular landfills are closed.
18	And we have some of those that are closed now that
19	continue now, that continue to monitor that are not
20	generating money. And so some component of that is
21	has to be for future costs to address those closures and
22	openings and things.
23	So I don't want to Yes, you're right. All of
24	those things And the Commission is right. The profit
25	needs to be looked at or just covering costs and expenses
26	where you are. But you don't need to oversimplify what
27	that cost is. It's more than just filling the gas and
28	the trucks today and covering that in.

1	MD DODEDT DADCITES, Okay
1	MR. ROBERT RADCLIFF: Okay.
2	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
3	And that it was one other thing, too, that I think,
4	you know, not looking at we have a contract for our
5	debris removal. And it's stated at a price of, what,
6	four-something a cubic yard?
7	MS. TERRI GRAHAM: Four fifty (\$4.50) a yard.
8	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
9	Four fifty (\$4.50) a cubic yard, so that's what the
10	County has to pay. Like if you were hauling it, that's
11	what we'd have to pay you. But then you turn around, and
12	you're paying two seventy-five (\$2.75) to dump it there.
13	MR. RUSTY WALTMAN: If we're hauling
14	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
15	If you're if you're hauling for for for FEMA
16	MR. RUSTY WALTMAN: We don't you won't
17	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
18	But I'm but I'm saying we still have to pay that
19	contractor four dollars and fifty cents (\$4.50) to bring
20	it there.
21	MR. RUSTY WALTMAN: Uh-huh. (Indicates
22	affirmatively.)
23	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
24	And we're going to get back from the Federal Government
25	two dollars and seventy-five cents (\$2.75). That's
26	what that's what the rate is going to be.
27	That's what we're going to We're having to pay
28	for it out of this end, and this much is what's you

1	know, we're going on receive back.
2	That will be a there will be a loss there. And
3	
	that's what we were just trying to protect in the future
4	of something happening.
5	Because we seen what happened in Mexico Beach and
6	Panama City when we went down there. When I went down
7	there, they had removed over six million (6,000,000)
8	cubic yard of debris.
9	MR. ROBERT RADCLIFF: And the Federal
10	Government assisted in that; correct?
11	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
12	Huh?
13	MR. ROBERT RADCLIFF: And the Federal
14	Government assisted in that, per my understanding
15	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
16	Well, I don't think they assisted.
17	MR. ROBERT RADCLIFF: it was not all on the
18	County.
19	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
20	When it comes in that Yes, it is. When it comes into
21	that landfill, yes, that's the part it pays. Yes, they
22	pay a certain part, but, you know, it still the County
23	still has to write a check for every load for that, when
24	they pay that contractor.
25	MR. RUSTY WALTMAN: If I'm hauling for FEMA, I
26	don't charge it on my account. I'm
27	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
28	But

RUSTY WALTMAN: So can you not --6 MR. GRANT RISH: Can you not get that rate with 7 FEMA? COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 8 9 No, no. MR. GRANT RISH: Gulf County is not negotiating 10 11 that rate right now? COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 12 13 With FEMA? MR. GRANT RISH: Yeah. 14 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 15 No. You can't. It's -- it's what we charge our 16 17 customers, that's the rate they go by. 18 MR. ROBERT RADCLIFF: One more question. So 19 how much are we putting away every year now that we're 20 breaking even for that rainy day fund? 21 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 22 I don't --23 MR. ROBERT RADCLIFF: Is there an amount? 24 MS. TERRI GRAHAM: There's closure and 25 postclosure. It's based on the -- what goes into the 26 line cell for that year. 2	have another liability accrual that we do, too.

6	a that's language in the code section where you have
7	to account for so much. And that's we don't control
8	that. You have to so much you have to maintain the
9	landfill for thirty (30) years after after it's
10	closed. So, I mean, that's that's kind of set. So
11	it's just based off what our tonnage is for that year.
12	MR. RUSTY WALTMAN: And the other thing, you
13	know, where else can we go dump, unless we take it out of
14	the county? Because y'all it's the only place
15	we've got in Baldwin County is Baldwin County Solid
16	Waste. There is no privatized. In Mobile, there's five
17	or six privatized C and D pits in Mobile.
18	AN AUDIENCE MEMBER: How much is currently in
19	the Solid Waste fund?
20	THE COURT REPORTER: I don't know who he is. I
21	don't know your name.
22	MR. RICHARD CHATHAM: Richard Chatham.
23	THE COURT REPORTER: Thank you.
24	MS. TERRI GRAHAM: I'll have to pull that up.
25	I don't know what the number is today.
26	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
27	Well, I think what we're trying trying to look at is
28	establishing a rate for everyone. I mean, it's, you

9	I'm not in a position right now, based on what I
10	know about this, to feel comfortable in I'd like to
11	know where we are, where we're going, and who gets
12	involved in getting us there.
13	And us making it hard on y'all to do your business
14	is not what's it's about. We need to all be working
15	toward on this. I need some more hard information, not
16	just opinions, not just thoughts, not just what-ifs.
17	But how how much reserves have we had over the
18	last five or six years? Why do we think we need more? I
19	mean, we've all Just like it's your house. You've got
20	to plan on your air conditioning going out. You've got
21	to plan on our roof needing replacing.
22	I'm talking to the choir here. I've got In order
23	for me to make a decision about rates, other than leaving
24	them right where they are, is I've got to see why we feel
25	like we need more money, either now or into the future,
26	and what is it based on. Thank you.

28	Okay.

2	that we need more information. And I'm sorry that it's

27	information in front of me. And if I can't get that
28	concrete information in front of me, I cannot make a

1	conscious decision.
2	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
3	Okay.
4	MS. KIM CREECH: I will answer
5	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
6	Anybody else?
7	MS. KIM CREECH: the the fund the fund
8	balance the question that he asked for: Sixteen, five

23	here, we're going to be up at the courthouse trying to
24	collect our money.
25	MR. RUSTY WALTMAN: Right.
26	MR. MICHAEL MCRANEY: They're not going to
27	understand.
28	MR. ALLEN WADE: You know, they're just not

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1	going to understand that. You know, you've got to
2	have regardless of what you do with the rates, you're
3	going to have to have flat rates to be able to budget.
4	That way Truland can budget, Horton can budget, all these
5	homebuilders
6	MR. RUSTY WALTMAN: Adams can budget.
7	MR. ALLEN WADE: Adams can budget, you know.
8	And, I mean, because there's just no other way to do it
9	to where you can budget.
10	MR. GRANT RISH: I mean, we've got some smaller
11	contractors that's
12	MR. STEVE JONES: I'm a smaller contractor.
13	I'm Steve Jones, Steve Jones Contractor. And this I
14	build ten (10), twelve (12) houses a year. And there's
15	no way I can go to the customer and tell her or him that
16	you've got an eleven hundred dollar (\$1,100) dump bill.
17	When I budget out what I budget out for each house,
18	I've got to be able to tell them a certain amount that
19	it's going to cost. Because it takes me three or four
20	containers to build one medium-sized house. For a large

And we --6 7 when somebody files for Social Security, this is when --8 I was doing this and put a lot of stuff in place. Now 9 Terri -- Terri does it. But we look at bank statements. We look and we do 10 11 find people that apply and say, I have Social Security, but you'll find a retirement check coming from RSA, or 12 13 it'll be something small, but that, you know -- that --14 any other income is going to reject them. And that's ones you're probably seeing on the rejection list. 15 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: That's fine. 16 I -- I'm not -- I'm not questioning that. I was just 17 like that looked weird to have. 18 MS. TERRI GRAHAM: Commissioner Davis. 19 COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Yes, ma'am. 20 21 MS. TERRI GRAHAM: It's a State form that we 22 use for the --23 COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Okay. 24 MS. TERRI GRAHAM: It's an ADPH form that they 25 submit. And so if -- if a customer didn't put their full 26 Social Security number, that's not -- that's not a 27 requirement that they give it to me. I probably already 28 have it.

7	it's it's not we already know they're firemen.
8	They've got a helmet and a suit on.

11	main purpose is to help that.
12	But, no, it will be they they do use them on a
13	daily basis and have their ID's. A lot of them use their
14	cards. It's a two-part identification. So when they
15	check in, when they report in one of those A lot of
16	them use a metal tag system to hang in the truck. It's a
17	safety thing they use when they go to a fire. One stays
18	in the truck, one
19	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: So do you
20	think it would be a problem charging a very nominal fee
21	like maybe two dollars (\$2) a card? Do you think the
22	firemen would
23	MR. JESSIE PEACOCK: I don't
24	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Do you
25	think they would like
26	MR. JESSIE PEACOCK: I don't think so. I'd

2	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
3	Mine was ninety (\$90,000) to one hundred (\$100,000).
4	MR. JOEY NUNNALLY: Ninety (\$90,000) to a
5	hundred (\$100,000)?
6	MR. CLIFF MCCOLLUM: The Price is Right.
7	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: I'm going on the
8	high/low side.
9	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: You must
10	have been in a high-altitude situation.
11	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Thirty-seven
12	thousand (37,000). My ears still aren't right.
13	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Still
14	popping?
15	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: That's my excuse
16	today anyway.
17	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: Fifty-seven cents
18	(\$0.57).
19	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: All right. Throw
20	out the high, throw out the low, so we're looking at
21	COMMISSION MEMBER JEB BALL: So we're looking
22	at eighty-five (\$85,000) to one hundred (\$100,000), it
23	looks like.
24	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Bingo.
25	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: All right.
26	Something like that. That encompasses all of them,
27	except mine, which is good.
28	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Well, the hundred

1	(\$100,000) Yeah, that will work.
2	MR. JOEY NUNNALLY: So eighty-five (\$85,000) to
3	one hundred (\$100,000)?
4	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Easy-peasy.

6	Okay.
7	COMMISSION MEMBER JEB BALL: So that's

10	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: So, Ron,

23	couple of the positions, like It's to make sure we
24	explain in how our county is governed a little bit.
25	But here is something. I'll just read it. Like
26	Personnel Director, this is this is just an
27	introduction and then what you have; okay.
28	Baldwin County, Alabama is a coastal county

1	located on the Northern Gulf Coast between
2	Mobile, Alabama and Pensacola, Florida. The
3	2018 estimated population is approximately
4	212
5	I don't know if that number is exactly right.
6	212,000. The county is the fastest growing
7	county in Alabama and contains the eighth
8	fastest growing metropolitan area in the
9	nation.
10	The county has abundance in diverse
11	natural resources from the white, sandy beaches
12	on the coast to the bay breezes along Perdido
13	Bay, sunset views along Mobile Bay, rolling
14	fields in Central Baldwin, and many rivers and
15	creeks filled with wildlife in North Baldwin
16	County county.
17	With a positive economic climate coupled
18	with a superior quality of life, Baldwin County
19	is the best place to live along the Gulf Coast.
20	The county is governed by a four-member
21	County Commission elected at large every four
22	years. Personnel Director position is an
23	appointed position reporting directly to the
24	Baldwin County Commission through an employment
25	contract.
26	The successful candidate must have a high
27	level of integrity, professionalism, and strong
28	leadership. They must also be a critical
I

1	thinker with the ability to make second
2	sound decisions through identifying and
3	understanding complex problems and concepts
4	using strategic and innovative methods to solve
5	problems.
6	And then add what you already had. Now, on the EMA,
7	I won't read the first paragraph, because it's the same.
8	The second is starts out with:
9	The county is governed by a four-member County
10	Commission elected at large every four years.
11	The Emergency Management Director position is
12	an appointed position reporting directly to the
13	Baldwin County Commission through an employment
14	contract.
15	It's basically the same thing, but it says:
16	The county's coastal location makes it
17	susceptible to many natural disasters, with
18	tropical storms and hurricanes being the most
19	frequent disaster the county faces. Experience
20	in hurricane preparedness and response is very
21	desirable and a critical component of this
22	position.
23	So I'm also working on one for the Administrator,
24	but I thought that was so important, through my
25	research You guys that have been here. You've been
26	here, you done that, you know how it works.
27	Everybody else doesn't know how it works. And I
28	don't want to get somebody I don't want to get
-	

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1	somebody here in here thinking or even making the trip
2	here, if it takes that, not understanding that they
3	may be Administrator somewhere and be king of the king
4	of the hill. And it ain't going to be that way here,
5	particularly with the organizational structure. That
6	might be a little
7	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
8	And I think it's
9	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD:
10	extreme example that I just used there, but

12	I think it also in there it needs to also state it's
13	for a it's a four-year contract.
14	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Yeah, I

18	true.
19	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: was going to
20	say, the first time you read something, I didn't pick up

22	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
23	It needs to be
24	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: four years.
25	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: I can make a
26	copy of this and let y'all read it.
27	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: It sounded good.
28	The only thing I'm like the Chairman. I didn't pick

2 but it also didn't say it was a four-year. So we need to make sure of that. 3 4 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Okay. 5 Because it says it's a contracted position. So we need to understand that it is a four-year contracted position, 6 7 maybe, that runs concurrently with the -- that you report directly to the elected officials is stated in there. 8 9 So I just want to be clear to these people who are applying. I don't know. Because it's been a while since 10 11 there's been any of these types of interviews. I don't 12 really know what to go by. 13 I think that's why the guidance has been requested. 14 And so I've been trying to seek guidance on my own and hope that you guys -- Look, by no means am I trying to 15 16 push my viewpoints on anyone else. 17 COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: No, no. COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: 18 I'm 19 trying to add to this. And I -- I can give you a copy of this. 20 21 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 22 If you want to do that. 23 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: But I want 24 to add -- I've got maybe the second paragraph for 25 Administrator. I can follow that up with you by tomorrow --26 27 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 28 Okay. That'll be fine.

someone needs to do their homework before they come here.

their ears a little bit. COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: I think so COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Sure. COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: And, you know, I'm just MS. 19	Q-8 - BALDWIN COUNTY COMMISSION POLICY #2.9 - OFFICIAL AND
20	EMPLOYEE COUNTY OWNED CAR POLICY
21	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
22	Next is the Q-8.
23	MR. RON CINK: Yes, sir. The take-home vehicle
24	policy. It's actually more than take home. It's the
25	County vehicle policy.
26	There's been some discussion amongst the
27	Commissioners regarding changing this policy. And I've
28	sent I know I've sent Commissioner Underwood a good
Zδ	sent i know i ve sent commissioner underwood a good

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1	bit of Attorney General's opinions. And I'll be glad to
2	forward those on to you.
3	There is there is Ethics Commission opinions
4	associated with this one as well. I think the biggest
5	thing that I heard out of the Commissioners is probably
6	the second sentence: Individuals who are who are
7	issued a County car shall not use the assigned vehicle
8	for personal use.
9	This is some discussion associated what is known
10	de minimis use; and that being the ability to stop on
11	the to and from destinations as well as some
12	discussions about allowing a spouse to ride with a County
13	employee.
14	We addressed some of that through the insurance. So
15	I will be glad to answer any of your questions or
16	comments regarding what you folks want to do with this.
17	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: Commissioners, there's
18	basically three Attorney General's opinions that we were
19	able to find. One related to the Coroner's use of a
20	vehicle. I believe it was Perry County Commission,
21	allowing him to use the vehicle to go to a personal job
22	in another county.
23	And because he was on call and it was necessary that
24	he have this job, the Attorney General basically said
25	that's more of an Ethics Commission decision and a
26	decision of Perry County Commission as to the validity of
27	the public purpose in doing that.
28	So they found And then the Ethics Commission

1	issued an order saying that as long as there was a
2	written policy or agreement that was regulated, that the
3	County Commission could approve of that authority of that
4	minimum public personal use of that vehicle to because
5	of the benefit and purpose of having the vehicle and not
6	having to go back and change.
7	There was also a case involving Wilcox County School
8	Board where Wilcox County School Board was taken over by
9	the State. They hired a Superintendant that lived over
10	in Opp, Alabama.
11	And they authorized him to drive his business
12	vehicle, County vehicle, back and forth to Opp, Alabama,
13	and to take care of issues while he was in route and
14	those kind of things.
15	Once we got back to Opp and was made available to
16	his own personal vehicle, however, he had to use his own
17	once he got there.
18	Another example had to do with Let's see
19	Generally, there's one other one, generally the same a
20	Water Board employee being able to go
21	MR. RON CINK: Drop the kids off.
22	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: drop the kids off at
23	school. All of these, however, were basically in route,
24	de minimis use, as Ron mentioned the word, minimal use
25	incidental to what's happening, those kind of things.
26	And so as Ron stated, in the Commission policy that
27	you have, the language is clear. It cannot be used for
28	personal use, period. So there would need to be a

1	revision of this to allow for what level of personal use
2	you would allow to be done.
3	Certainly, County Commissioners, being salaried, and
4	employees are different. It's one thing for an employee
5	to use a personal to use a vehicle for personal use
6	while driving back and forth home.
7	When they're actually on their job duties and
8	they're being paid by the hour, it's different, of
9	course, in the salaried employee, because you can't use
10	your hourly time to do personal business, either.
11	So there's several checks that will have to be made
12	as it relates to that. But you would need to amend the
13	policy to allow for that type of personal use.
14	And then you-all also asked me to a prepare an
15	Attorney General's and Ethics Opinion request as it
16	relates to that. So I'm going to pass this around to
17	you. I prepared one for the Attorney General, to send to
18	the Attorney General, one to appear for the Ethics
19	Commission.
20	And tried to cover the items that I think we
21	discussed that you wanted to have questions for. So if
22	we could take just a moment and read one of these
23	letters, because they are basically the same. And if I
24	haven't covered the scenarios, then tell me what other
25	scenarios you would like to cover.
26	So I would suggest that we look at the item going to
27	the Ethics Commission. That would be the one to Tom
28	Albritton. This would be the one to Tom Albritton.

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1	Mr. Chairman, with your permission, I'll just read
2	through that together to make sure we've covered the
3	scenario; if not, we can add. It says:
4	Dear Thomas, I'm writing this letter as County
5	Attorney for Baldwin County on behalf of the
6	Baldwin County Commission.
7	The purpose of this letter is to request
8	an opinion on issues related to the use of
9	County-owned vehicles by Baldwin County
10	officials and employees.
11	First, Baldwin County Commissioners are
12	available to receive calls and requests for
13	their services related to official duties at
14	all times. And Commissioners perform work at
15	Commission offices, travel around the county,
16	and attend numerous meetings, conferences and
17	events related to the performance of their
18	official duties.
19	Baldwin County is a very large county, and
20	Commissioners and employees must often commute
21	fairly significant distances while attending
22	the County business.
23	In order to provide needed transportation,
24	Commissioners may be assigned County-owned
25	vehicles, which are used for official business,
26	and the vehicles may be taken home.
27	Due to time constraints and the
28	requirements of their official duties, it is

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1 sometimes necessary for Commissioners to take care of personal business while traveling on 2 3 official business as opposed to returning home to obtain a personal vehicle. 4 5 For example, at least one Baldwin County 6 Commissioner owns property where he runs a 7 business, his personal business, which is on the general route between the regular meeting 8 9 place in Bay Minette, Alabama and his residence, which is some distance away given 10 11 the size of Baldwin County. Under the circumstances, in order to 12 13 minimize travel time and lost productivity, a Commissioner needs to be able to attend to 14 personal business while in route on County 15 business or traveling to and from home as 16 17 opposed to taking the time and expense to drive to his or her residence and obtain a personal 18 vehicle to attend to personal business. 19 20 Additional, there are County officers and 21 employees who are assigned a County vehicle to 22 perform their official duties. And it would 23 minimize travel time and lost productivity if 24 those officials and employees could use such 25 vehicles to make interim personal stops or 26 attend to personal business so long as those stops are on the general route of travel on 27 28 County business or travel or from the office

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1	and the employee's personal residence.
2	Am I on track so far? Is there anything we need to
3	address in that paragraph?
4	(No response.)
5	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: All right.
6	Second, there are some Baldwin County employees
7	whose duties may require them to travel to
8	different parts of county to perform their job
9	duties.
10	Baldwin County has offices in several
11	locations throughout the county with some of
12	those locations being miles apart. Some
13	employees may live in one part of the county
14	and work in another. And on certain days their
15	duties will require them to travel to an
16	entirely different part of the county.
17	Some employees' residences my lie between
18	his or her assigned County office and the
19	location where the employee may be required to
20	work for the day, requiring the employee to
21	drive to the employee's permanent office, pick
22	up a County vehicle, and then backtrack to the
23	assigned job site for the day.
24	Baldwin County desires to minimize the
25	excessive employee travel and lost productivity
26	by allowing certain employees to drive
27	County-owned vehicles to and from their
28	residence when deemed necessary.

1	The next section is actually a statement of the
2	ethics rules in Section 36-25A that says:
3	No public official or public employee shall use
4	or cause to be used for his or her official
5	position or obtain personal gain for him or
6	herself or a family member.
7	And then it says:
8	Personal gain is achieved when a public
9	official converts to personal use the object of
10	such personal gain.
11	So that's the reason for asking the ethics question,
12	to make sure it's clear. Number C has the use of
13	equipment.
14	No public official or employee shall use or
15	cause to be used equipment, facilities, time,
16	materials, human labor, or other public
17	property under his or her discretion or control
18	for the private benefits or private benefit of
19	the public official, public employee, or any
20	other person or principal campaign committee as
21	defined which will materially affect his or her
22	financial interest.
23	I don't think anything that we're talking about is
24	actually materially affecting anyone's financial
25	interest. It is in effect in the cases of you-all
26	preserving and maximizing your ability to serve, stopping
27	lost productivity, or to allow you to do those things in
28	route.

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1	In the case of an employee that has to travel
2	from Let's take the north end of the county, for
3	example, to the south end of the county, pick up a County
4	vehicle and then go right back to the north end of the
5	county to do their official duties, the loss of
6	productivity and time that's there. And so here's the
7	questions that are raised in the Ethics Commission and
8	the Attorney General in the other letter:
9	May Baldwin County Commissioners use
10	County-owned and assigned vehicles to stop at
11	their personal business offices or property to
12	take care of personal business while traveling
13	on County business or traveling to and from
14	their residence as long as the stops and their
15	office visits are either on the general route
16	or require only minimum deviation to and from
17	the route?
18	Number 2:
19	May other County officials or employees use
20	County-owned or assigned vehicles to stop to
21	take care of personal business while traveling
22	on County business or traveling to and from
23	their residence as long as the stops are either
24	on the general route or require only minimal
25	deviation from the route?
26	Question 3:
27	May Baldwin County employees who are required
28	to travel to different areas around Baldwin

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1	County be authorized to drive County-owned
2	vehicles to their homes when they must travel
3	to areas of the county which are away from
4	their County-assigned office? Your assistance
5	in answering these questions will be greatly
6	appreciated. If you have any questions, let us
7	know.
8	That's an attempt to address the things I've heard
9	you-all talk about. If there's other scenarios that we
10	need to cover, or we need to ask those questions in a
11	different way, I'll be glad to do that.
12	I suggest we send one to both offices. I fully
13	expect the Attorney General to say that this is up to the
14	County Commission policy and the Ethics Commission, which
15	will be fine.
16	The only question that they would answer is whether
17	or not there's a public purpose under the law. The
18	actual use of the property by the individual employee is
19	an ethics question. But I think covering our bases by
20	sending to both is probably the safe thing to do.
21	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Do we need
22	Excuse me. Mr. Chairman, in Number 2 and maybe and 3
23	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: Okay.
24	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: where we
25	mention about minimum deviation, is there any need for us
26	to reference time in any way?
27	In other words, we're not talking about somebody
28	stopping for personal business and filing their tax

1	return or something. Are we talking about just brief
2	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: I think as it
3	relates I don't think that you ought to do that as it
4	relates to County Commissioners. I think County
5	Commissioners ought to be able to work in your schedule,
6	your day, what you have to do. Otherwise, you're wasting
7	that hour driving back and forth, thirty (30) minutes to
8	your house and back.
9	As it relates to the County employees, clearly
10	And I expect the Ethics Commission to say they can't do
11	this on their work time.
12	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Okay. That would
13	be
14	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: Because they can't
15	be they can't use their work time to do personal
16	business. So they've either got to take a leave of
17	absence; maybe do it in their lunch hour, if they're able
18	to leave work; or traveling or returning to and from the
19	office of work. So that would be a limitation on their
20	time.
21	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Right.
22	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: Other than that, I
23	think what you're talking about is maybe fifteen (15)
24	minutes, thirty (30) minutes.
25	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Yeah. We're
26	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: That may be
27	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: talking
28	about

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1	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: I think you can
2	certainly I think you-all can establish that policy,
3	if you wanted to. I'd rather them not make us do that.
4	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: I see that.
5	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: I'd rather that be a
6	discretionary thing, I think.
7	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Because our
8	current policy doesn't
9	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: Right.
10	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: reference
11	that.
12	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: Well, in one place, the
13	fleet policy Well, it does say The only exception
14	to this rule in the policy is commuting to and from one's
15	residence to workstation. So you do have that exception
16	when driving to home, which is personal. But it doesn't
17	go into other things like that.
18	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Yeah.
19	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: And if that's something
20	we need to do, we can. There are some things Here's
21	one that's in the policy:
22	Personnel that utilize a County vehicle for
23	their job during normal business hours and
24	their physical location at the conclusion of
25	the business day is closer to home than their
26	personal vehicle, then in such instances on
27	occasional basis only may drive the vehicle
28	home with approval.

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1	So there are some things that you do. And so if you
2	find that you feel like that is being abused, or for
3	public perception purposes you want to limit that time, I
4	think that's within your prerogative to do as
5	Commissioners.
6	MS. KIM CREECH: And I think in the policy
7	We've gone this in other policies we have samples of
8	how you could utilize that. So if you're going to say de
9	minimus use, you could define what you're considering as
10	an example of a de minimis use type of use.
11	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
12	I think we need to go ahead and request these, both, send
13	both of these letters to
14	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Yes, please.
15	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP)
16	GRUBER: the Attorney General and also to the Ethics
17	Commission. And let's get a let's get a a ruling
18	on it. And that way, you know

8	MR. RON CINK: Next, Mr. Chairman,
9	Commissioners, staff requests the purchase of video
10	equipment for Central Annex auditorium and authorizes
11	staff to begin begin video recording and distribution
12	of Baldwin County Planning and Zoning Commission
13	meetings.
14	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
15	Okay. Y'all got any questions on that?
16	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Consent.
17	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Consent.
18	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
19	All right. Do we have a cost?
20	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: It's in
21	there.
22	MR. RON CINK: It's seventy-two hundred dollars
23	(\$7,200).
24	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
25	Yeah. Yeah.
26	MR. RON CINK: By the way, we're going to pay
27	for that out of the cable TV tax.
28	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:

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1	Okay. That's fine.
2	MR. RON CINK: Out of reserve.
3	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
4	That's reserve? Okay.
5	MR. RON CINK: Uh-huh. (Indicates
6	affirmatively.)
7	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Good.
8	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Oh, good.
9	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
10	That's good.
11	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Good way to
12	use it.
13	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
14	Yeah. Okay.
15	
16	Q-10 - CREATION OF BALDWIN COUNTY COMMISSION MEDIA STREAMING
17	CHANNEL
18	MR. RON CINK: Let's see. Brian's got one on
19	regarding
20	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
21	Do you
22	MR. RON CINK: I'm going to let you speak,
23	Brian, please.
24	MR. BRIAN PEACOCK: Um
25	MR. RON CINK: Thank you.
	MR. BRIAN PEACOCK: I did put a little
26	
26 27	PowerPoint together so you can kind of know where we're

1	over the production of the Commission meetings.
2	At that time, we were having some audio equipment
3	issues at the time. And we had to do something, either
4	upgrade what we had in place or we had to revamp the
5	entire Commission chambers.
6	At that time, we worked with Administration and
7	decided to present the CIS Department taking over the
8	production of the Commission meetings.
9	When we make those productions, we actually go
10	through and provide that to five different cable media
11	providers, along with a Facebook Live stream that we do.
12	We didn't start the Facebook Live until July or June
13	of last year, but that's been very successful. I think
14	we our very first year, we wound up we wound up having
15	eight hundred (800) some-odd views on that. I'll get to
16	it in just a second.
17	MR. RON CINK: AT&T.
18	MR. BRIAN PEACOCK: And AT&T. I left that off.
19	I'm sorry. Yes. We had eight hundred (800) and
20	something views. And it varies. Now, Facebook Live, you
21	know, you go back and view those once they've been
22	recorded.
23	We do have limitations with that. And that's kind
24	of what I wanted to talk to you about today, is going
25	into a Phase II of what we like to recommend to you and
26	get approval on; and that's doing basically a Baldwin
27	County media channel.
28	So I'm going to real quickly And I know we're

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getting longwinded with the meeting, and I'll go through it as quickly as I can. I'll talk to you real quickly about how the process is currently done and then what we looked -- what we're looking at for Phase II.

5 So currently we do the video in the Commission 6 chamber in Bay Minette. We take the filming that we do 7 with the cameras that are around the chambers. We work 8 with a third-party closed captioning company. And then 9 we take those two videos, those two inputs, and we have 10 to edit those together.

11 We spend about three to four hours in postproduction 12 taking the video that we capture, video and audio that we 13 capture along with the closed captioning file that we're provided through a third party. We edit those into a 14 15 film, and then that's what take and produce the DVD's that we send out to the cable head-ins along with AT&T 16 U-verse and Riviera, some of the small mom-and-pop cable 17 providers in the area. And that's what we call the 18 19 postproduction of the video system.

20 Phase II, which is what Ron just spoke to you about, 21 would be the recording of the Central Annex and then 22 trying to eliminate all of that time that we spend in 23 postproduction, and then implementing a multichannel 24 video and streaming server.

25 So this is what we're looking to do at Central 26 Annex. Now, I've got on here Central Annex or remote 27 live video, because we will be able to take the system 28 that we've presented to you and go offsite with that.

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1	
1	So if something were to pop up at the EMA facility
2	and you wanted to have a live broadcast that cut into
3	Facebook, we could do that. If something popped up at
4	the megasite that you wanted to go live, we could do that
5	to our channel.
6	And we can do that with the system we've got the
7	quote on. It will consist of And this is a generic
8	picture. This is not the exact equipment that we'll
9	have.
10	In the chambers we'll have a stationary camera, just
11	like you've got in the chambers in the Bay Minette, that
12	will hang right between the projectors. And then we will
13	have a video system that we can do remote broadcasts with
14	at any of the other locations.
15	Now, that does not have to be on the County's
16	network. We will be able to do that live over the
17	internet through a MiFi device or any any connections
18	such as that.
19	This is where we get into the multi-streaming, the
20	multi-channel video, and the streaming server. What
21	we're wanting to do is be able to take a live stream,
22	such as a Commission meeting or Planning and Zoning
23	meetings, we want to be able to take past videos or
24	documentaries that maybe Archives has done or EMA has
25	done for a public service announcement, or slideshow that
26	you want to present to the public.
27	We want to be able to take that video feed,
28	customize that into an graphic overlay where we put RSF

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1	feeds which they're becoming outdated. There's not as
2	many RSF feeds out there now announcements that you
3	would like for the public to see, text crawls, customize
4	the screen that we present to the enduser. And then
5	we'll be able to schedule that.
6	So with the DVD's that we create now, we take a hard
7	DVD, we send it to that production company, cable
8	franchise, whatever it may be. They take that DVD and
9	stick it in a DVD player and it loops until they get the
10	next DVD that we create two weeks from there.
11	MR. RON CINK: Right.
12	MR. BRIAN PEACOCK: And then they stick that
13	in, and it loops. Felisha's worked to get some
14	documentaries. And we've tried to attach that to some of
15	our current DVD's. The problem is we've only got a
16	certain amount of space on the DVD.
17	MR. RON CINK: Right.
18	MR. BRIAN PEACOCK: So depending on how long
19	your meeting goes, that kind of tells us if we can attach
20	a documentary so that when you flip the channel on at
21	twelve o'clock at night, you're not just watching the
22	meeting back to back to back. We throw in some extra
23	stuff with it.
24	With the streaming server that we would like to look
25	at doing, we would actually be able to put that on a
26	schedule. So we there's two terabytes of storage that
27	we can do unlimited data with, whether it be previously
28	recorded Commission meetings, whether it be a service
•	

1	announcement for EMA, whatever it may be.
2	You know, we can we can take any graphical file
3	and upload it to this server and put it on a loop,
4	schedule it so you're not just watching Commission
5	meetings, public service announcement, Commission
6	meeting.
7	We could flex it however we want to. We can do a
8	daily schedule, a monthly schedule, or even a yearly
9	schedule. Now, the benefit of putting it on a schedule,
10	if something were to pop up and you wanted to go live,
11	we'll be able to jump into that scheduled programming at
12	any time and go live with your feed or a Commission
13	meeting or a Planning and Zoning meeting, and it never
14	affects the schedule we've established month to month.
15	MR. RON CINK: Quick quick question. If the
16	Commission chooses to go live at a certain point in time,
17	does it fed out to the cable providers instantaneously?
18	Are they grabbing this
19	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Realtime.
20	MR. BRIAN PEACOCK: We
21	MR. RON CINK: realtime?
22	MR. BRIAN PEACOCK: We will take this stream,
23	and we will send it to a CND in the Cloud. We're working
24	with a media company. We've actually got a meeting
25	scheduled to send them a device that they will actually
26	reach out to the Cloud and pull that feed down. So
27	instead of us sending them each a DVD every two weeks
28	MR. RON CINK: Right.

And they'll 4 actually go out and grab that feed, whatever it may be, 5 and pull it down to network. MR. RON CINK: Because the DVD thing is --6 7 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 8 Oh, yeah. 9 MR. RON CINK: -- antiquated. COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Yeah. 10 11 MR. RON CINK: We've been fighting that for a 12 long time. 13 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 14 Yeah. 15 MR. RON CINK: And this -- this breaks that. MR. BRIAN PEACOCK: This eliminates the DVD 16 17 production. I know we keep some of those for archiving. 18 MR. RON CINK: Right. MR. BRIAN PEACOCK: They'll still be out there 19 20 if we need to pull a DVD or make a DVD of a video. It's 21 our information. And it will be on our server, our 22 streaming server. But it eliminates us being able -- us 23 having to send that DVD out --24 MR. RON CINK: Right. 25 MR. BRIAN PEACOCK: -- every two weeks. 26 MR. RON CINK: They just grab it. 27 MS. KIM CREECH: Are we --28 MR. RON CINK: That's been our objective --

(SKIP) GRUBER: 6 Well -- well, right now at all these place, we're 7 providing them with a DVD. 8 MR. RON CINK: We provide them with a DVD 9 player. And it breaks. COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 10 11 And it's broke. And we'll go get another one. And 12 they're getting scarce to even try to buy one. 13 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Hard to find 14 one. COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 15 Yeah. You can't find them anymore. And, you know, 16 17 basically now all you can find is a single head. I mean, 18 you know, you can't buy the multihead ones. We used to 19 have them where we could put different things and rotate 20 them. We can't do that anymore, because it's just one --21 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: It's served 22 its purpose. 23 MR. RON CINK: Exactly. 24 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: It's --25 MR. BRIAN PEACOCK: The benefit of this is that 26 we control the schedule. It's not the Mediacom's or the 27 28 U-verse that controls the schedule of what's being

2	If you decide, as a Commission body, that you want

4	to back to back public service announcements from EMA, we
5	can throw that in the schedule.
6	We can do it for as long as the storm exists and
7	then go back to our scheduled programing. We just it
8	gives us ultimate control on what the public's viewing.
9	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: I think
10	MR. BRIAN PEACOCK: And you have
11	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: it's
12	great.
13	MR. BRIAN PEACOCK: Right now we we do
14	provide that DVD. And I would recommend that we provide
15	the equipment the streaming provider will use to pull
16	that down, because it gives us the control to manage that
17	device.
18	So this is what we're looking at. This is just kind
19	of a mockup of what the Baldwin County Commission channel
20	would look like. We would put a your normal feed,
21	whatever that may be, whether it's a live broadcast or
22	something that's previously recorded in the middle.

10	PROCEDURES (REVISITED)
11	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
12	Okay. All right. Let's see, now that brings us to
13	MR. RON CINK: Mr. Chairman, Vince.
14	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
15	Huh?
16	MR. RON CINK: Vince has a presentation.
17	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
18	Vince, yes. Please, Vince.
19	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Thank you. I'll try to go
20	through this quickly. A few weeks ago, I was asked to
21	prepare an agenda item pertaining to zoning, what is
22	zoning, what is our department all about, and why do we
23	do the things that we do, and what are our ordinances.
24	As you know, since you took office, you've been hit
25	with some pretty difficult issues. That was not on
26	purpose. It's just the way it what happened. But I know
27	there's been a lot of questions about what we do. So
28	this is an opportunity to kind of go through some of that

1	and then take whatever questions you might have.
2	Along with that, I've prepared a notebook for each
3	of you with the Zoning Ordinance and the Master Plan and
4	the Sub Regs. And the others already have that.
5	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Thank you.
6	MR. VINCE JACKSON: First a question that I'm
7	asked often is what is zoning? The simple issue is land
8	use, but you can break it down. A system of land use
9	regulations that govern size, shape, types of activities
10	used to limit the effects which particular land use might
11	have on neighboring properties.
12	It's based on the local government's power to
13	control nuisances. And it provides ordinances which
14	standardizes the use and development of property in order
15	to make the most appropriate use of land.
16	Alabama, unlike most states, does not really have
17	much in the way of provisions for zoning in
18	unincorporated areas. The only real mention in the Code
19	of Alabama has to do with flood-prone areas, and it's
20	very specific to flood-prone areas. And it's not
21	something that's widely used.
22	There are a handful of counties, Baldwin being one
23	of them, which have the authority to have zoning in the
24	unincorporated areas. And that is accomplished through
25	local legislation.
26	(Commissioner Joe Davis sneezed.)
27	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Excuse me.
28	MR. VINCE JACKSON: For our area, it was
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1	established with the adoption of Act 91-719 by Alabama
2	Legislature. And that act sets up our authority to have
3	zoning. It sets up how all zoning is impacted. It
4	discusses the Planning Commission. It sets up the Boards
5	of Adjustment. And this act has been amended several
6	times since its initial adoption.
7	The Planning and Zoning Department was actually
8	established in 1996. Originally, Planning and Zoning was
9	part of the Inspection Department. Then for a number of
10	years, it was a standalone department with an appointed
11	department head.
12	In 2010, Planning and Zoning was put under Highway.
13	Since 2015, we have been under Administration. And
14	that's where we are now.
15	The act, in setting up how zoning is adopted, it
16	sets up a The the process is intended to be citizen
17	driven where the Commission divides the county into what
18	we refer to as Planning Districts. You hear the Planning
19	Districts mentioned in our staff reports. The people
20	within the Planning District actually approach the County
21	Commission through a petition.
22	
23	(Commissioner Billie Jo Underwood left the Baldwin County
24	Commission Work Session.)
25	
26	MR. VINCE JACKSON: And if they meet certain
27	requirements, a referendum is held. And if the
28	referendum is in the affirmative, they set up the process

1	to adopt zoning. So it is it's not something where
2	the County can just go out and zone areas. It's
3	initiated by citizens.

We have thirty (30) Planning Districts. And today eighteen (18) of the thirty (30) Planning District have voted to enact zoning. And the next slide, this is our Planning District map.

8 The areas in yellow are the areas which have zoning. 9 The areas in white have no zoning. And, of course, the 10 green areas are the municipalities. And I have a large 11 copy of that map for each of you that you can take back 12 to your respective offices.

Our ordinance is designed to guide the area's growth. There are two parts. There's the zoning text. You have a copy of the text in the notebook. And then there is also the zoning map.

And as I stated, this is valid only in the unincorporated Planning Districts where a majority of qualified electors have elected to come under the planning and zoning authority of Baldwin County Commission. So it's only applicable in those yellow area. This is an example of our zoning map.

This is the Lillian area in Planning District 22. And the reason I chose this area is because it's one of the areas where you see a lot the different designations in one place.

27 You've got Commercial, your pink and red; you've got
28 your -- the yellow and gold is your Residential; and then

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1	you've got the Rural Agricultural, green. There is a
2	little bit of Outdoor Recreation, a little bit of Marine
3	Recreation. This is one of the few areas where it's all
4	there in virtually one place.
5	I wanted to talk about our staff. In addition to
6	me There's eight of us total. In addition to me, we
7	have two Planers.
8	Celena Boykin is the Planner in Robertsdale. The
9	Robertsdale office is over in Central Annex II on the
10	forth floor. Linda Lee is a Planner in Foley at the
11	satellite courthouse. Joe Ryan is our Code Enforcement
12	Officer, and he primarily works for Bay Minette.
13	And then we have D. J. Hart and Crystal Bates. They
14	are both Planning Technicians in the Robertsdale office.
15	Payton Rogers is a Planning Technician in Foley. And
16	Paula Bonner is our Administrative Support Specialist in
17	Foley.
18	The majority of us have been with the County over
19	ten (10) years. Celena, she came about a year after I
20	did, so most of us have worked together for a long time.
21	We work well together. We get along, look out for each
22	other. I tell people we're kind of like a small family
23	in the County organization.
24	Everybody on this list is extremely helpful. If you
25	ever need anything, they'll get you what you need.
26	
27	(Commissioner Billie Jo Underwood rejoined the Baldwin County

VINCE JACKSON: There is very little I 5 could do without everyone up there. Next I wanted to just kind of go through briefly 6 7 what some of our duties and responsibilities are. This is not meant to be an exhaustive list, but I will point 8 9 out that there are a few things that we do that are outside of what you would normally expect with zoning. 10 11 And I'll also point out a few thing that we don't do. Primarily we administer and enforce the Zoning 12 13 Ordinance. We provide assistance to boards, along with administration and code enforcement. We review and 14 15 process land use certificate applications and land disturbance permits. 16 A land use certificate is the first step to 17 obtaining a building permit in a zoned area of the 18 19 county. That's where we verify zoning. And I'll talk a 20 little bit more about that in just a minute. 21 We prepare and present amendments to the text of the 22 Baldwin County Zoning Ordinance. The last amendment that 23 was approved by the Commission was October of 2018. So 24 the -- the copy that you have in that binder is up to 25 date. 26 We provide mapping services. Celena, who was here 27 earlier, is our primary mapper -- mapping -- planning --28 mapping planner, I guess you could say. She's very good.

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1	We we keep maps on the website. We have some
2	stock maps available. We also provide mapping services
3	to other departments and other municipalities throughout
4	the county. And we do custom map requests. If you ever
5	need a map, call Celena, and she will take care of what
6	you need.
7	Zoning verification, that's just a a point of
8	contact where people call in or they e-mail us asking
9	what is the zoning of my property, what can I do on my
10	property.
11	
12	Commissioner James E. (Jeb) Ball rejoined the Baldwin County
13	Commission Work Session.)
14	
15	MR. VINCE JACKSON: We accept various
16	applications. You've seen re-zoning, PRD site plans,
17	conditional use, variance, special exception.
18	Variance, special exception, and administrative
19	appeal are only reviewed by the Board of Adjustment, so
20	you'll never see those.
21	We prepare and present agenda items. We're also
22	involved with the Architectural Review Board for Baldwin
23	County. We have four historic districts in the county.
24	And any new construction or exterior renovation is
25	required to receive approval from the Architectural
26	Review Board.
27	We have a section on our website that is dedicated
28	to historic resources. And so the information about the
•	

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1	historic districts and architectural review is there.
2	The most recent historic district was Malbis, which was
3	adopted just a few years ago.
4	We issue sign permits. That also includes billboard
5	permits in the un-zoned, unincorporated areas of the
6	county. That's one of the few areas where we get
7	involved in un-zoned. And I'll talk specifically about a
8	billboard issue in just a minute.
9	We administer the Wind Energy Conversion Systems
10	Ordinance for the un-zoned areas. That's wind turbines.
11	The way this came about was several years ago, there
12	was there was interest in a wind farm in Southern
13	Baldwin County.
14	We were able to address that through zoning, but
15	there was a concern that we also address if for the
16	unincorporated areas. So we adopted a separate
17	ordinance. Nothing has really come up with it since, but
18	it is there in the event that we need it.
19	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: How does
20	that actually work with it being in unincorporated areas
21	on both of those?
22	MR. VINCE JACKSON: The Legislature has
23	specifically granted authority to the County Commission.
24	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Okay. For
25	both of those items?
26	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
27	Yeah.
28	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Okay.
I	

1	Just checking, because I know normally you wouldn't be
2	able to
3	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Right.
4	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: to
5	regulate something like that with just with your own
6	inside
7	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Right.
8	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: You
9	can't make up a law that
10	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Right.
11	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
12	Yeah.
13	MR. VINCE JACKSON: But we in both cases, we
14	have specific authority to adopt those ordinances.
15	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Okay.
16	Because we don't have the authority to make those kind
17	of
18	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
19	Uh-huh. (Indicates affirmatively.) Right.
20	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Yeah.
21	It's so weird. Because municipalities
22	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Yes.
23	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: can
24	do that. Yeah.
25	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Right. And then we manage
26	the County-owned underground tanks, fuel storage tanks.
27	I think there might be two. Some of them have be
28	replaced by aboveground tanks.

1	But that's done by Joe Ryan, our Code Enforcement
2	Officer. And he works with representatives of of ADEM
3	and does periodic inspections and such. And he works on
4	that.
5	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
6	I think that's the aboveground, too, because there's
7	compliance he has to he has to take care of also,
8	both.
9	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Right. The last couple of
10	things, we administer the Community Rating System, also
11	known as CRS. That is a program which is part the
12	National Flood Insurance Program. And it's a system
13	whereby people can receive discounts on their flood
14	insurance rates.
15	Baldwin County has participated in that, I believe,
16	since 1997. Currently we're at a Class 7, which
17	represents a fifteen percent (15%) discount. We are
18	working we briefly were at the Class 6. We're working
19	to get back to the Class 6.
20	Part of what happens is they change the regs. And
21	so there were things that we previously received a lot of
22	points, and they capped the number of point that we could
23	receive.
24	But we've done some things since that I think will
25	help. We have a cycle visit every five years. Our last
26	cycle visit was in '15. So have one coming up next year.
27	And after that is when we find out if we improve on our
28	rating.

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1	Shortly, you will be reviewing a Flood Floodplain
2	Management Ordinance revision. That will help with
3	points. Also, our CRS Coordinator is D. J. Hart. She is
4	the Planning Technician here in Robertsdale. And she was
5	recently certified, gained a certification as a Certified
6	Floodplain Manager.
7	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
8	That's going to help.
9	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: That's good.
10	MR. VINCE JACKSON: So that's another area
11	where we can get points. We administer the Municipal
12	Separate Storm Sewer System MS4 permit for the County.
13	This is done with this is a requirement of ADEM.
14	There's also some FEMA requirements that goes along with
15	this. This requires communication and coordination with
16	other departments, primarily with Highway and also with
17	Solid Waste.
18	And, last, we provide assistance to County
19	departments. There are a lot of things we're asked to
20	do, and we step in. And to the extent that we're able,
21	we're always glad to help.
22	One thing that you don't see up here is the
23	Subdivision Regulations. Planning and Zoning does not
24	administer the Subdivision Regulations for Baldwin
25	County.
26	I included the regs in your binders, because that's
27	a that's a document that the Planning Commission uses.
28	But the administration for the Subdivision Regulations is

1	through the Highway Department.
2	Now, we do, to some extent, work together on that,
3	because it both involves Planning Commission, and there
4	are instances where subdivisions are in zoned areas.
5	But, primarily, it's Highway. Planning and Zoning really
6	doesn't have much of a role where subdivisions are
7	concerned.
8	And this is I was talking about MS4. This shows
9	you the MS4 area, the areas that kind of gold. The three
10	Eastern Shore municipalities, Spanish Fort, Daphne, and
11	Fairhope, all have their own MS4 permits.
12	And so in administering the MS4 permit for Baldwin
13	County, that requires some degree of coordination with
14	those municipalities. So we do work with them
15	periodically.
16	And as a requirement of our MS4 permit, we have a
17	section of our website set aside for stormwater. And you
18	can find the MS4 plan there. The MS4 permit is there.
19	And each year we're required to submit an annual
20	report which summarizes our activities. And several
21	years' worth of annual reports are on that website also.
22	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
23	And that's only because that's in the MPO; correct? Is
24	that
25	MR. VINCE JACKSON: No, sir. That's a
26	separate

6	database that we've used since '06, where we all the
7	applications that we take in are entered into that
8	database. And this is a comparison of our numbers for
9	2017 and 2018.
10	As you can see, in most categories we've shown an
11	increase. There are a couple of things where we were
12	down just a little bit, but in some cases we're up
13	significantly.
14	We talk a lot about the growth in the county, but
15	what and the activity. But what goes along with that
16	is an increase in complaints.
17	You can see we had seventy-four (74) complaints in
18	2017; a hundred twenty-eight (128) this past year. But
19	you'll notice, if you look at enforcement, only every
20	complaint doesn't
21	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Result.
22	MR. VINCE JACKSON: move to enforcement. We
23	investigate those complaints, and we determine if there
24	is in fact an issue. And, if so, then we you know, we
25	issue a notice of enforcement.
26	So you can see where the previous year, twenty-one
27	(21) went to the enforcement level; and in 2018, on
28	twenty-three (23) went to the enforcement level.

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1	I mean, we do get complaints that are not valid. I
2	hate to say that, but that's that's a fact of life.
3	And a lot of times a lot of times when we get a
4	complaint, we can make a simple phone call and say, hey,
5	we've had a call about this. It's taken care of, you
6	know.
7	With our enforcement, I will say about nine percent
8	(90%) of the time, as soon as somebody gets a letter,
9	they take care of what needs to be done. But we have
10	those situations where it gets dragged out a little bit.
11	So I think
12	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: One other interesting
13	thing about the complaints, Vince, that you get,
14	sometimes neighbors like to use the Planning Department
15	as a weapon
16	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Yes.
17	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: against their
18	neighbor.
19	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Yeah, and they like to
20	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: So you have to weed
21	through those as well.
22	MR. VINCE JACKSON: use us to to fight
23	those battles. And this is something where we have to
24	work very closely with Mr. Conner.
25	I do think, you know, a discussion about enforcement
26	is needed. It can be a very slow process. And I think
27	we'd also like to hear from you-all how I'm trying to
28	think of the right word how do you want us to proceed?

14	MR. VINCE JACKSON: I feel like these areas
15	ought to have zoning.
16	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
17	They're going to have to they need to have it.
18	MR. VINCE JACKSON: They need
19	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Well, the
20	thing about it is, is that, to me And I've said this
21	many times zoning is only beneficial if it's fair and
22	it's reasonable.
23	MR. VINCE JACKSON: But, you know, obviously,
24	some of the other areas of the county, the needs are
25	different, you know. So and and you can see that some
26	of the some of the some of the Planning Districts
27	are a lot larger than others.
28	The the planning the makeup, the size, the

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1	configure of the Planning Districts is up to the
2	discretion of the County Commission.
3	I mentioned thirty (30) Planning Districts. But if
4	you look at the map, you notice we go through Number 33.
5	So there are numbered there are old Planning Districts
6	that basically got consolidated into others that we no
7	longer use.
8	I think we Like Planning District 8, 11, and 19,
9	we no longer use those numbers. But they could be
10	brought back, you know, if necessary. We've had
11	discussions about splitting I mean, obviously, if you
12	look
13	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: 13.
14	MR. VINCE JACKSON: at 13, there's a logical
15	split right there. Planning District 7 is unusual,
16	because it's up here, but it comes all the way down here
17	south of I-10. Well, you know, the people in the south
18	end of that Perhaps that needs to be divided.
19	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: To be split,
20	yeah.
21	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Yeah. And we've had those
22	discussions before. It's just in recent years, there
23	hasn't really been a call for change.
24	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Well, I
25	think it's something to look at, yeah. So I appreciate
26	you bringing that to our attention.
27	MR. VINCE JACKSON: But, you know, the main
28	thing with this was to kind of let y'all know who we are,

1	what we do.
2	We have three offices. The main office is here in
3	Robertsdale over at Annex II on the forth floor. We have
4	an office at the Foley Satellite Courthouse.
5	And then we have a small Bay Minette office, which
6	is where I am most of the time. And Joe Ryan, the Code
7	Enforcement Officer is also up there. I do sometimes
8	work out of Robertsdale or I go really wherever they need
9	me, you know.
10	And with that, I will answer any questions you might
11	have.
12	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
13	Vince, you want to explain about the billboard?
14	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Yes. Yes. We have a
15	billboard issue. I mentioned this previously. We had a
16	billboard issue that we've been dealing with for quite a
17	while. It's on the It's on Doc McDuffie Road off the
18	Foley Beach Express.
19	The property is actually un-zoned, but our billboard
20	ordinance does apply to un-zoned areas. We had a
21	complaint a while back about a new billboard being built
22	on this property.
23	Well, I contacted Lamar. And Lamar said, no, we are
24	modifying an existing billboard. Well, it took some
25	digging, but I did determine that there has been a
26	billboard on that property since 2000. I've gone through
27	our GIS, Google Mapping, all of that, and the billboard
28	is there.

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1	So the most that I can say right now is that Lamar
2	modified an existing billboard. And the worst I can say
3	is that they did it without a permit. So there is
4	something that we can look at.
5	What I discovered in all of this is that there two
6	ordinances that conflict to some extent. There was a
7	resolution adopted by the County Commission which appears
8	to totally prohibit billboards on the Beach Express.
9	Now, the ones that you see down there was build
10	before this resolution was adopted. But then we have an
11	ordinance that was adopted several years later. And the
12	provisions of that ordinance seem to contradict the
13	resolution.
14	I belive that the resolution I mean, the
15	ordinance probably takes precedence over the resolution.
16	And I sent those documents to Mr. Conner, so we're trying
17	to work through that and figure out which is actually
18	applicable to this case.
19	But we are working on that. I think we've reached
20	kind of a point of clarity on it where we can move it
21	along quicker.
22	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: And just to say there,
23	there's also a lawsuit that's pending
24	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Yes.
25	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: regarding a
26	billboard issue. So Hope Hicks, through Webb & Ealy and
27	the insurance carrier, is representing the County in
28	that. She had talked about coming today for an executive

BALDWIN COUNTY COMMISSION WORK SESSION 01/22/2019 1 session. So some of the topics and our opinions related to it really need to be reported to you in executive 2 session. And we'll do that when she comes. 3 4 MR. VINCE JACKSON: And that might -- And the 5 outcome of that might have a little bit of bearing on this as well, because there's some extraterritorial 6 7 issues that play into it. But we are working it on. Right now, like I said, the most that I can say is 8 9 that Lamar modified an existing billboard. He actually made it smaller. 10 11 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Why -- why did they not want billboards on the Beach Express? 12 13 COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: The complaint, 14 was that a competitor or an --15 MR. VINCE JACKSON: No. It was --COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: -- adjoining --16 17 MR. VINCE JACKSON: -- a citizen. It was a citizen. 18 COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: -- adjoining 19 20 property owner, or just --21 MR. VINCE JACKSON: Just somebody from the 22 area. 23 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 24 Well, somebody from the area said say, hey --25 MR. VINCE JACKSON: Yeah. 26 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: -- they've changed this billboard. It's not 27 28 never been there. And it was there, but they changed it.

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1	They've actually went in there and put an electronic head
2	on it, so now they've

2	an anti, hate billboard person, until you get somewhere
3	you don't know where you're at, and that's the only light
4	that you see at night. There's no other street lights.

6	a safety thing. But I know that's not a reason to
7	particularly have them, but I'm just, you know
8	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: Again, that really is
9	an exercise of zoning power and authority. That's a
10	policy decision that that the Commissioners make
11	COMMISSION MEMBER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Okay.
12	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: to the extent to
13	which the enabling legislation allows you to regulate
14	billboards.

24	those are all policy decisions that you-all make.
