

(SKIP) GRUBER: 5 Good morning. Good morning, everyone. Welcome to the --COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Good 6 7 morning. 8 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) 9 GRUBER: -- May the 14th work session of the Baldwin County Commission. 10 11 And at this time I've asked Commissioner Ball to lead us in the invocation and Commissioner Underwood to 12 13 lead us in the Pledge. COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Please bow 14 15 with me. 16 (Commissioner James E. (Jeb) Ball led in prayer.) 17 (The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.) 18 19 F-1 - ADOPTION OF 2018 INTERNATIONAL CODE COUNCIL (ICC) BUILDING 20 21 CODES AND SUPPLEMENTAL CODES 22 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 23 All right. We're going to do a little bit of jumping 24 around this morning. We have some folks that need to get 25 out of here, so just please bear with us. Okay. 26 MR. WAYNE DYESS: Mr. Chairman, are you ready? 27 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 28 Yes.

1 MR. WAYNE DYESS: Okay. Good morning, 2 Commissioners. 3 COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Good 4 morning. 5 MR. WAYNE DYESS: We are going to move around a little bit. The first item is F-1, adoption of the 2018 6 7 International Code Council Building Codes and Supplemental Codes. And I believe Mike Howell is here to 8 9 discuss this. 10 MR. MIKE HOWELL: Yes. Commissioners, the 11 advertisements will be complete by May the 21st. That 12 would be the four weeks that was required by -- by -- by 13 the law. And as far as that, it needs to go on Public 14 Hearing. That is also a requirement. And I'll answer 15 16 any questions y'all may have. 17 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: Y'all got any questions? 18 19 COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: No, sir. 20 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: No, sir. 21 COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: That was a 22 public hearing? 23 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 24 Yes. Yeah. That'd be a public hearing. 25 MR. MIKE HOWELL: Correct. 26 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 27 Okay. All right. 28 MR. MIKE HOWELL: All right.

(JEB) BALL: All right. 5 Thanks, Mike. 6 7 P-1 - PRESENTATION BY EYE HEART WORLD - 2018 IMPACT REPORT 8 MR. WAYNE DYESS: Mr. Chairman, the next one is 9 under Administration. It is P-1, the presentation of the Eye Heart World 2018 Impact Report. 10 11 MS. CRYSTAL YARBROUGH: Good morning. My name 12 is --13 COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Good 14 morning. 15 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: Good morning. 16 17 MS. CRYSTAL YARBROUGH: My name is Crystal Yarborough. Thank you guys for having me. I serve as 18 19 The Rose Center director. And we are a daytime drop-in center in Mobile. 20 We serve victims and survivors of sex trafficking in 21 22 Mobile and Baldwin County. We opened in 2018. We opened 23 our center in 2018. But we have been working here in 24 Mobile and Baldwin County since 2013. 25 And so I wanted to take a few minutes this morning 26 and -- and share with you our impact, but then also tell 27 you a little bit about the ladies we serve in our area. 28 Excuse me.

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1	Our impact report is from March 2018 to March 2019.
2	During that time we had fifty-nine (59) referrals. We
3	served our youngest client was fourteen (14), and the
4	oldest one is forty-five (45).
5	We had one hundred twenty-eight (128) hours of case
6	management. So that's directly serving directly doing
7	case management with the with the girls and ladies who
8	come through.
9	We had two hundred twenty-five (225) services
10	provided directly to survivors. Again, each person we
11	serve is in here in Mobile. And they're either from
12	Mobile or Baldwin County, so living there, meaning they
13	were also trafficked in Mobile or Baldwin County.
14	We served forty-eight (48) meals. The number of
15	hours serving survivors is one thousand, three hundred
16	thirty-three (1,333). We trained forty (40) volunteers.
17	We have fifty-six (56) hours targeting at-risk youth.
18	So we combat domestic sex trafficking through a
19	three-sided approach. That's awareness, prevention, and
20	aftercare. And so as part of our awareness we target
21	at-risk youth.
22	Our goal is to provide a wholistic continuum of care
23	that includes during the time they were trafficked, after
24	the time they are trafficked, but then also this
25	awareness arm is reaching them in their vulnerable years.
26	So in the Unites States, the average age of entry
27	into trafficking is thirteen (13) years old. So it's so
28	important that we that we have advocates who are

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1	trained to go into the schools to serve these young
2	people.
3	Because most often, when we think about human
4	trafficking, we think about the movie "Taken." And it
5	doesn't look that way in America.
6	So a lot of times people as me, does it really
7	happen here? The answer is yes. When they ask me what
8	it looks like, I tell them it looks like my daughter. It
9	looks like your daughter. It looks like your niece. It
10	looks like these beautiful young ladies sitting right
11	here. So everyone is vulnerable.
12	And so because it doesn't look like we think it
13	should look, oftentimes we tend to look by it. We tend
14	to look over it, because we don't know what we're looking
15	for. So this targeting at-risk youth is so crucial to
16	what we do.
17	We have three hundred eleven (311) service
18	providers, first responders excuse me and community
19	leaders that were trained in that year excuse me
20	eight hundred ninety-two (892) hours of volunteers of
21	volunteer hours.
22	Also, during the first year, which we're very proud
23	of this, the Rose Center was awarded the FBI Director of
24	Community Leadership Award. And so last week I just got
25	to go to D.C. and receive an award on behalf of The Rose
26	Center just recognizing what's going on in our
27	communities.
28	And and then we were awarded the Dr. Martin

1	Luther King, Jr., Health and Human Services Award by an
2	organization in Mobile. Excuse me.
3	And just take a couple of more minutes to share with
4	you guys excuse me the difference between a drop-in
5	center. So we are The Rose Center. Our organization,
6	Eye Heart World, also has a residential facility in Green
7	Bay, Wisconsin. That is called The Rose Home. So the
8	difference is we provide all of the services that a
9	residential facility does, only we don't provide care
10	overnight.
11	But what we do is we partner with other
12	organizations in our community to house them. And then
13	we provide transportation. Again, we provide a wholistic
14	continuum of care. But we need partners in the community
15	who don't do what what we do and vice versa.
16	For example, we don't provide housing. So what we
17	do is we partner with the Housing Authority. We don't
18	excuse me. We don't employ them, but we do job readiness
19	skills and we partner with we partner with businesses
20	in the community who are willing to give these girls a
21	chance.
22	So just saying that, it's it's so important that
23	our whole, entire community recognizes that these
24	girls I always tell people that before even though
25	the average age of entry is thirteen (13) years old, by
26	the time we see them at nineteen (19), twenty (20),
27	twenty-one (21), in our minds, we think, well, they just
28	need to go get a job. And when this has been happening

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1	their entire lives, they don't know how to get a job.
2	And so I just wanted to share a little story with
3	you guys, a couple of stories about the girls that we
4	serve from here in our community.
5	One of our girls was born here in Baldwin County.
6	She was born in Foley. She her mother was sexually
7	assaulted, and she was the product of that. And so she
8	was just born into dark poverty.
9	And she was trafficked from the age she was
10	trafficked as long as she could remember. It stopped at
11	the age of thirteen (13). But she permanently went to
12	live with her traffickers, who were family members, at
13	the age of seven (7).
14	She remembers the lights would get turned off at
15	their house. And at that time, she would be taken over
16	to different men's houses who would take photos of her
17	and sexually assault her.
18	And I realize this is graphic and heavy for me to be
19	the first on the agenda, so I apologize.
20	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
21	That's okay.
22	MS. CRYSTAL YARBROUGH: And so she finally told
23	someone at thirteen (13) at school. And she was taken
24	she was removed from from the home that day, and she
25	was placed into foster care. She knew that if she went
26	home, she would probably be killed, because that's what
27	they told her.
28	So from the age of thirteen (13) to seventeen (17),

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1	she was moved through seven (7) different foster homes in
2	Baldwin County, and she was sexually abused in four (4)
3	of them. So at the age of seventeen (17), it was
4	considered a crisis, and she was transferred to Mobile
5	County to a group home.
6	And she graduated from high school. She would put
7	on her backpack every day. She looked through the
8	phonebook and found a church. And she would walk three
9	(3) miles to and from church with a backpack on. And she
10	knew she was going to age out soon. She just needed a
11	home.
12	So fast forward to when she was twenty-nine (29).
13	She was the mother of three (3). She got married because
14	she knew she was going to age out of foster care.
15	When she was twenty-nine (29), she came to us. She
16	wanted to be a volunteer. And one of the first things
17	she told me is, I just want you to know I've never been
18	trafficked. Well, she didn't know what what was done
19	to her by a family member was trafficking. She didn't
20	know that.
21	And so, anyway, long story short, she will graduate
22	from our program at the end of this month. And she has
23	gone from literally She wrote the other day, when I
24	came to The Rose Center, I just threw myself into their
25	hands, because I didn't know what happened to me.
26	And so she was given a chance to go to college, but
27	she didn't know how to do basic addition and subtraction,
28	so she failed out. And right now we are in the process

1	of looking of applying for some jobs. She doesn't
2	know what a resumé is, and she just turned thirty-one
3	(31).
4	She since she's been in our program, she'd driven
5	on the interstate for the first time. She's always taken
6	back roads. So these these are basic things that
7	these girls just don't know how to do. And, you know,
8	they might look normal to us or they might even seem kind
9	of weird to us.
10	And so we have such a privilege to be able to
11	come come alongside these girls and to be able to walk
12	through them really from trauma to triumph. And it's
13	such an I always tell people, I truly have the best
14	job in the whole world.
15	And if I could just take one more minute and share
16	with you our most recent story. Last Thursday, we
17	received a call from law enforcement. And it was in
18	Mobile. And they were doing an operation, and they said,
19	we have a girl here and we believe that she is being
20	trafficked. And but she won't talk to us. And I
21	said, well, can I come? And they said yes. So I went in
22	and talked to her.
23	She was absolutely terrified. I got her to tell me
24	that she had a a daughter. And she had been
25	basically she has a boyfriend. She had a boyfriend
26	who was selling her out of a motel to pay so they could
27	pay for that motel every day. And their daughter
28	lived her daughter lived there with them.
-	

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1	And so she wouldn't what what ended up
2	happening, she ended up learning that the reason she
3	wasn't going to tell the police everything was her
4	daughter was still there with her trafficker. She was
5	terrified. And she looked at me and she said, do you
6	think they don't know where I am right now? Do you think
7	they don't know that I'm here talking to the police?
8	And so what we know is she was being sold by someone
9	she thought loved her in order to pay for basic needs.
10	And she was in a situation really that she didn't know
11	how to get out of.
12	And we see this so many times with these girls.
13	It's so very complex. And when we look at how vulnerable
14	teenage girls are in all honesty, I raised a daughter.
15	And all they want is to love, and all they want is to be
16	loved and to belong.
17	And so these traffickers come in, and they just
18	start to just they see cracks in them, and they start
19	to fill them with that love and belonging. And then
20	before you know it, they're getting them to do things the
21	girls never thought they would do.
22	And the first time they commit an act that's deemed
23	shameful, they don't know how to tell their families.
24	They see themselves as never being able to be accepted
25	again.
26	So what we do at The Rose Center is we meet them
27	where they are. We feed them. You wouldn't believe how
28	hungry these girls are when they come.

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1	And so what we do is we stand in the gap, provide an
2	atmosphere of trust. We don't make them give anything
3	up. We just give them we try to fill their basic
4	needs at first and provide a case management plan for
5	them. We give them power back.
6	It's like our newest girl, when I saw her Saturday
7	morning and I peeked in the room to check on her, she
8	looked up and smiled at me. I thought I was going to
9	cry. I was like, she's happy to see me. Oh, my gosh.
10	She's so happy to see me.
11	Because she just she thought, you don't
12	understand me. You don't know my life. And so just over
13	the last few days, just her knowing that we're really
14	here to help her and not take anything from her is so
15	amazing.
16	And so that's that's what we do. We meet them
17	where they are. We provide a case management plan for
18	them. And excuse me we do everything from trauma
19	counseling, give them a place to rest, job readiness
20	skills, clothing, shampoo, all of those things.
21	And we are privately funded. So we've are we
22	are a 501(c)(3). So everything that we have is corporate
23	sponsorships, donations, churches, and really a lot of
24	volunteer hours.
25	And so we are so grateful to be here, again, serving
26	Mobile and Baldwin County. We're training Mobile Police
27	Department right now. And we received a call to to be
28	able train Orange Beach police officers in October.

5	coming up. And I went to the kickoff event. And that's
6	where I met Crystal.

9	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: And when she
10	was sharing the story that she shared there, my first
11	question that I asked her, I just was under the
12	assumption that I said, which out of the two
13	counties, which one does this happen in the most? It's
14	got to be Mobile. And she says, oh, no. It's Baldwin
15	County.
16	So I I immediately thought that we needed to get
17	her on the agenda, especially since we're approaching our
18	budget season. And and maybe she could we could
19	get her on one of these items where we could support this
20	group.
21	Because this is something that we've got to battle
22	in this county. And I had no idea how bad it was.
23	And and so I invited Crystal to share her story. And
24	I think we also if I'm not mistaken, she was supposed
25	to present on the 21st as well.

9	you know, it's we have we have done this in the
10	past, you know, supported the TSA program in the years
11	past.
12	So, you know, I it's something that we can do, if
13	I'm not and it's it's a matter of how much y'all
14	want to be willing to fund this program, you know. It's
15	nothing that we can't do. I mean, we've done it before.
16	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Mr. Chairman, is
17	it possible that we do some sort of matching program? In
18	other words, that we'll match up to an amount, whatever
19	dollars that could be generated either by their
20	another organization or a school board or participants or
21	something like that?
22	Because this is the sort of thing that we all need
23	to participate in, I think. And I certainly want us to
24	be supportive. But I want us to encourage other entities
25	to support.
26	I I think we should match anything the School
27	Board puts in there, or some other group, to make it
28	to get them where they need to go in a first-class way.

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1	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
2	Have y'all got any idea how much y'all have come close to
3	raising yet?
4	MS. DANA MARKULJ: Today we've only raised
5	around eight hundred dollars (\$800). We only
6	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
7	You've got a long way to go.
8	MS. DANA MARKULJ: We yeah. We didn't have
9	our competition until late April, so we didn't know that
10	we qualified for nationals until April. We have a
11	limited amount of time to raise the money.
12	But we're we're we're we have all kind of
13	fundraisers scheduled, you know, as much as we're able in
14	the short amount of time. So we're just reaching out to
15	every organization we possibly can to help us get there.
16	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: I'd like
17	to to see that we help them in some capacity. I'm not
18	exactly sure
19	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Me, too.
20	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: I was kind
21	of talking when y'all were talking. What did y'all just
22	say? Like do do you have an amount already raised?
23	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: They've only
24	raised eight hundred dollars (\$800).
25	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
26	They've got enough for one person.
27	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: You've only
28	raised eight hundred dollars (\$800)?

1	MS. DANA MARKULJ: Yeah.
2	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
3	They've got enough for one person basically. They've got
4	a long way to go. And by June, that's that's a
5	short that's a short timeframe.
6	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Could you share
7	with us others that you have approached or will be
8	approaching?
9	I I mentioned the matching concept. I In my
10	experience in raising money, what you do is you take a
11	good cause and make sure that a lot of people know about
12	it. And then if somebody says, I'll match every dollar
13	that you put in up to an amount, then all of a sudden,
14	the amount starts growing out.
15	MS. DANA MARKULJ: We just met went to the
16	city council meeting in Bay Minette this past Thursday.
17	And they said they would support us. But, you know, they
18	couldn't tell us yet how much. They would support us.
19	And we're reaching out to the local businesses.
20	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Have you
21	reached out to the School Board?
22	MS. DANA MARKULJ: We haven't yet. I mean, we
23	have in a fashion of approval to go for the trip.
24	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Right. But
25	they've not offered any financial support?
26	MS. DANA MARKULJ: No.

(SKIP) GRUBER: 3 Good morning. 4 COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Good morning. 5 MS. ASHLEY JONES DAVIS: So I've got two things 6 to discuss with you guys. I'll start with the easy one. 7 And I apologize for not sending these reference sheets to you guys in advance. There's ten copies, if y'all want 8 9 to pass them around. 10 11 ATTACHMENT 1 - CHRISTMAS FEST 2019 - ONE DAY OPTION 12 13 MS. ASHLEY JONES DAVIS: The first has to do 14 with Christmas Fest. And, as you guys know, it's a very 15 longstanding tradition in North Baldwin County. Historically, it's happened on the second weekend in 16 17 December the past seven (7) years. The Board of Directors met with several of our partnering agencies 18 like the City of Bay Minette, North Baldwin Utilities, 19 20 Alabama Power, everybody who has a hand in the logistics 21 behind it. The Bay Minette Police Department was 22 involved, Chief Tolbert, in some of the decisionmaking. 23 The board has approved the recommendation to move 24 the festival to a one-day festival on Saturday, 25 December 14th, and to move it back to the courthouse 26 square, which is what a lot of people have wanted for 27 several years. 28 But in doing so -- The second page you have there is

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1	my handy drawing skills. But the vendors would basically
2	take and make a U-shape around the square. And the
3	remaining part of the square would be used for kids'
4	activities and other display setups like the car show and
5	things of that nature.
6	This would require shutting down Highway 31 for the
7	day, from Friday evening during setup through the end of
8	the day on Saturday. Chief Tolbert has agreed to work
9	with ALDOT to get those permissions that are required.
10	What we're requesting from the County Commission for
11	this property is that support and permission to use
12	County property and right-of-ways around the courthouse
13	square.
14	And, because it's County property, we will need our
15	City crews to work with our vendors to establish power
16	and water, County employees to help identify the the
17	right sources for those things, and then just just
18	your overall general support and approval to do it this
19	way.
20	So, I mean, I'll be happy to answer any questions
21	you guys have about about this one.
22	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Well, I
23	don't see any problem with that.
24	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL:
25	Mr. Chairman, I I was I was kind of instrumental in
26	trying to get this.
27	MS. ASHLEY JONES DAVIS: This was Jeb's fault.

14	again, if if the Commission is willing to to to
15	work and and help out with the the employees with
16	the grounds and stuff. So

18	down on Friday beginning at five o'clock.
19	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Right.
20	MS. ASHLEY JONES DAVIS: The court and
21	businesses will be closed at that point, and we would

10	MS. ASHLEY JONES DAVIS: All right. Next up,
11	because I can't change just one thing in a year, the
12	I I'm assuming most everybody in here is familiar with
13	Delta Dash in some way.
14	But for the past seven (7) years, North Baldwin
15	Chamber has held this event at Lower Bryants Landing.
16	And the majority of the course has been set up on private
17	property that was owned by another individual.
18	Just a little history about the event, this will be
19	our eighth event. Through this year, it has raise over
20	one hundred forty-four thousand (\$144,000) that has all
21	been put back into programs in North Baldwin.
22	We've awarded over fifty thousand (\$50,000) of that
23	in scholarships to graduating seniors and students at
24	Coastal Alabama Community College and Huntington College
25	there in Bay Minette.
26	We've had thirty-five hundred (3,500) participants
27	over seven (7) events. Each event requires about two
28	hundred (200) volunteers for the day of. We've had

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1	representatives from more than from more than eight
2	(8) different states around the country come to this
3	event. And it's proven to be a big adventure/tourism
4	event for us and an economic driver in our community.
5	The the event is ninety-nine percent (99%)
6	volunteer driven, with myself and my one staff member
7	being the only paid employees that work on it. But a lot
8	of the credit goes to the volunteers out there setting it
9	up.
10	This event is different than other events that we
11	do, because it requires a long setup period.
12	Traditionally, it has taken us about six (6) weeks to
13	prep the property that the course is on now simply due to
14	the fact that clearing gets done and trails change and we
15	have to adapt.
16	We, last year actually, before last year's event,
17	we had spoken with Michael Dorian about the potential
18	that Live Oak Landing has existing trails and places that
19	are easier to get to.
20	And so this year we started exploring the
21	possibilities. Our volunteers went out and looked at the
22	trails that existed there, and they saw a way to make our
23	lives a whole lot easier.
24	But, in doing this, we are requesting assistance
25	from you guys to use Live Oak Landing, including the
26	pavilion area, for Friday September 27th for setup and
27	for Saturday, September 28th, the day of the event.
28	We would need access to the trails no later that one

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1	week prior to setting up things along the trail. And
2	then we would request permission to give us one week
3	after the event to get everything cleaned up, just
4	because of the nature and the scope of the event.
5	In the past, Baldwin County EMA has supported the
6	event and partnered with us with communications and
7	safety planning, as well as the Stockton Volunteer Fire
8	Department, Bay Minette Fire Department, local EMS
9	agencies, North Baldwin Search and Rescue. We have a
10	strong safety plan and presence for all of our
11	participants and volunteers.
12	And we would like to try to make this happen at Live
13	Oak. It would give our participants a place to stay
14	while they're there onsite. It would add a new element
15	to the event and change the trail. And it would relieve
16	some pressure off of the core group of about ten (10)
17	volunteers who put the trail together every year.
18	So questions, thoughts? I don't know what you guys
19	don't know. So
20	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Well,
21	Ashley, you want to tell us about Mike, why Michael is
22	here? Because there may be a
23	MS. ASHLEY JONES DAVIS: Yes.

25	MS. ASHLEY JONES DAVIS: So Michael Dorian is
26	here this morning. There is a fishing tournament

MICHAEL DORIAN: Sure. There is a fishing 4 5 tournament scheduled that morning. But with the timing of the Delta Dash event, as far as when the guests arrive 6 7 and when they leave, I don't see a problem with the 8 fishing tournament. The fishermen will be there. The fishermen will be 9 on the water by the time the first quests arrive. And, 10 11 based on her former schedule, when the Delta Dash participants leave will be well in advance of a potential 12 13 weigh-in for the fishing tournament. COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 14 15 Okay. MR. MICHAEL DORIAN: So I don't think it should 16 17 be a conflict. I think that the property can easily 18 manage both events on that day. COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 19 20 Sounds good. COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: And we have 21 22 plenty of parking for both -- both? 23 MS. ASHLEY JONES DAVIS: Typically we've had about five hundred (500) -- average five hundred (500) 24 25 participants a year in the actual event. We don't know 26 what those will look like this year, because with the 27 move and venue, we don't anticipate having as strenuous 28 obstacles has we've had in the past. So we know that

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1	we'll lose some participants and gain some that may want
2	to run it. The group is currently re-branding the the
3	event to more of a trail challenge than an obstacle
4	course/mud run.
5	We do carry liability insurance. We have about
6	three insurance policies that pertain to this event
7	alone. We would work with the County the way we have
8	worked with our landowners in the past; and that's that
9	we add we add Baldwin County to that.
10	And we've never we've we've had issues before
11	where we had to use the insurance policies, but
12	everything has been taken care of.
13	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: No, I'm
14	just as long as you can accommodate both events.
15	MS. ASHLEY JONES DAVIS: Yeah.
16	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: And you said
17	you can. But I just know there's In previous
18	meetings, we've had parking issues with the tournaments.
19	So I'm just making sure we That was my only concern.
20	And if You guys know the the terrain better than I
21	do, and if y'all are comfortable with that
22	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: I think what you might
23	want to consider is, I guess, two part. We've got a
24	license agreement that we use for special events. Y'all
25	would need to have an action that would waive the policy
26	or at least allow it to be done at no cost for the
27	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: That's
28	right.

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1	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: And then the second
2	part, because of this two constituencies out there, is
3	the parking planning as to where people would go might be
4	a good thing. And then fourth is bathrooms. For that
5	number of people, are y'all going to bring in
6	port-o-lets?
7	MS. ASHLEY JONES DAVIS: We do. We we
8	would the pavilion at Lower Bryant had restrooms, but
9	they could not accommodate six hundred (600) people. So
10	we always bring in additional port-o-potties to be placed
11	for the event. And we would do the same. I mean, we
12	would do everything the way we've done it at other
13	places.
14	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: I think it
15	would be an excellent thing to promote Live Oak for sure
16	with that many new because a lot of new faces may be
17	coming through there and be picking out campsites for the
18	summer and that kind of stuff. I think it'd be be
19	good.
20	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Okay.
21	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL:
22	Mr. Chairman, I I would consent on that. But do we
23	We need to just do it with all the things that our
24	attorney says.
25	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: We can come up with an
26	agenda item.

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1	about we've we've done several marketing campaigns for
2	different things related to economic development.
3	One of those was a joint campaign at the south end
4	of the county with stakeholders down there called
5	Business Where You Beach.
6	And so some of the tag lines and slogans that we did
7	in that campaign were some things that jumped out at Anu
8	and their team when they were kind of talking through
9	this this initiative.
10	And here with me is Jennifer Jenkins today.
11	Jennifer and her team of ten at JJPR have been doing our
12	external communications, branding, and marketing.
13	And I think all of you have seen our imagery and
14	and everything that we utilize, which has been consistent
15	since I've been back here about six years when we
16	re-branded our economic development efforts, all of the
17	external communications.
18	And we have different communications and branding
19	for each external audience that we communicate with. And
20	Jennifer and her talented team have helped us with that.
21	And so in kind of talking with Anu about about
22	this, it kind of brought up a broader conversation about,
23	you know, the imagery, the marketing, the branding of
24	Baldwin County, period. And so that that was kind of
25	the discussion I wanted to bring up today.
26	Because we have we've spent a lot of time,
27	energy, and resources with Jennifer and her team to brand
28	Baldwin County from an economic development perspective,

1	an outward communication.
2	And we we spend a lot of time on that every day,
3	deliberating on what audience we're communicating with,
4	how we're communicating, and what we're using to
5	communicate to that audience.
6	And so I wanted to at least offer the the ability
7	for us to assist you, if that's a a broader
8	conversation you want to have. I know this kind of
9	the specific conversation this morning is about
10	promotional materials and promotional items. But, you
11	know, I I was hoping to maybe have a conversation
12	about the broader promoting of Baldwin County.
13	And maybe, hopefully, that could dovetail in some of
14	the efforts that we've been making of the last several
15	years to to really position ourselves really as as
16	the the county that we are, a very high-ranking county
17	when it comes to economic development and the face that
18	we've put on it from an economic development perspective,
19	doing the same as the County representing itself.
20	So I can't say enough good things about Jennifer and
21	her team, that that they've done a good job for us.
22	It helps us, because we're a small organization, to have
23	an external partner like Jennifer.
24	And we'd be happy to kind of work with the County,
25	if if that's a broader discussion you want to have
26	about branding the county
27	MS. JENNIFER JENKINS: That's right.
28	MR. LEE LAWSON: for not only this purpose,

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1	but for a larger communicating purpose to the to the
2	outside world. So that's kind of why we're here.
3	I know Jennifer is happy to answer any questions
4	about the process, what we went through when we basically
5	re-branded our economic development efforts about five
6	years ago. And so we're happy to have any broader
7	discussion you want to have.
8	And I want to thank Anu for reaching out. And
9	we're and I told Anu we're happy to lend anything
10	we've done from a marketing perspective to the County
11	that has any crossover ability.
12	But I know Jennifer and I've had some discussions
13	about this on a broader marketing communication, external
14	marketing the County and branding the County. So we're
15	happy to have that larger conversation, if that's what
16	the Commission desires.
17	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
18	Okay. Commissioners.
19	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Mr. Chairman, if
20	I could.
21	I think it's important not only that we provide
22	contemporary eye-catching things that call attention to
23	our county, but that we also come up with a strategy for
24	utilizing that, and that there's several venues, of
25	course, economic development being certainly one, but I'd
26	like to see us have a concerted effort with the with
27	Lee's organization to have a strategy for promoting our
28	county.

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1	It's it's easy to do. We all ask is when did you
2	discover paradise? And we got all kind of answers, and
3	all of them were very unique, I think.
4	But we also need to put a strategy together so it
5	comes into place. There are seasonal things that happen,
6	and there are events that occur. And we want to have a
7	strategy to capitalize on all that.
8	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: And speaking
9	of branding, I think this initially came up with just
10	buying some promotional item.
11	But since we've gotten onto the topic of branding, I
12	think it would be an excellent idea if, okay, when you
13	when you enter on any of the major highways we have in
14	Baldwin County to a municipality, they have their brand.
15	They have their sign, but there is nothing that tells you
16	when you get off the interstate welcome to Baldwin County
17	except for a green ALDOT sign.
18	I personally think that's boring. But I don't see
19	why whatever we come up with, that we couldn't have some
20	kind of I know that Gulf Shores has went through
21	re-branding. I know that Foley has went through
22	re-branding.
23	You know, that's just I know we're getting a
24	little bit off of what maybe this slide is about. I
25	think this slide is about buying huggers and things like
26	that.
27	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Sure.
28	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: But since we

1	got there, I would like to see something where that when
2	people do Out in the county, I know there's plenty of
3	places that they enter into our wonderful county that are
4	not in the corporate limits of a municipality.
5	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: That's right.
6	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Like, you
7	know, coming across the Lillian bridge, coming across the
8	Highway 90, you know. I know we've got "WELCOME TO
9	ALABAMA THE BEAUTIFUL" and that kind of stuff, but also
10	how about "WELCOME TO BALDWIN COUNTY" if we can come up
11	with something that would be a great, like you said,
12	brand?
13	MR. WAYNE DYESS: Mr. Chairman, if I could add,
14	too, just during my time in Walton County, Florida, the
15	Tourist Development Council also did as as
16	Commissioner Underwood mentioned.
17	When you enter the county, they had signs that were
18	very, very well done. And they were consistent through
19	everything in the county that like the County parks,
20	the signage, the color, the font, the design, it was all
21	very consistent.
22	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: And
23	that's
24	MR. WAYNE DYESS: They used a consistent theme.
25	So when you see a park and you see a sign, you
26	automatically know it's a County park because of the
27	color and and those kind of things. I think it's a
28	great idea.

1	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: And that's
2	actually something that I have not gotten to yet but had
3	alluded to earlier, that it was something I was wanting
4	to do with the parks was identification.
5	And that's really what it was, was kind of a a
6	signage thing that could all be identified. It's just
7	that when I asked for a list of parks, I got I got
8	overwhelmed, because what's considered parks is like
9	mowing the front lawn of the courthouse.
10	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Right.
11	That's a park.
12	MS. JENNIFER JENKINS: Well, and if I could
13	add, you know, a a lot of the process is identifying
14	all of the target audiences you're going to be talking
15	to
16	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: There you
17	go.
18	MS. JENNIFER JENKINS: with this brand. And
19	Baldwin County has a unique opportunity not just because
20	of what a great quality of life we have, but because of
21	the growth and and the momentum that the EDA has built
22	for our county. And I think that's really kind of
23	stepping back from a broader And it's real easy to
24	like start ordering pins and making signs.
25	But thinking about, okay, tourists, you know,
26	residents here, who is our audience? What do you want
27	the message to be about this county?
28	Because these these sound good, but, really, in a

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1	lot of ways, it could represent any county. And so we
2	just want to make sure that what we're saying is unique
3	to Baldwin County and that, you know, as we're doing work
4	and as we're being recognized nationally, that the
5	the the message and the slogan and the marketing
6	strategy is on point.
7	And what we've done with the EDA is to really
8	consistently make everything look and feel the same with
9	the signage, with the promotional items, with everything
10	you do.
11	Even, you know, you can apply that branding to a
12	website, anything you guys, you know, can imagine. We
13	just have to really kind of step back and look at, you
14	know, our audiences and who who we're talking to as
15	far as our county and what is the message we're trying to
16	convey.
17	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Lee, it may
18	be also good to maybe involve Herb and the CBB, because
19	we know where people are going.
20	MR. LEE LAWSON: Well, that's and that's
21	I mean, Wayne brings up a good point, is that it it's
22	developing a a like like Jennifer said, a a
23	brand that that spans every audience
24	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Right.
25	MR. LEE LAWSON: and outward communication.
26	Then folks like Herb and the Cities and other folks
27	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Right.
28	MR. LEE LAWSON: that are doing promotional

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1	for our county. And Herb and them spend millions and
2	millions and millions of dollars a year advertising this
3	community and and really, you know, multiple
4	communities here.
5	So if if we have a great, you know, brand for
6	this county and a great communication, outward-focused
7	communication, branding campaign, then that Herb and
8	others will pick that up and cross promote it.
9	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Right.
10	MR. LEE LAWSON: And I think I think that's
11	another kind of outcome of what this process could
12	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Right.
13	MR. LEE LAWSON: could, you know, really
14	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Well, I
15	think
16	MR. LEE LAWSON: The County
17	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: we need
18	to probably have maybe a a little workshop or
19	something on this this on the branding portion.
20	Now, do we want to hold off on the promotional items
21	until we do that, or do we
22	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
23	I think so. Because we need it all needs to tie
24	together.
25	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: It needs to.
26	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
27	Yeah.
28	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: I agree.

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1	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Okay.
2	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
3	Yeah.
4	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Because we've got
5	multiple front doors and we've got multiple ways that
6	people find out about this.
7	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: We'll just
8	take it to
9	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: And the more that
10	we
11	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: another
12	work session?
13	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: can think
14	about what those are
15	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
16	Yeah.
17	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: the better
18	this material can be utilized, I believe.
19	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
20	Yeah.
21	MR. WAYNE DYESS: And maybe from the branding
22	standpoint, what what goes into that? How does that
23	work? How do you define the brand?
24	MS. JENNIFER JENKINS: Well, that's a a
25	great question. And we do a lot of brand discovery. And
26	we would sit down with all of you, and we have some
27	pretty extensive questions we ask and, you know, really
28	probe about, like I was saying, who all are we speaking

1	to? Who are you trying to reach?
2	Think about who's coming into our county, you know,
3	and the why as well as, you know, from aesthetics.
4	That's the that's kind of the easy part. It's the
5	messaging and making sure it's speaking to the right
6	audience.
7	And so we sit down, you know, and really have a a
8	deep dive into, you know, who are you, who you want to
9	be, and and then take that and we develop several
10	branding concepts for you to review. And we make sure
11	that you love it.
12	We've done that with Lee and his team many, many
13	times for different initiatives. And, you know, it's
14	it's just really critical.
15	I think there's such a great opportunity not to just
16	look, you know, on the the the short-sided and do
17	something small, but to really think about it globally,
18	because there is a huge opportunity for us.
19	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: I'm good
20	with it.
21	MR. LEE LAWSON: And what we do, we break out
22	every audience. So, I mean, you know, if it's a if
23	it's the corporate community, corporate decisionmakers,
24	that's a that's a singular audience that we position
25	and and communication differently than we do our
26	our corporate stakeholders locally or our State partners
27	or, you know, existing business and industry.
28	So we have different audience groups that we

1	communicate with differently.
2	MS. JENNIFER JENKINS: You know, I was on the
3	phone with Lee when he was asking me to come to this
4	meeting. And I was actually there was someone in my
5	car, because we were going on a field trip with my
6	daughter. And I kind of am a little bit of a nerd, know
7	more about Baldwin County than than the average
8	resident.
9	And when I was telling this other mother about us
10	being like the seventh fastest growing metropolitan
11	statistical area in the United States, she had no idea.
12	So we need to talk to our own people
13	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: Right.
14	MS. JENNIFER JENKINS: as much as we do
15	the tourists know about us, because Herb and his team do
16	an excellent job. I think what we don't do as good a job
17	is making the people who live here understand, you know,
18	what they have and really be proud of it and to share
19	that with people, you know, their their children, my
20	children.
21	I have one graduating today, you know. I want him
22	to go get a degree, come back and, you know, live here,
23	work here, and be proud of the place where he grew up.
24	MR. WAYNE DYESS: What kind of time does it
25	take to develop this brand, and what kind of cost are we
26	talking about?
27	MS. JENNIFER JENKINS: You know, that's a
28	really good question. I mean, we can we typically

1	I would say the process can be anywhere from six weeks to
2	three months.
3	A lot of it depends on you, how long it takes for us
4	to do the the brand discovery. Your decisionmaking
5	process is obviously you guys have some very specific
6	formal meeting schedules, so that would come into play.
7	You know, in in terms of, you know, cost, I mean,
8	we can put together a a formal proposal, an estimate,
9	just depending on is it just branding? Do you want us to
10	look at an overall strategic marketing plan to help you
11	apply these to all of this?
12	Because, you know, it's it's kind of the
13	the start is the branding. And we've done this with a
14	lot of clients, so we can work on this simultaneously.
15	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: I think it
16	would be if we could call like maybe a special
17	could we do a special, just to work on that, so it
18	doesn't have to be involved with all the other business
19	that we have to conduct?
20	MR. WAYNE DYESS: We certainly could have a
21	special meeting. We could do that.
22	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: And
23	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
24	Do that or have the staff start you know, start
25	something.
26	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: The staff
27	can start getting something
28	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:

1	Start something and come back
2	MR. WAYNE DYESS: Gather information.
3	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: It's just
4	yeah.
5	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
6	You know, we've been working on this for quite a while
7	with these promotional items, you know. And but, you
8	know, if we wanted to do look at a re-branding, we
9	need to look at the whole factor.
10	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Exactly.
11	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
12	You know, it's like, you know, they said, you know, the
13	tourists know where we're at, and we cater to the
14	tourists. But our own people here, we don't do nothing
15	for them. We don't. You know, we don't have anything
16	that, you know
17	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: No.
18	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP)
19	GRUBER: we offer to them, you know, other than, you
20	know, just, hey, you know, you're here.
21	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Crowded
22	streets.
23	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
24	Yeah. Well
25	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: That's right.
26	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
27	Yeah.
28	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: That's right.

1 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 2 But, you know --3 COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: We've got 4 some crowded streets. 5 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: You know -- you know, if there was -- you know, we've got 6 7 to figure out what the cost is, too. Because if it's over a certain amount of dollars, you know, then we have 8 9 to, you know, do an RFP and --MS. JENNIFER JENKINS: Sure. 10 11 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: Yeah. So but --12 13 MS. JENNIFER JENKINS: Sure. And I understand 14 that. And -- and, obviously, we -- because of our work 15 with the EDA, we'd love the opportunity to work with y'all within your budget and, you know, within your --16 17 your --COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 25 Oh, yeah. 26 MR. LEE LAWSON: -- to have that tie and 27 that -- that cross promotion. And because, I mean, we --28 you know, we bill ourselves as the Baldwin County

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1	Economic Development Alliance, although we're a we're
2	a 501(c)(6) private entity. But we are your your
3	chief marketing arm from an economic development
4	COMMISSIONER JOE DAVIS, III: That's right.
5	MR. LEE LAWSON: standpoint. So we want to
6	see this be very seamless and and very cross
7	promotional as well. So we'll work with you and Wayne
8	and the staff to to make sure that that that's
9	that's achieved through this.
10	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Well, I do
11	have a question, while we're in the room right now.
12	There's some of these on here, though, I I know you
13	said they could apply to most anyplace. But some of them
14	would not apply to most anyplace. And I notice like Gulf
15	Shores is what is theirs? Big small town, big
16	beach, or something like that?
17	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Sure.
18	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: I mean, that
19	might apply to anybody with a beach. But, at the same
20	time, we know what that is around here. So if we're
21	talking about us so, I mean, is there is there
22	anything particularly you know, when you when you
23	come up with with slogans, it's all a matter of
24	of of opinion and that kind of stuff.
25	So is there anything particularly, you know I
26	thought some of these were really good, myself, when I
27	was looking at the PowerPoint Keri had yesterday.
28	You know, I I don't know what I just hate to

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1	go spend thousands and thousands of dollars for something
2	that might say just the same thing a little bit
3	different.
4	Is it that I mean, tell me. Is it that
5	different? What else could we say that would be that
6	different? Am I coming
7	MR. LEE LAWSON: Commissioner, I would say, you
8	know, going through the process several times with
9	Jennifer and her team and other firms we've we've
10	done this with some other firms as well in in in
11	past responsibilities at other companies that I've been
12	at.
13	And I think it's the you know, we may say some of
14	the same things the same way that some of these slogans
15	do. And I think all these slogans are are pointed.
16	And Anu and Keri and them, you know, they they love
17	this community, just like we do, and and want you
18	know, are are are and trying to communicate that
19	through these slogans.
20	But I think what this process will help us do is to
21	come up with a brand that is, like like Jennifer said,
22	thinks about all the audiences we're going to be
23	communicating with.
24	And I think once you see and go through the process
25	and see all of the the the options that will be
26	given to you to communicate Baldwin County to the

audiences, you'll see that the process is surely worth, 27

you know, the time and the resources spent on it. 28

24	so many different all of us are marketing arms of this
25	county, whether we acknowledge that or realize that.
26	But then there's so many people those ladies that
27	were here earlier, they'll have a chance to spread the
28	word for us. The new employers coming in to work here,

2	Most of the time they know that's where my
3	grandparents took me to the beach, you know, years ago.
4	And so I'm going to get to work there. But we need to
5	target them as being part of the communication.
6	And your message is never final. It's always
7	growing, always expanding. And it's it's impacted by
8	seasons, and it's impacted by different parts of the
9	county. So having logos and and things like this
10	are they're a tool to a bigger process, in my mind.

5	Mr. Matthew Brown, the Director of BRATS, is here to
6	kind of go into some further details with this. But this
7	item is just to discuss some proposed cutbacks in the
8	seasonal summer routes.
9	So, Matthew, I'm going to let you explain that.
10	MR. MATTHEW BROWN: Thank you, Joey. Good
11	morning, Commissioners. This is an agenda item to
12	discuss our seasonal routes.
13	Last year in Fiscal Year '18, we provided five
14	seasonal routes. You'll see up there we have it shown in
15	three for to consolidate those regions with two routes
16	and then Burger King and McDonald's was an additional
17	route.
18	That represented about five thousand, two hundred
19	(5,200) service hours. Service hours represent the
20	clock-in time from the driver to the clock-out time. So
21	this is driver service time to provide those routes.
22	Transported almost twenty thousand (20,000) people.
23	MR. JOEY NUNNALLY: Just just to kind of
24	back up just for a second so that just the YES
25	Program, Regal, and Burger King are basically programs to
26	where we haul students down to the island, down to Gulf
27	Shores and Orange Beach, for for workforce. So it's
28	workforce routes.

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1	MR. MATTHEW BROWN: Yeah.
2	MR. JOEY NUNNALLY: Just back up.
3	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
4	This is is this part of that the thing that Mobile
5	started with us? It's I can't remember the name of
6	it.
7	MR. MATTHEW BROWN: The YES Program.
8	MR. JOEY NUNNALLY: The YES Program was
9	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
10	YES Program. Yeah. Okay.
11	MR. JOEY NUNNALLY: But, now, the Regal and
12	Burger King routes we've been doing for years.
13	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
14	Okay. All right. Burger King did it? Okay.
15	MR. MATTHEW BROWN: That's right. I apologize.
16	The YES Program is primarily Mobile County residents,
17	students. Regal and Burger King are are J-1 Visa
18	International students helping in the hospitality
19	industry down there.
20	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
21	Okay.
22	MR. MATTHEW BROWN: So, next, after passenger
23	trips here, farebox, so the total fares we collected from
24	these in FY18. These again, summer routes just
25	running basically from Memorial Day to Labor Day was
26	seventy-two thousand dollars (\$72,000). Our total
27	service cost And you can think of this as the gross
28	service cost was two hundred sixty-five thousand

1	dollars (\$265,000). You can see a pretty substantial
2	deficit there.
3	Lisa, if you'll go on to the next slide. That
4	service cost can be divided into an operational cost, an
5	administrative cost, and a capital cost.
6	Now, these are not published routes for us. These
7	were route the businesses came and there was just a
8	decision made on BRATS' side that, hey, there's an
9	opportunity to increase ridership. Let's let's try
10	them. And so they did. And and then
11	that's essentially how these costs broke down for FY18.
12	If we want to move forward to the next slide, I want
13	to explain a little bit about how we get get
14	reimbursed. You can see our actual cost to the
15	Commission. So the green is our operational cost. Blue
16	is our admin. Yellow is our capital.
17	The way that these reimbursements work Lisa, if
18	you can go to the next one first of all, you take the
19	farebox or the fares off of our operation, and that
20	brings us down to our net operation net operating cost
21	of one hundred twelve thousand dollars (\$112,000).
22	And this is where the grants start kicking in. The
23	Federal Government reimburses fifty percent (50%) of our
24	operational cost, which means local matches and other
25	fifty percent (50%). And for admin it's eighty percent
26	(80%) from the Federal grant, which means twenty percent
27	(20%) local.
28	And then for capital, it's eighty percent (80%) and

1	twenty percent (20%) local as well. Now, that's for this
2	type of route. It's a little bit different for for
3	each route, depending on fareboxes or contracts. So that
4	means the total local cost for these routes was
5	seventy-two thousand, four hundred dollars (\$72,400).
6	Because of the substantial cost of these routes to
7	the Commission, we reached out to these summer providers
8	and said we need to make sure we're getting full cost
9	recovery for these routes.
10	And we also do provide two additional routes down
11	there called BeachLinc and Central Transfer. And we said
12	here are the routes that we currently have existing
13	that that operate no matter what.
14	We would like to maximize the utilization of those
15	routes as much as possible and then in the future see if
16	there's a better way to consolidate efforts between
17	multiple business businesses down there to see if
18	there's a way to get full cost recovery on these other
19	routes.
20	MR. JOEY NUNNALLY: Increase our ridership, in
21	other words.
22	MR. MATTHEW BROWN: That's right. Right. The
23	reality is we had almost seventeen (17) routes I
24	should say runs going down to the beach every day for
25	these seasonal routes. And that's a one-way trip.
26	That's another seventeen (17) coming back.
27	Those went from about 5:30 a.m. to almost midnight
28	seven days a week during the summer. So we were running

1 a ton of buses down there last year at a substantial 2 cost.

So, reaching out, we've met with all of those individuals in the past couple of weeks. They're going to try to maximize BeachLinc and Central Transfer. And they want to work with us much earlier next year -- We're talking about December or January -- to say can we bring everybody to the table at once? That's what's going to be required. Can we normalize the schedule?

10 So that way McDonald's and Burger King aren't 11 demanding different times. That's essentially what 12 happened. They said we need to be here at 8:30 and we 13 need to be done here at 7:00. So we need two separate 14 buses for this. Is there a way we can get them to 15 compromise so we're all running more people on these 16 buses?

17 So we told these summer route providers, if -- if 18 you still feel like you need additional transportation 19 this summer, you know, let us know, and we'll see if we 20 can work up some proposal to bring before the Commission. 21 So far they have not come back to us to utilize anything 22 beyond the BeachLinc and the Central Transfer.

But this is going to be a reduction of our -- our summer routes. Last year in the budget they -- the prior Commission reduced our drivers by six drivers. We currently have six additional vacancies that we're going to choose not to fill. So that's essentially a staffing reduction of twelve (12) drivers from last year.

1	And we feel very comfortable with our staffing
2	levels right now, because we're not going to have to lump
3	a huge amount of summer routes back on.
4	Moving forward, we'd like to find a way to make this
5	work. We think this is an important service. But we
6	want it to be done in a way that the the Commission
7	isn't footing the bill for that.
8	So any questions about that or discussion or any
9	feedback on how you'd like us to need to work on that?
10	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: So what
11	you're saying is that it costs us seventy-two, thousand
12	three hundred ninety-two dollars (\$72,392) to transport
13	that how many nineteen thousand (19,000) or
14	seventeen thousand (17,000) people was it?
15	MR. MATTHEW BROWN: That's correct. It was
16	just under twenty thousand (20,000).

That's -- that's all -- adds up all the twenty percent 3 4 (20%) thing. 5 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: That's everything in there. 6 7 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. 13	MR. JOEY NUNNALLY: We'll get it added in.

19	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
20	All right. Next.
21	MR. JOEY NUNNALLY: Okay. Item C-12 is going
22	to be Weeks Bay Foundation request to install signage at
23	Mullet Point and View Point boat ramps. The staff
24	recommendation would be just to discuss the request from
25	Ms
26	MS. YAEL GIRARD: Yael.
27	MR. JOEY NUNNALLY: Yael Girard Thank you
28	very much the Executive Director of the Weeks Bay

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1	Foundation to install signage to Mullet Point and View
2	Point boat ramps regarding derelict vessels in the
3	waterways.
4	So derelict vessels tend to give us a lot of
5	problems, especially after large storm events. She
6	reached out to me via e-mail a week or so ago. And I
7	asked her just to come to the meeting and kind of present
8	what her some of her ideas were.
9	So I'll turn it over to you.
10	MS. YAEL GIRARD: Okay. So, again, my name is
11	Yael Girard. It's kind of a hard one, so you can say
12	YaYa or whatever.
13	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
14	Okay.
15	MS. YAEL GIRARD: That's fine. I'm the
16	Director of the Weeks Bay Foundation. For those folks
17	who don't know about us, we were formed in 1990 as a
18	friends group to the Weeks Bay Reserve.
19	But we have since become an accredited land trust,
20	which means that we protect critical habitats throughout
21	Baldwin and Mobile Counties, acres of endangered species,
22	sensitive habitats and ecosystems.
23	And we also restore those areas and help to educate
24	the community about the importance of our natural
25	resources on the coast.
26	When they were doing the PR presentation, I noticed
27	that like eighty percent (80%) of the slogans were about
28	rivers and bays and how important the waterways are. So

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1	that's a big part of what we do.
2	Marine debris is a big problem in our area,
3	especially in our bays and the ocean. And we have a
4	specifically difficult time with derelict and abandoned
5	vessels.
6	So that's the technical term. It basically means
7	sunken or stranded boats that happen often after storms.
8	But sometimes because people don't want to put in the
9	maintenance or the time or the insurance on them, and so
10	they just let them drift away.
11	And so the boats are an issue, because they're a
12	navigational danger. Anyone who's been in Weeks Bay,
13	there have been boats that are just below the surface in
14	the navigational channels. And when you're in a bay
15	that's already only four feet deep, that's that's a
16	bit of a challenge.
17	It's also an environmental issue with pollution and
18	leaking different different chemicals and oils from
19	the boats. And it's a danger to our wildlife and an
20	eyesore. When people come to our bays and rivers, they
21	don't want to be looking at these these boats sunk or
22	stranded.
23	We so gained funding from the NOAA Marine Debris
24	Removal Project Program. And we had a couple of
25	objectives to remove five derelict and abandoned vessels
26	from Weeks Bay and Turkey Branch, remove five pieces of
27	other large marine debris, do some community education
28	and outreach about this issue, and then to create a

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1	campaign to sort of help for prevention, which we decided
2	to entitle "DERELICT IS DANGEROUS."
3	And this is going to include signage and cards
4	placed at marinas and launches. I've given all of y'all
5	a copy of the actual signage and the cards. There's a
6	hardcopy around.

10	MS. YAEL GIRARD: And so this That's really
11	hard to read but Weeks Bay. And the pins, the yellow
12	pins are are where all of our different vessels were
13	that we ended up pulling. So we had a couple up in
14	Turkey Branch, a couple on the eastern shore of Weeks
15	Bay, and then one at the mouth of Magnolia River as well.
16	So the results, we actually ended up pulling six
17	extra six boats. We got an extra one from where it
18	was stacked, two on top of each other. We got three
19	pieces of large marine debris, including a transom and a
20	motor from some other vessels, or or cars, we're not
21	sure.
22	We've had education and discussions so far with over
23	one hundred (100) community members. We've created this
24	DERELICT IS DANGEROUS campaign. And we've scheduled
25	remediation plantings for the shoreline area for June 1st
26	to to get the shoreline spots back in shape after
27	pulling those boats.
28	We've also had approval from Marine Resources to

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1	install signage at the boat ramps that they maintain.
2	And so now we're coming forward to the County Commission
3	to see if we can get approval to install the same signs
4	at Mullet Point and View Point, which are
5	County-maintained ramps.
6	It is our hope that this this information will
7	help the community understand their responsibilities
8	related to their their vessels and also who to contact
9	should they see a boat floated or or stranded.
10	So we worked a lot with Alea in the Marine Police
11	division on this project and on the removal of those
12	boats. So if you have any questions
13	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Consent.
14	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Consent.
15	MS. YAEL GIRARD: Okay.
16	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
17	Okay.
18	MS. YAEL GIRARD: And there is the campaign
19	material, if you didn't
20	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
21	Very good.
22	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: So
23	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Is this only
24	for removing them out of the water or like like when
25	you see one pushed on the shore?
26	MS. YAEL GIRARD: So some of the boats that we
27	removed were completely submerged, and some of them were
28	partially inundated and on the shoreline but not

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1	functioning, usually a lot of hull damage. And a lot of
2	them had been sitting there for potentially ten (10) to
3	twenty (20) years and had never been removed.
4	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Like the
5	Morning Star?
6	MS. YAEL GIRARD: I'm sorry?
7	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Like the
8	Morning Star in Bon Secour.
9	MS. YAEL GIRARD: Yes. Exactly. So the the
10	goal of this campaign is actually prevention. The
11	project that we did was removal. After every storm, we
12	get more boats. And it's really hard in Alabama.
13	There's not great maritime laws for holding people
14	accountable for their boats. And so this is an effort to
15	try and limit the amount that go back into the water.
16	So those cards will be at the marinas and at the
17	boat shops. And we'll try and get those out to local
18	vendors as well, people who are selling these boats, like
19	Forsman's Marine, Paradise Marine.
20	But then at the launches, we want that big sign to
21	be there so people really understand that this is
22	navigationally dangerous, environmentally hazardous with
23	the chemical toilets and oil and things coming out, and
24	that they can prevent this by properly mooring and doing
25	dry storage, emptying and flushing out their chemical
26	toilets, and things like that before a storm so that they
27	can be better stewards.

(SKIP) GRUBER: Yeah. 6 7 8 G-3 - DISCUSSION OF PROPOSED ZONING TEXT AMENDMENTS AND MASTER 9 PLANNING EFFORTS MR. VINCE JACKSON: My last item has to do with 10 11 some proposed zoning text amendments and some discussion 12 of some master planning efforts. 13 This is just us seeking guidance from you all as to how to move forward with some possible amendments. A 14 15 number of these have to do with the Fort Morgan area. 16 And as -- as you are aware, that's a -- that's a 17 unique area of the county. The residents down there are 18 very concerned, very interested in -- in what is being 19 done. So we -- we have identified some certain issues and 20 21 have drafted some proposed amendments that would address 22 some of the problems that we see down there. 23 One applies to our HDR, High Density Residential, 24 destination. Basically we would just say that HDR is not available in Planning District 25. 25 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 26 27 Uh-huh. (Indicates affirmatively.) MR. VINCE JACKSON: We've also drafted some 28

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1 language pertaining to dune walkovers. This is something that we've been working on with some of the residents 2 3 down there for a long time. 4 This is -- this will be our first opportunity to look at it with the new Commission. We plan to visit the 5 Fort Morgan Zoning Advisory Committee again next month to 6 7 talk about some of these issues. This is certainly one that we will talk about. 8 I think on the dune walkover language, I think we --9 this still needs a little bit of work. Mike needs to be 10 11 involved in it. And I think there's some things that we 12 need to clarify in terms of what do we want the maximum 13 height to be. Basically this came about because someone built a --14 a walkover that came straight off an elevated deck. And 15 it's about -- I can't remember the exact elevation. But 16 it's about fifteen (15) feet up. And it's created some 17 concerns down there. So that -- We've been working with 18 the residents on this and will continue to do so. 19 20 The next part of this has to do with the zoning 21 considerations in flood prone areas. And I want to give 22 you -- we have revised the map somewhat from what you 23 have in your packet. COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 24 25 Just -- just one second. Back on this dune walkover --MR. VINCE JACKSON: Uh-huh. (Indicates 26 27 affirmatively.) COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) 28

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1	GRUBER: you know, Fish and Wildlife has to be involved
2	in this also.
3	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Certainly.
4	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
5	And that's that's that's where the the rub comes
6	with these folks. They don't want to You know,
7	they'll give you a say yes, it's okay here. But then
8	somebody'll holler and say something about it, and it'll
9	change their mind.
10	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Right.
11	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
12	I mean, so we need to make sure that Fish and Wildlife
13	definitely They're the ones that manage this anyway.
14	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Yes, sir.
15	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
16	I mean, we don't really manage it. It's them. So I
17	think, you know you know, I think we need to let them
18	manage it and we stay out of it, you know.
19	Because it it it makes it it makes it tough
20	for us, you know. And it it you know, it drags us
21	into all kinds of stuff that, you know, really it's
22	out of our out of our thing. We can't do nothing
23	about it anyway.
24	MR. VINCE JACKSON: And that's a concern that
25	we have at the staff level.
26	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
27	You know
28	MR. VINCE JACKSON: But we we were

1 approached by residents down there. 2 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 3 I know. MR. VINCE JACKSON: And we've attempted to be 4 5 accommodating. So, ultimately, whether we adopt it or it 6 is to you all. 7 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 8 Well, us adopting it, you know, I don't know if we're 9 still going to -- if it's going to give us any authority. We're adopting that gives us no authority to do nothing 10 11 basically. 12 ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: Well, Mr. Chairman, 13 you're exactly right that the authority to regulate that lies with ADEM. But the ADEM relations and the -- And 14 15 what's the other one, Fish and Wildlife? MR. VINCE JACKSON: Fish and Wildlife. 16 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 17 Fish and Wildlife. 18 ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: The real issue -- And 19 20 Vince was very strategic in how he drafted this. He's 21 incorporated the existing provisions from Fish and 22 Wildlife, which is that the dune has to be a minimum 23 of -- I mean, the walkover has to be a minimum one foot. 24 Is that right, Vince? 25 MR. VINCE JACKSON: Yes. 26 ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: And then also the only other limitation that's there is that the -- the landing 27 28 of the pier has to be at least ten (10) feet or

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1	fourteen (14) feet, Vince?
2	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Ten (10) feet.
3	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: Ten (10) feet beyond
4	the vegetated line on the dunes. So he's incorporated
5	their basic rules. But the only real reason that this
6	was begun to be approached by you all is there's no
7	height limitation.
8	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Yeah.
9	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: Fish and Wildlife,
10	nobody has a height. So under their regs, it can be as
11	high as it wants.
12	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
13	Uh-huh. (Indicates affirmatively.)
14	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: The question is for
15	you all is whether or not you want to basically bring in
16	a height limitation as to how high that walkover can be.
17	You know, an argument can be made the higher it is,
18	the better it is for for flood damage and for
19	protective stuff. But I will tell you, if you go there
20	and look at that and look down the street and imagine
21	about twenty-five (25) or thirty (30) of them that high,
22	it
23	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Right.
24	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: it's interesting.
25	So that that's really the the narrow reason that
26	the that that amendment is sitting there, is to try
27	and address the height.
28	But, again, y'all don't have to do it. It's not

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1	presently in zoning. But the question was whether or not
2	y'all would want to. So that's why he's drafted it that
3	way.
4	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
5	Okay. Well, like I say, but, you know, by by
6	regulating it, you know, if we say, well, it's you
7	know, it's going to be one foot, you know, above the
8	the the dune line, that changes that down there.
9	If it gets you know, if they get covered up
10	We've got one of our own that we have that is just about
11	covered up.
12	So, you know, what do we do, you know? You know, we
13	still have to provide the thing. So then we've got to go
14	back and rebuild that whole thing, I mean, at at the
15	cost of it.
16	So, I mean, having it up a little bit higher is
17	probably better than having it down flat on the ground as
18	far as, you know, maintaining it.
19	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: And that's the
20	discussion that y'all need to have. Somewhere between
21	what we've got down there now, five (5) and fifteen (15)
22	is probably a magic number.
23	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
24	Yeah.
25	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: But
26	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Well, when
27	we went
28	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: that's something

BALDWIN COUNTY COMMISSION WORK SESSION 05/14/2019 1 but then the best way to do it is go look at it. If you haven't seen it, it's worth looking at --2 3 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: Oh, yeah. I've --4 5 ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: -- and then imagining 6 it, you know, up -- up and down the whole way. 7 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Well, after 8 looking at that one that we looked -- is that what we're 9 talking about, that one --MR. VINCE JACKSON: Yes. 10 11 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: -- that we looked at that day? 12 13 MR. VINCE JACKSON: Uh-huh. (Indicates affirmatively.) 14 15 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Like you said, if you end up with -- if everybody out there did 16 17 that, that would be really high. MR. VINCE JACKSON: Uh-huh. (Indicates 18 affirmatively.) 19 20 MR. WAYNE DYESS: I think the problem with that 21 one was it went beyond the dune line out into the sandy 22 beach area. And it was still at the same height. And 23 that --24 MR. VINCE JACKSON: Yeah. And they -- they 25 originally --26 MR. WAYNE DYESS: That -- that was what caused 27 the controversy. 28 MR. VINCE JACKSON: They -- they originally had

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it much further out. They were required to bring it 1 2 back. 3 COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER: 4 Back. Yeah. 5 ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: But, if I'm not mistaken, Vince -- And that's another thing -- another 6 7 reason we kind of duplicated what the State had, was 8 there's an argument that could be made that at the time 9 they received their permit --MR. VINCE JACKSON: Uh-huh. (Indicates 10 11 affirmatively.) ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: -- there was no 12 13 limitation, the way they had it end past the dune. MR. VINCE JACKSON: Right. Right. 14 ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: And so they built it 15 down to mean high tide. 16 MR. VINCE JACKSON: Uh-huh. (Indicates 17 18 affirmatively.) ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: And if everybody did 19 20 that, and then you'd have to walk in the water --21 MR. VINCE JACKSON: That's right. 22 ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: -- at high tide to get 23 around that pier. 24 MR. VINCE JACKSON: That's right. 25 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Yeah. ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: And so it's worth 26 27 trying to address it. 28 MR. VINCE JACKSON: And --

1	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: I
2	MR. VINCE JACKSON: one of the things that
3	we put in there was that it would initiate at the at
4	the ground level and go over the dune. It couldn't
5	initiate at a raised deck like that one you saw down
6	there.
7	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Right. I
8	think it's worthwhile.
9	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Yeah. You know, there
10	some of the questions is how high do we need to go? We
11	suggested a maximum height of five (5) feet. The
12	residents want a maximum height of three (3) feet. Our
13	concern is if you stay too low, it's going to get covered
14	up.
15	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Right.
16	MR. VINCE JACKSON: So we we still And
17	these are like Commissioner Gruber said, these are
18	moving targets. These are subject to change.
19	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Right.
20	MR. VINCE JACKSON: So we need to figure out
21	if if you all do want us to do this, what will be the
22	best regulations. I feel like there's still a lot of
23	conversation that needs to take place on this. And, like
24	I said, we'll be back with the Fort Morgan committee next
25	month
26	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: I I
27	MR. VINCE JACKSON: to talk about this some
28	more.

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1	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: And I would
2	like to know like more of if we didn't do it, what are
3	the you know, what is the what was that slogan?
4	What's the cost of doing nothing?
5	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Right.
6	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
7	Well, but it still it would fall it would fall
8	under the Fish and Wildlife, I mean, you know. And
9	they they still have to get a permit from the Fish and
10	Wildlife do it. So that's so, you know
11	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: I I guess the
12	answer, the short of it, Vince, if I if I'm thinking
13	about this right, tell me. I guess the short answer
14	would be as it exists today
15	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Uh-huh. (Indicates
16	affirmatively.)
17	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: they couldn't extend
18	any walkover, whether it started on the ground
19	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Uh-huh. (Indicates
20	affirmatively.)
21	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: or whether it
22	started on their deck beyond fourteen (14) feet past the
23	dune.
24	MR. VINCE JACKSON: I think it's ten (10).
25	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Ten (10)
26	feet.
27	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
28	Ten (10) feet.

129 BALDWIN COUNTY COMMISSION WORK SESSION 05/14/2019 1 ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: Yeah. Ten (10) feet 2 past the dune line. So the length part has been 3 addressed by Fish and Wildlife --4 MR. VINCE JACKSON: Uh-huh. (Indicates 5 affirmatively.) ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: -- we think. 6 7 MR. VINCE JACKSON: Right. 8 ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: The height part, the 9 minimum of it, has been addressed by Fish and Wildlife. But the -- the distinction that Vince has drawn is 10 11 starting it from land and crossing over as opposed to starting fifteen (15), twenty (20) feet in the air, you 12 13 know, if the deck is extending out the size of this room and then trying to step it off and bring it down so that 14 it becomes more of an outdoor space out of your living 15 from that of a true dune walkover. 16 17 (Commissioner Joe Davis, III, left the Baldwin County Work 18 Session.) 19 20 21 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Right. 22 ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: That's the 23 discussion --24 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Like a 25 platform --26 ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: -- that you all have to 27 have. COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: 28 -- and

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1	there's a, you know, building deck platform going in
2	it
3	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: Right.
4	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: rather
5	that it just being a walkover
6	COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: That's
7	right.
8	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: you
9	know
10	ATTORNEY DAVID CONNER: That's the discussion
11	y'all have got to figure out as to what y'all
12	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Extended
13	patio. Okay.
14	MR. VINCE JACKSON: But I figure like I
15	said, I figure that there's there's more discussion
16	that's needed on this. We just kind of wanted since
17	we have some other issues that we're thinking about, we
18	wanted to go ahead and let you all know about this one.
19	Another issue from the Fort Morgan area has to do
20	with parking. We recently adopted some parking standards
21	which are tied to the number of bedrooms in a dwelling.
22	Previously we just said a a single-family dwelling
23	or or a duplex would only be required to have two (2)
24	parking spaces per dwelling, you know.
25	But what we have found is that in especially in
26	the Fort Morgan area, with the desire for rental
27	property, that that's not sufficient. So we did we
28	did recent about two years ago, we adopted the parking

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1	standards that are tied to the number of bedrooms.
2	But another thing we would like to at least consider
3	and is including a statement that the parking spaces
4	should not be stacked.
5	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
6	Yeah.
7	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Because, as it is right
8	now, they can be stacked. And I think if you if you
9	make it so that they can't be stacked, then the builders
10	are going to be more they're going to think a little
11	bit about because of the space that's will be
12	necessary for parking, they'll think a little bit about
13	how big they want these dwelling to be.
14	Also, in a lot of cases, that has to be approved by
15	Fish and Wildlife. They're only going to approve so much
16	space for parking. So that has a a further limitation
17	on these large number of bedrooms that are going to be
18	rented out. This is again, this is just a talking
19	point to kind of get us started in this direction.
20	And the last thing, and and this is something
21	that would have a
22	MR. WAYNE DYESS: Vince, can I stop you real
23	quick?
24	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Yes.
25	MR. WAYNE DYESS: About the parking stacking
26	issue, from my previous experience, I will tell you that
27	what happens is you you have this required parking and
28	they'll just stack. And so people don't want to be

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1	behind other people.
2	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Right.
3	MR. WAYNE DYESS: So you may have you may
4	have six parking spaces that are stacked or two-by-two.
5	But people don't want to be the first one in, because
6	then you can't back out, can't go anywhere. So they
7	just I'm I'm going to park on the street.
8	MR. VINCE JACKSON: They'll park on the
9	right-of-way.
10	MR. WAYNE DYESS: You know, they'll park on the
11	street. And then in Fort Morgan, the sand is already
12	encroaching on the roadway. And so then you're getting
13	closer and closer to the street.
14	What happens many times in the summertime, if you go
15	down there, you really can't pass even a normal vehicle,
16	much less any kind of emergency vehicle. So that's kind
17	of where that I think that's a that's, I think, a
18	key consideration.
19	Sorry, Vince.
20	MR. VINCE JACKSON: No. You're fine. And when
21	we adopted this back in 2017, we we actually had
22	feedback from the the volunteer fire department
23	talking about, you know, the difficulty that they have in
24	getting down the streets at certain times of the year.
25	So I think there is a desire to to see that possibly
26	addressed further.
27	And then the last thing that I I included has to
28	do with building height. And this would be applicable to

1	all the zoned planning districts.
2	Previously, we had a a we have a building
3	height for single-family dwellings, which is thirty-five
4	(35) feet. And that's applicable to duplex dwellings
5	also.
6	Previously, prior to 2009, we had a a requirement
7	that you also have a two-and-a-half 2-1/2 story limit.
8	In 2009, we removed that. And I think we realized that
9	we probably should have left it in.
10	But the issue that we had at the time was the the
11	half-story definition was somewhat difficult. And if you
12	will remember when we had Sea Glade last week, we
13	recommended a two-and-a-half $(2-1/2)$ story height limit.
14	So we've we've recommended One of the things
15	we'd like to do And this would be subject to
16	Commission approval would be to restore the
17	two-and-a-half (2-12) stories.
18	And, along with that, we would also need to come up
19	with a a better definition. I think what tripped us
20	up before was the definition was somewhat confusing. And
21	I think Wayne and I have talked about it a little bit.
22	And it think we have an idea for something that'll be
23	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Sounds good.
24	MR. VINCE JACKSON: a lot more simple
25	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Sounds good.
26	MR. VINCE JACKSON: and straightforward.
27	But this is really just to seek guidance from you all.

MR. WAYNE DYESS: And, Vince, I think you

28

1	forgot one, the flood hazard area.
2	MR. VINCE JACKSON: I think I kind of skipped
3	over that one.
4	MR. WAYNE DYESS: Okay.
5	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Yeah. The flood hazard
6	area is in there. That that would apply for that's
7	in the Fort Morgan section, the local provisions for
8	District 25.
9	And that would there's a I I'll gave you
10	the map, the revised map, that we would use along with
11	that. And that would give us some some better
12	guidance for our zoning decisions and give us some
13	some recommendations about when when certain things
14	should be approved, when they shouldn't be approved, some
15	recommendations about clustering.
16	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: If it'll
17	give you better guidance, that is great.
18	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Well, Wayne Wayne
19	basically put this together.
20	MR. WAYNE DYESS: And, Mr. Chairman, just to
21	kind of give you some I mean, so we we a minute
22	ago, we discussed the Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance.
23	This also will give you credit for CRS.
24	And CRS program is the Community Rating System that
25	FEMA sponsors. And basically the lower your score in the
26	CRS program, the bigger discounts you get for your flood
27	insurance.
28	So the more things you do to prevent flood damage,

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1	the more credit you get, which, again, means dollars in
2	people's pockets.
3	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
4	Uh-huh. (Indicates affirmatively.)
5	MR. WAYNE DYESS: So if you've got a flood
6	insurance policy, the more things we do, the more
7	discounts you get, the less you pay in your in your
8	in your policy.
9	But what this is, this is two parts. One is the
10	coastal high hazard area, which is the area of the
11	Category 1 storm surge. And it's mapped. And in there
12	is probably the most vulnerable properties we have in the
13	county.
14	When you talk about a Category 1 storm surge, those
15	are the areas that get hit the most and the most frequent
16	and then also the most damage you have there.
17	And, with that, it would mean basically that the
18	current zoning would stay the same. Re-zoning would
19	would be discouraged, basically.
20	And then also we go move next to the the the
21	flood zone areas that's in a flood zone. Now, if you
22	the map you have, if you think about everything basically
23	west of Keva Dunes, that generally is going to be in
24	that in some sort of flood zone.
25	We have also have some CBRA zones. And CBRA
26	zones are designated by Congress as areas where they will
27	not provide any flood insurance because of the of the
28	hazards of the area and also the Federal funds aren't

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1	provided. And that's for the for the CBRA the CBRA
2	zone regulations that Congress adopted.
3	In those areas, the flood zone is what we are
4	suggesting is nothing below low density I mean,
5	nothing but low density should should be approved.
6	Now, bear in mind, if you look at the zoning map for
7	Fort Morgan, there are lots and lots of properties that
8	are zoned R-4 that are that exist in these areas.
9	Well, this would be and that wouldn't change the
10	current zoning whatsoever. This would just be for future
11	re-zonings, if they are requested. This would, again,
12	provide that guidance for that. If it's currently zoned
13	that way, it would not affect that at all. And
14	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: I agree.
15	There's just been a lot of in the past six months,
16	just since the new Commission has come
17	MR. WAYNE DYESS: Right.
18	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: this has
19	come up many times. And I think my question has been
20	many, many times, do we have the proper guidance to go
21	by? And you have said no.
22	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Right.
23	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: And so if
24	this will help, then I think this is great to get going.
25	And and what is your when you say this is just
26	for discussion, what kind of a timeframe are you looking
27	at as to to I know you might want to
28	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Uh-huh. (Indicates

1	affirmatively.)
2	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: fine tune
3	that definition and
4	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Uh-huh. (Indicates
5	affirmatively.)
6	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: these
7	other things, but what kind of a timeframe are you
8	looking at discussing this with the Fort Morgan group, in
9	June or what?
10	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Well, we're we we're
11	scheduled to visit with them at their June meeting, which
12	is June 19th.
13	Now, typically whenever we present amendments to the
14	zoning ordinance, the first thing we do is to ask the
15	County Commission to authorize us to start advertising
16	and and commence the process. And we do that because
17	it involves County money.
18	We're not asking you to do that at this time. But
19	if you want to go ahead and authorize us, we can go ahead
20	and get started. Along those lines, we would
21	MR. WAYNE DYESS: Just real quick, so for
22	the for the Fort Morgan Advisory Committee, do we
23	do we have to bring these items to them for their
24	recommendation anyway; correct?
25	MR. VINCE JACKSON: Yes.
26	MR. WAYNE DYESS: So would it
27	MR. VINCE JACKSON: We're going to we're
28	MR. WAYNE DYESS: Would it be appropriate for

BALDWIN COUNTY COMMISSION WORK SESSION 05/14/2019 us, for the -- for the Commission to -- to decide if they 1 2 want to do this? 3 MR. VINCE JACKSON: Uh-huh. (Indicates 4 affirmatively.) 5 MR. WAYNE DYESS: And then, with our current procedures, go forward to the advisory committee with 6 7 what -- what the Commission has -- has --8 MR. VINCE JACKSON: Uh-huh. (Indicates 9 affirmatively.) 10 MR. WAYNE DYESS: -- suggested we do? 11 MR. VINCE JACKSON: Yeah, we can do that. MR. WAYNE DYESS: And so -- so then we -- we 12 13 check that box in June that we've --MR. VINCE JACKSON: Uh-huh. (Indicates 14 affirmatively.) 15 MR. WAYNE DYESS: -- we've gone to them for 16 17 their recommendation. COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Then come 18 back and make it --19 20 MR. VINCE JACKSON: With --21 MR. WAYNE DYESS: Right. 22 MR. VINCE JACKSON: With our current schedule, 23 we wouldn't be able to put it on a Planning Commission 24 agenda until July anyway. We're -- we're -- we're at the 25 point right now where we're already advertising --26 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: Right. MR. VINCE JACKSON: -- for the June meeting. 27 COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: For the June 28

23	H-1 - DISCUSSION AND DEMONSTRATION FROM TYLER TECHNOLOGIES ON
24	SOFTWARE AND SERVICES
25	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
26	All right. We're back. We're back in session. All
27	right. We left off at Item Number
28	COMMISSIONER BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: H.

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1	MR. WAYNE DYESS: H. Just a minute. Yes,
2	Mr. Chairman. We're at Item Number H-1 with Brian
3	Peacock.
4	MR. BRIAN PEACOCK: Good morning. I'm going to
5	keep my spiel really short so that we can get into the
6	the meat of the item that I've got before you.
7	About two and half years ago, we started looking at
8	a solution that would provide an overall application that
9	would meet the needs to replace our financial services,
10	our HR services, some of our project management software
11	that we have. And we came across Tyler Technologies.
12	And I'll let Mr. Davis speak to that shortly.
13	Last year we were able to bring in all the
14	departments to go through a very in-depth demo. And
15	we're talking a three-day demo where they come in and
16	were able to ask questions about the software that we
17	were presenting to them.
18	And David and his team went back and gave us a
19	response, whether they could meet the needs that that
20	our departments have, such as Highway Department,
21	Personnel Department, Finance and Accounting.
22	And I wanted to bring this before you, because we're
23	at a point now that that we're using, as you know,
24	JD Edwards, Enterprise 1. That is an oracle solution and
25	it is really geared more towards the corporate
26	environment.
27	And one of the great benefits about Tyler
28	Technologies And he'll get into this a little more

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1	in in depth is that they are structured for local
2	government. And the services that that they provide
3	are geared toward what our needs are as well as K12.
4	And I don't want to steal everything that you've
5	got. But we're going to go through a brief demo. And
6	this is really for you, Commissioners, because you've not
7	had an opportunity to look at this.
8	Most, if I believe all departments have sat
9	through the demo. They've all had an opportunity to,
10	whether they were able to make it or not, across the
11	three-day that we did last year.
12	So, without further ado, I'll turn it over to
13	Mr. David and let him go through it.
14	MR. DAVID REGNERY: Great. Thanks a lot for
15	the opportunity. Again, my name is David Regnery. I'm
16	the Senior Account Executive for Tyler Technologies.
17	It's not uncommon. Has anybody ever heard of Tyler
18	Technologies before?
19	(No response.)
20	MR. DAVID REGNERY: It's not uncommon. I like
21	to tell people we're the largest software company in the
22	Unites States that nobody's heard of. We are actually
23	the largest software in the country dedicated to the
24	public sector.
25	This is all that we do. We are pubically traded on
26	the New York Stock Exchange, so if you would like to take
27	a look at our financials, TYL is our ticker symbol.
28	I'd I would strongly encourage you to do so.

1	Tyler has sixteen hundred (1,600) local governments
2	across the United States using the system that we're
3	going to show you today.
4	It's very difficult for us to boil this down to a
5	fifteen (15) or twenty (20) minute presentation. But
6	what we do want to show you is some of the capabilities
7	that that we can offer.
8	Again, as Brian mentioned, we are exclusively
9	focused on the public sector. You guys are actually
10	using an Enterprise accounting solution as opposed to a
11	fund accounting solution, which truly differentiates
12	the the functionality of the product.
13	We focus on being able to improve government
14	efficiencies, effectiveness, and also transparency to
15	citizens, to vendors, and obviously to department heads
16	as well.
17	Traditionally, I will give a fifteen (15) or twenty
18	(20) minute overview of of the company before we do a
19	presentation. But for the sake of of your time, I
20	thought we'd jump right into the meat of it and show you
21	the software.
22	The gentleman that I've got on the other end is Jim
23	Davin. He's a Senior Solution Consultant. He actually
24	manages the department. I've been with the company for
25	twenty (20) years. Jim, I think, has been with the
26	company for twenty (20) or twenty-six (26) years.
27	If you've ever thought about a functionality that
28	you want as elected officials, that you want from your

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1	local or from your software solution, ask us and
2	there's a good chance Jim will be able to provide that to
3	you.
4	And, with that, unless have you any questions, I'm
5	going to turn it over to Jim.
6	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
7	One quick
8	MR. DAVID REGNERY: Yes, sir.
9	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
10	How long have y'all been in in business?
11	MR. DAVID REGNERY: Tyler has been in existence
12	since 1966. The software that that we're going to
13	show you was first developed in 1981. And and one of
14	the things that that I I really emphasize in my
15	overview is that regardless of changes to the software
16	that we provide, whether it's new functionality that
17	we're incorporating to the system or a complete
18	technology change, we provide that to you at no official
19	cost.
20	So right now the County is looking at, you know,
21	getting new software, going through the implementation
22	process, which nobody enjoys. With us, it's really
23	it's a one-stop.
24	Not only do we show are we going to show you our
25	ERP or Enterprise Resource Planning software, you know,
26	the financial stuff, Tyler also has community
27	development, public safety, courts and justice, tax and
28	appraisal. So virtually any software that a local

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1	government would need, Tyler has a solution for you.
2	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
3	Okay. All right.
4	MR. DAVID REGNERY: All right.
5	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
6	Okay.
7	MR. DAVID REGNERY: Jim, I think you're up,
8	Buddy.
9	MR. JIM DAVIS (VIA TELECONFERENCE): All right.
10	Great. Thank you, David. Well, good morning, everybody.
11	Again
12	COMMISSION CHAIRMAN CHARLES F. (SKIP) GRUBER:
13	Good morning.
14	MR. JIM DAVIS (VIA TELECONFERENCE): my name
15	is Jim Davin. I'll bring you through about fifteen (15)
16	minutes' worth of just kind of showing you the software.
17	Then upon at the end or you can certainly have
18	David yell at me if you have any questions as we go
19	through this here.
20	Just to give you kind of a quick scenario of what
21	the software allows you to do and so forth, obviously
22	you're seeing the application in front of you. It's
23	pretty straightforward in seeing what everybody expects
24	when you log in. I've already logged in as a user here.
25	And the system is configured around those user needs.
26	So completely configurable dashboard. So things
27	like my approvals or alerts at the top or notifications
28	or things I want to keep abreast on. So if I'm in the

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Sheriff's Department, I want to track, for instance, all
 of my overtime versus comp time work. All of this
 information is at my leisure to actually specify what is
 actually being shown to me.

And so when I come in at the end of the day, I don't have to run reports. I don't have to the call central office. It's all right in front of me all. All of these areas, whether it be up here with approvals, they're all actionable.

10 So, again, I don't have to go somewhere else. The 11 system brings up everything that I have to approve. So 12 if I have purchase orders or invoices or time sheets, I 13 can highlight these. I can see the details right from 14 here. And then across the bottom I can approve, forward, 15 reject, do what I need to do right within the dashboard 16 to, again, better utilize my time.

Same thing with all the charts. So if I'm keeping an eye on my overtime, as you see, I can hover over the charts and the graphs that are out there. They're configureable also in the sense of if I want to modify this to be a line graph, a bar chart.

It's not predisposed to have to be specifically in a certain manner. Everybody gets to select how they wish to see the information. Probably, most importantly, though, is getting into the details of that. So who am I spending my overtime on? So, as you see

27 here, I don't have to run reports. The system brings me 28 back. Here's everybody who I've paid overtime to, their

hours worked, and the amounts that are out there. All of the columns, as you see, you can click on them. So you can assort upon them up and down. So if I want to see who's -- I'm paying most overtime out to or who's working the most overtime hours, the least overtime hours, it's very easily sorted and configured, as well as exportable.

8 Everything in our system allows me to sit here and 9 actually say I want to output this information, so if I 10 do want to print it out PDF or Excel, I can certainly do 11 that as well as be very specific in what physically gets 12 exported out of the system.

So if I am going to a meeting and somebody has asked me about my overtime and I want to bring in an Excel spreadsheet or a printout document, it's done in two seconds. Again, I don't have to run reports. So things of that nature, it's all in front of me, very simplistic.

Locating information, by the way, is also -- I know a lot of Counties work with a lot of people who are in and out of different applications. So the usability is very important to us. We have a whole department. That's all they do is work with our customers.

So across the top, you'll see that there is a global search engine. So if somebody in your Finance Department receives a call from one of the vendors you work with like Dell, they just type in just like you do with like a Google, if you will, the vendor name Dell, and the system retrieves everything about Dell.

1	So I have all their purchase order history right in
2	front of me, all their invoice history right in front of
3	me. And, of course, I can get to all of the actual
4	vendor information if I wish to as well.

And, again, no need to go hunt and peck through menus or go to certain programs. It'll be a quick search right on the dashboard and brings me right to the transaction I need to deal with where I can everything about Dell, all the demographic information down the left-hand side, their direct information and so forth. It's pretty self-explanatory here.

But most importantly is how we retrieve everything about Dell for those users. So all the purchase order history is brought back in front of me just like their check history, just like their invoices.

But most importantly are the areas that you have a question that they're trying to answer with that vendor, so something of that nature.

I would have a purchase order that's out there. Then you may be talking about this PO-2019-001. The document that the vendor has in their hand is the exact same document that you're about to see here because at the time we actually either e-mail or print or fax the actual vendor copy out, the software stores and archives an image of that document.

26 So no need to go back to paper documents or a filing 27 cabinet. It's all right in front of you. So it's an 28 inhouse, developed, full-content management system.

1	So in the bottom left-hand corner, I can also see
2	every other transaction associated with this purchase
3	order all the way back to when the initial individual who
4	might have initiated the purchase request actually maybe
5	even attached a quote from the vendor.
6	So the purchase order, the e-quote, the packing
7	slip, the actual invoice that came from the vendor, it's
8	all retrievable in one place. I don't have to go in and
9	out of filing cabinets or go to get a manila file folder
10	and search through it for the vendor. It's all straight
11	in front of me.
12	And this works the the same way no matter where
13	you happen to be, whether it's an employee file or
14	whatever else within our software.
15	I'm going to do a quick switch here to another user
16	to kind of show you a day in the life of a department
17	head.
18	So, again, the dashboard will very quickly here be
19	configured around this user Christine, who is logging in.
20	She's the head of my Public Works. So when she logs in,
21	you can see a very similar dashboard.
22	But, again, across the top, it has things such as
23	work orders that might need her attention or any of her
24	employees who needed her attention with expiring
25	certifications or evaluations that are coming due or
26	training that is out there.
27	Again, one thing, as a department head, that might
28	be important to me is actually seeing where does my

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1	overall budget stand. So, again, not being an
2	accountant, I don't have to figure out reports or call
3	the central finance office.
4	The system tells me right out of the gate, here's
5	how much I budgeted for my overall Public Works
6	Department, here's what I've spent, and here's currently
7	what's available.
8	The system also brings down each one of my
9	individual divisions, again, seeing what's been budgeted
10	and spent very easily in front of me. And, again, I can
11	even see actual segment breakdowns.
12	If I do wish to filter this, by the way, if I want
13	to filter this by anything differently, I certainly can,
14	again, just like you saw earlier.
15	And the charts that are out there, if I want to see
16	more of a pie chart than a donut chart or whatever I wish
17	to see, I can do that as well.
18	The software also allows me to very easily get into
19	any of my favorites area. So, again, that same
20	historical information about, like I said, the budget
21	information.
22	And if, again, I wanted to see all of my
23	departments, again, broken out here within Public Works,
24	so I see my divisions all very easily broken out, again,
25	what's been budgeted, what's been spent, and what's
26	available.
27	But if I also wish to see this graphically
28	represented, and so if I want to see my Solid Waste

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1	Division, I want to know what's going on year over year,
2	comparison to the previous year, I certainly can do this.
3	It types up very easily in front of me.
4	I'm also able to see any accounts that are in
5	trouble, so any accounts that are either over or
6	approaching the threshold of using all of their money
7	spent as well as a very easy slider bar across the top.
8	So if I want the system to re-go out there and grab
9	everything that's forty-seven percent (47%) or fifty
10	percent (50%) used or higher, wherever I move this slider
11	bar, the system gets re-coordinated in the software and
12	brings all those accounts that are over that threshold.
13	And, of course, you can drill right into that. If I
14	wanted to see on that account code for my equipment in my
15	Public Work Department, again, what's been budgeted,
16	what's been spent, and what's available as well as on the
17	right-hand side, I see every individual transaction.
18	Where, again, if you wish to just hone in on
19	encumbrances, just by clicking on encumbrances, the
20	right-hand side, just as it explains to me my open POs
21	for that particular department.
22	And, again, going right into a particular purchase
23	order, if I really want to get into the detail, what did
24	I buy, what's the account codes, everything is right in
25	front of me. And, as we saw earlier when we were looking
26	at a vendor file, I can even see the actual purchase
27	order that went out the door.
28	But as a department manager or anybody who's

1	remoting into the application,	I don't have to be an
2	accountant to figure this out.	

Again, the system just automatically surfaces my information about my budgeted department head and lets me just see as much as I wanted to see without having to know account numbers or having to run a specific report.

7 With this as well, I have a couple of other things I 8 just want to kind of point out here. And I'm not going 9 to to show you how to enter transactions. But one of the 10 things that I think is quite -- quite nice to kind of 11 view here is how it's also configureable from the sense 12 of people using the application.

Usability, again, people get inundated with information and -- and data overload on computer entry screens. So, again, I'm just going to come into the requisition. Pretty self-explanatory program here.

This is where employees would enter a purchase request of what do they want to buy. Now, again, I'm not going to enter a brand-new purchase order. But I already have one queued up here.

Two things I like to kind of show off here is when you're in our application, first and foremost, this screen is configurable. So around your finance business rules and purchase procurement rules, you can invoke anything that you wish to on the screen. And I've actually already minimized this. Let me actually open it up to every field.

28

And what I'm getting at with this is if a particular

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1	County wishes to use commodity codes to initiate and have
2	things like needed-by-date, you can see how the screen
3	can change.
4	And in those appropriate fields, there's all
5	functionality inherent to our system. Because, again,
6	all we do is public sector accounting.
7	But any of the actual fields that are not needed for
8	an entity, again, not to make it more confusing for those
9	endusers, you get to tell the system what fields are
10	necessary on entry programs. So this way when I came in
11	as a user, you saw earlier, all those fields are stripped
12	away, and it's very straightforward.
13	I just put in what do I want, quantity, pricing, and
14	account code, and I'm done. And then from there, it
15	actually gets to be moved into an actual workflow system
16	where, again, electronically, this'll be submitted to all
17	the appropriate approvers, depending on on your
18	business rules, on who needs to signoff on it.
19	So I have three approvers, Gene, Diane, and Pete.
20	And they all then are actually queued up because of
21	different reasons.
22	Gene might approve everything within the software;
23	Diane might get pulled in because she's a dollar
24	threshold limit that I've actually exceeded on this
25	transaction; and this user, Peter, because I actually
26	bought an IT piece of equipment. Even though I'm under
27	Public Works, it will get routed to my IT Department.

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28 The last thing to also kind of -- for me to kind of

1	point out here, too, is when you're initiating a
2	brand-new transaction, if nobody's ever used our software
3	in the past, when they come into the requisition, or any
4	program for that matter, we have on the top right-hand
5	sorter side these guided conversations. So it's a
6	scenario base.
7	So, again, if I'm wanting to order supplies of some
8	type, the software physically walks me through everything
9	and every icon I need to choose.
10	Now, it's pretty self-explanatory. If you want to
11	add a new requisition, you click on that. But, as you
12	see here, the guided conversation is taking me through
13	and it tells me I need to enter a description of what I
14	want to buy.
15	So, again, without going through this, every little
16	section here, you're able to specify in how the system
17	steps you through a new transaction that somebody might
18	not be familiar with versus somebody having to read a
19	manual or go out and get trained on the system day in and
20	day out.
21	Workflow actually brings me into a nice little kind
22	of queue here. Certainly, when somebody does look at our
23	workflow, of course, they can stay in the software. So,
24	as you see here, you'll see across my actual dashboard at
25	the top, we have this approvals area. But the most
26	important thing is, is there are individuals who are
27	non-Unis users. They're not in our software day in and
28	day out like a lot of department heads and other

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1 individuals who just don't work in our software.
2 But what they do have with them are the mobile
3 phones. So, again, you do not have to be connected to
4 our application to use it.

5 Those things such as we were just looking at and 6 talking about a second ago, if you have an IOS or you 7 have a -- a Google phone, it doesn't matter. Both of 8 these are side by side to show you that I can see my 9 approvals, notifications, and alerts remotely.

10 So if I'm in meetings and you get bored listening to 11 me right now, you can see what work is piling up back in 12 your office.

And, again, I can go through the approvals. I can see all the individual transactions I have to approve. I can click on those individual transactions. And then, as you see across the top of each one of the phone emulators here, I can approve, reject, or forward any of these transactions on.

That also goes for also utilizing time entry. So if people want to clock in and clock out, again, not having to run back to the office or fill out a paper timesheet, as well as the whole application itself.

23 So everything I've shown you, I do not have to be 24 sitting at a desk at a PC or Mac to use. Again, if I'm 25 in a meeting and there is no PC in there, I can pull up, 26 as you're seeing here, an iPad or a Surface unit and use 27 the full application just like I was sitting at my desk 28 itself.

BALDWIN COUNTY COMMISSION WORK SESSION 05/14/2019 1 The last area I just kind of wanted to kind of move 2 over into -- I'm going to switch back to my other user here -- is one for remote access. 3 4 So in this area that I'm going to quickly go into 5 now, we have what we refer to as our full self-service application. And in the self-service applications, this 6 7 allows your users, your employees to access their own information. 8 9 But probably the most important to that is I can also submit updates and changes through the self-service 10 11 application. And this goes with vendors you're working with or employees. Or if you eventually lead down the 12 13 path of using any of our revenue systems, you can also 14 use our revenue applications. 15 And what that is -- It bumped out. Let me try this one more time. It timed out on me. All right, a big 16 17 timeout. I'll try it one more time. And if it times out on me again, then I'm just going to to move on. There it 18 19 goes. 20 So with these areas, again, I'm not going to go 21 through all of them, but, again, we talked about the 22 vendor side. But you can also -- and, again, this would 23 work from this current County's website. So, again, it's not branded as Tyler with our colors 24 25 and our logos as you're seeing here. But if you have on 26 your website an HR area, of course, your employees can 27 login. 28 And with that employee information, once it's

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1	authenticated them there it goes it brings me into
2	a portal. So I, as an employee at home, can see
3	everything about myself, whether it's my personal
4	information, my accruals that are out there, or down on
5	the left-hand side, you can get into all the plethora of
6	other areas that I can deal with as well as even seeing
7	all of my past paycheck amounts.

8 So if I want know, for instance, what's my 9 year-to-date amount as well as being able to not just see 10 every individual past check, but actually also retrieve 11 actually any of the past check stubs, so, again, that 12 content management system extends to our self-service 13 side as well.

And then there's all the two-way communications of everything. So, again, walking through, if somebody wants to initiate open enrollment in electing their new benefit options, no need for paperwork anymore.

This individual will receive automatic notifications 18 to actually walk through and log into their self-service 19 20 application you're seeing here, the steps through, 21 actually walking through to say what is my health or 22 dental options that I want to elect from, getting them 23 all the costing from all the employee detail information and stepping them through, too, if they're also asking 24 25 for a family plan.

The system will then want to have all their dependent information as well. So, again, reducing all that extra time of manual paperwork having to be keyed

1	into the application.
2	Then the last area is reporting. Reporting, of
3	course, is something that still has to be performed, even
4	though our dashboard allows a lot of information in front
5	of us, so, again, any kind of information that your users
6	are typically dealing with.
7	So if you have somebody in your Accounts Payable
8	office and deals with a lot of accounts payable and
9	purchasing activity, their dashboard, like you're seeing
10	here, will come up with all of that information.
11	So any invoices that are currently overdue, any ones
12	that are pending, any ones that are missing a three-way
13	match, any invoices that are still, of course that are
14	out there waiting to be paid are brought up in front of
15	them. But if they have some that are overdue, they, of
16	course, can click on that and get into the details.
17	So, of course, this is our most important area of
18	getting away from a lot of standard reports, because our
19	dashboards can be configured for that. But, of course,
20	you can also have reports that get populated at anytime,
21	not just internally, but also for external constituents.
22	So you see here if you have a financial summary
23	screen, like I do here, and different department managers
24	or yourself, Commissioners, want to know what's going to
25	with our revenue budget, what's going on with our
26	operating, how much are we spending in our payroll or
27	vendor payment, all of this information is right in front
28	of us.

1	So if I wish to go in to say, okay, I want to take a
2	look a more closer detailed look at my operating
3	budget, the system will go out there. And I've already
4	predisposed mine by either function, category, find, it
5	doesn't matter. You can just specify how you kind of
6	display this.
7	But as you hover over this, it'll show you how much
8	has been budgeted versus how much has been actually spent
9	at this point in time by fund.
10	And then, of course, you can drill into that fund,
11	where it then goes out to all of your various different
12	functions like the Public Safety, Public Works.
13	I apologize. This is actually a city. So, again,
14	they have a police department versus a sheriff. But,
15	again, I can see how much is being spent by individual
16	department, police, fire, jail, and so forth.
17	And not just going this far, but if I go further
18	within police, where am I spending my overall most money?
19	So personal severances, salaries and benefits are
20	probably the two highest here.
21	Then, of course, you can go further into this.
22	Because I might want to know where and who am I actually
23	spending that insurance money the most with, so very
24	easy.
25	And, again, you can change this actual snapshot from
26	being kind of more of a line-bar graph. If you want to
27	see it over time, you certainly can see it over time.
28	You can see how your health insurance is moving year over

year over year. You can certainly bring in your retirement, how does that compare? Or, again, if I want a snapshot, I can do this. 17	toll bridge.
18	It's been in the papers. It's been in the Facebook.

5	The second one is a resolution that was done in
6	2015, by the Commission, with Commissioner Elliott and
7	Commissioner Dorsey and Gruber and Burt.
8	And the third page is a letter that was from
9	Commissioner Elliott supporting an INFRA grant that ALDOT
10	had asked us to support and for the construction of
11	the bridge.
12	The next page is an Eastern Shore MPO resolution
13	supporting the project to be put on the Long-Range
14	Transportation Plan.
15	The next one is another letter from Commissioner
16	Gruber about the INFRA grant and the support of the
17	bridge. And then the the last one is another
18	resolution from the MPO putting this project the
19	Transportation Improvement Program.
20	Nothing in there about any of those resolutions says
21	anything about supporting the toll. The question came
22	up. I told them I would kind of brief y'all on what had
23	been done in the past and find out kind of what where
24	we wanted to go from here.

26	Let me jump in my you know, with both feet with this
27	thing. You know, I we support I think we need to





8th Annual Delta Dash // Saturday, September 28th, 2019

The Young Professionals (YPs) of the North Baldwin Chamber of Commerce would like to move the Annual Delta Dash to Live Oak Landing in Stockton, Alabama. The previous 7 events have been hosted at Matthews Landing (Lower Bryant) and the trails have been located on private property nearby. The Young Professionals of the North Baldwin Chamber work in support of the mission of the chamber, specifically focusing on education and workforce development efforts. The YPs have successfully raised over \$144,000 that has been put back into the North Baldwin Community through the Chamber of Commerce, Scholarships and other educational endeavors in the North Baldwin community. 

WHEREAS, associatively, on I-10 at the City of Mobile, the Wallace Tunnel is continuously 'bottlenecked' with even the normal flow of traffic which remains a disservice to our residents, to those who visit South Alabama and to citizens throughout the United States; and

WHEREAS, as Baldwin County's and Mobile County's economic base continues to prosper benefiting regional economic development and providing much needed revenue to the State of Alabama, so to shall the traffic on I-10 increase; and

WHEREAS, further, as the Alabama State Docks continue to develop in size so will the volume of commercial traffic affecting I-10; and

WHEREAS, further, as traffic congestion becomes even more intense during a hurricane or other severe weather event, the 'bottleneck' on I-10 and at the Wallace Tunnel impedes the efficient and orderly evacuation of Baldwin County and Mobile County as well as the entire Southeast United States serviced by I-10 from Florida to Texas; and


