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NORTH BALDWIN CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

MR. RON CINK: First up is North Baldwin Chamber of Commerce. Ms. Ashley.

MS. ASHLEY JONES DAVIS: I was going to defer to South Baldwin first.

FINANCE CHAIRMAN BILLIE JO UNDERWOOD: It's up to you, if you would like to wait.

MS. ASHLEY JONES DAVIS: So now I'm really nervous. She's got her entire staff here -- well, half of them.

And I actually had thought about a lot of what you guys wanted to hear about. And this is the first time we're having to present to the Commission, which is totally fine. And I'm not going to take a lot of time.

Most of the Commissioners know -- most of the Commissioners -- you guys know what Chambers do in Baldwin County. I know that a lot of the Eastern Shore were here yesterday.

And I could stand here and go through everything we've done the last year and everything we're currently doing. We sent that to you guys in our annual report. And I don't want to bore you guys with it.

But I did -- There were a few things in the report. I just wanted to point out that we do -- and I know -- I can't speak for the other Chambers, but all five Chambers in the county work in the

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same capacity that we do; and that's for our businesses and for our communities.
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We asked for an increase in our appropriation because we need to grow our programs. I mean, it -- it really is as easy as that.

We do what we do with a staff of two and a two hundred thousand dollar (\$200,000) a year budget. And everything that comes in goes right back into our programs. It is invested back into the North Baldwin community.

We serve one municipality. Seventy-five percent (75%) of the area we serve is outside of the city limits of Bay Minette in the communities. We have four schools that are outside of the city limits of Bay Minette that we work with and we serve.

And we work in areas from economic development, tourism, workforce development, education, community development, and business development.

And so it's a large agenda for a small staff and a small volunteer force.

We have a staff and volunteers who are willing to put in sweat equity into the program that we do. Financially, we -- we need more, just like every other organization that's probably come and talked to you.

The five thousand dollar (\$5,000) request was simply to dedicate a thousand dollars (\$1,000) to

each of our primary focus areas from the county so that our county would become a vested partner.

On our -- We have a program called the North Baldwin Advantage Program. We have members who invest over and beyond.

And the County's investment, along with your in-kind services that you guys have helped us with, with the Christmas stuff and Delta Dash, it would -- it would make the County one of our top investors in that program.

We'd love to have you guys onboard. I'm really here to answer any questions about the programs that we do.

Throughout the past year, and really the past seven years, our Chamber has grown and evolved.

And our programs are strong. We have a vested membership. We have a vested community. They believe in what we do.

And I can't say that it was that way when I came onboard in 2012. We've worked really hard to grow and evolve. And we want to continue to grow and evolve.

As far as spending on our end goes, our average -- when you average out our membership and what they pay in dues, it's about two hundred and five dollars (\$205) per member. We turn that into seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750) per member into our program.

So we're leveraging the dollars we get to deliver the best product that we can for all communities. We just need more assets and resources to grow.

We have a great relationship with the South Baldwin Chamber, Central Baldwin, Coastal, and Eastern Shore. This last year, for the first time in over a decade, all five of us came together and introduced one legislative agenda.

We were truly one voice for the business community and Baldwin County, and we continue to be. All five Chambers get along. A lot of our programs overlap. All of us are generous with our resources and helping each other.

And I'm just going to be very frank and say that I feel like the Baldwin County Commission should be investing into the Chambers who are on the ground working every day to build a stronger economy through the business community, to build stronger communities, to do the work that needs to be done to ensure the success of the future.

I will leave it at that, unless you guys have any questions. I did print -- Most of you know we re-branded to our Discover North Baldwin. It's our tourism brand for the area.

We were lucky enough -- We do not receive lodging tax to promote tourism, so we rely on grants from other agencies to help us support our

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    efforts.

But we've got to be smart. And we've got to be diligent every day to try to improve the workforce, not just the quantity of the workforce, but the quality as well.

And I think this program does just that by helping to take our children, our -- our students -- There are thirty-five thousand (35,000) high school -- or excuse me -- school students in school today in Baldwin County, at least.

And to be able to help them find their career path is very, very important. Right now I don't think that is -- that has been done up until this point. And helping students find their passion and find direction is what we aim to do.

And then engaging others who are not in the workforce that could be, whether it be our veterans, our disabled, or just people who, for whatever reason, have not been able to locate a job, we want to help them do that.

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And I think some of the programs we have take

We have a representative over here, Mike Dryden. 16 That was imperative for us to put together that 17 college foundation, to make sure that this program 18 was sustainable, and we could achieve all of our --19 our objectives. 20 If you could move on to the next one. 21 quick, before I let Ed go through some of the 22 23 successful programs that have been developed over the last two years, I just wanted to spend a -- a 24 25 brief moment on our accountability, how we report out to our investors, how we let them know about 26

those successes in these programs that are in place

27

28

for them.

The first way we do that is with a quarterly newsletter. That comes out, believe it or not, quarterly. And these are some of the top stories, some of the -- the biggest wins that Gateway has had, and also some of the things moving forward that they -- they can expect.

We include a brief overview of our financials in the fourth quarter newsletter so they get a -- kind of an overshot of how the money flowed.

The other way that we communicate with them is through one-on-one meetings with them. Most of the time, it's with more of the Gateway team.

But that's where we sit down. And it's targeted to what they would be interested in, to what's focused on -- on their business.

We share an Evergreen List or, as I call it, the stuff-we-done-did list. And this is everything that the Gateway team has done, every meeting that we take, every program that we've worked on. We keep track of that, and we share that with our investors, full -- full transparency.

We also share a more detailed financial update, if that's something that -- that intrigues them. And then we have a little bit of a discovery phase where we're figuring out what are the programs that we can plug in for that specific business. What's -- what's keeping them up at night.

And then, also, we're always looking for future

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investment and researching how we can increase resources with this.
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So with that -- I know I went through really fast -- I want to let Mr. Ed Bushaw share some of those wonderful accomplishments we've had.

MR. ED BUSHAW: Good morning. Next slide, please. If you could, I think we've got some fly-ins here. So next. All right.

So, very quickly, we wanted to highlight some of the areas that -- that we've been working in.

And I think it's important for everyone in this room to know that we have a staff of two and a half.

And basically we learned very quickly that we have to work with our State agency partners, South Alabama Workforce Development, AIDT. We work with Lee Lawson and his group quite a bit.

And some of the things that, as Travis mentioned, when we sit with businesses and we do assessments with them, a lot of times we find that supervisory development is an area that they -- they definitely need help with.

The Alabama Technology Network is part of the junior college system. They do things like LEAN. They do innovation engineering. They do first-time supervisor.

So they've been able to work with us on a lot of different programming and also some innovation

1 engineering projects. Next, please. So what we were able to do this 2 last year, along with a group in Montgomery, is for 3 the first time in our area, bring their leadership 4 skills program to our -- our businesses. 5 This leadership program is a nationally 6 recognized program that basically has three levels. 7 I believe, Travis, that we're almost through the 8 third level with --9 MR. TRAVIS VALENTINE: Correct. 10 11 MR. ED BUSHAW: -- with this group. And then we're going to -- to move that into the next. 12 13 We've had that program offered to municipalities, to businesses. And it's been very, very effective. 14 Next, please. So at a meeting this afternoon, 15 as a matter of fact, with SWAPT. I'm sorry, y'all. 16 There's a lot of acronyms in our world. I know 17 there is yours as well. 18 COMMISSIONER JAMES E. (JEB) BALL: Uh-huh. 19 (Indicates affirmatively.) 20 MR. ED BUSHAW: South Alabama -- Southwest 21 Alabama Partnership in Training. There are 22 23 opportunities for our businesses. And I'll tell you something specific about a 24 25 business in your area that we're working with here in -- in Baldwin County North. And that's a 26 company called Plasmine. They're up here in the 27

woods in Bay Minette. They make glue products out

28

of pine resin.

We met with them. We talked with them about an apprenticeship model that we're putting in place with them. And, as a matter of fact, we're also doing a lot of succession planning with them to help them with their -- their pay rates and things like that.

And, at the same time, we're able to put programs that the State offers in front of them. A lot of people don't realize that there is an on-the-job training, fifty percent (50%) match for all the time that somebody is in an apprenticeship.

So some of their people are going to be in a four-year long apprenticeship. And they'll get a fifty percent (50%) return back from the Federal Government back on their -- on their investment.

Next, please. So we also offer a customer service course. This has been something that we've offered to over three hundred and fifty (350) folks, mostly in the South Baldwin area.

We've had teachers in the class. We've had some administrations from cities. We've also had a number of -- of business folks that we put through that.

You all know how important customer service is to keep us competitive with the folks across in Destin. And we -- we have to be on our -- our best foot with our tourists whenever possible.

Next, please. So I wanted to -- to give you an idea of exactly how, as Travis was mentioning, when we sit down with a business, exactly what that business engagement profile would look like.

And this is something that we did with Wolf Bay Lodge. Wolf Bay has three restaurants. There's one in Florida on Perdido Key and then two in Baldwin County.

What we did is we sit down and we do an assessment with every business, just like we did with Plasmine. And what we did is we established a need that they had three restaurants and never had a director of operations.

Wolf Bay Lodge has been in existence for a very, very long time. And it was always run as a family op. And -- and basically what they needed -- Because they're going to expand maybe to four restaurants now -- is a director of operations.

So what we were able to do is write that job description for her. We were able to conduct interviews and put a person on the ground so that she could actually build her businesses.

The other thing that we found out right away is, is that she wanted to move to an apprenticeship model in her business. And what she needed was help with job profiles and building job descriptions so that now, even if a person comes in

as a server, they can move their way up through a career path in restaurant management. And at the end of it all, they get a credential from the Department of Labor as a journeyman apprentice.

Next, please. So you can click through to the next two, if you would. I just wanted to give you an idea -- One more, please. I wanted to give you an idea of the breadth of the program.

We are in a hospitality and tourism area. And that's a major focus. And it has to be, because that's where the workforce demands are the largest. But, obviously, we have a lot of businesses that we're serving.

I wanted to show you how this business engagement model works in a couple of different ways, working with Vulcan in an apprenticeship model to -- to help them to find press mechanics and machine operations and make sure that their training matches the Department of Labor so that they can have credentialing.

In our hospitality next week, for the first time in the State of Alabama, we'll have five lodging apprentices in businesses. They have eleven hotels in the region.

And then Warner Farms was a very interesting project that we're right in the middle of right now, working with Alabama Technology Network on some new processes for them and some innovation

engineering projects and LEAN through Alabama Technology Network.

So every time we sit with these businesses, we don't just bring what -- what we can bring to the table for our resources -- from our resources, we also can take advantage of the State on what they offer.

Next, please. So we can skip past this. Right here is fine. One of the things that had never been done -- And so Gateway grabbed ahold of this -- was a wage and benefit survey for the hospitality and tourism industry.

It was very, very important for a number of projects that we were doing. We're trying to build career pathing in South Baldwin County for people interested in vacation rental, lodging, restaurants.

But we didn't have any data that we could put in front of teachers or that we could put in front of -- put in front of students.

I was surprised. I've been in this market since 1994. I was very surprised to see these wages are about twenty percent (20%) higher than I thought they'd come out.

And, as you can see, there's some pretty good career pathing here for kids. And when you know that fifty percent (50%) of your kids in Baldwin County are not going to a four-year degree, and we

want to keep the majority of them here, those other fifty percent (50%) here working in our community, these types of careers that hold great promise for them.

So next, please. Next. All right. So a couple of y'all were there at -- when we did our -- our youth apprenticeship signing day. So I'm going to go through this very quickly.

But one of the things that we found out right away is, in -- in thinking through the process when you're trying to decide who's going to be in our workforce, you've got to go to the low-hanging fruit. And, to us, that was the kids that were already in school.

So what we did is we put together a -- a committee of a number of businesses. If you'd go to the next bullet, please.

We put together a youth apprenticeship sponsor committee. And very, very quickly, we had eighteen businesses at the table trying to figure out how this youth apprenticeship program would work.

It's very, very important for y'all to know that everything that we do is driven by business. We don't dream these things up. We sit with businesses. We talk to them about how best to put these programs forward.

So what we did is -- along with them, is determine that they could do a one thousand (1,000)

hour paid apprenticeship for the youth in our county in their businesses.

From that, once that was determined, we visited all six county high schools, and to basically show them career paths.

And if you'd go to the next, please. We hosted our inaugural signing day. So we brought a hundred and seventy-six (176) kids to the lodge, kids that were interested in hospitality and tourism. And on that day, we signed ninety-four (94) of them into jobs. Our goal was ten (10). So we were very, very happy about that.

And I'll tell you, our -- our employers are ecstatic at the fact that we've got business and education aligned, and we're able to be the conduit for that to be able to bring them to the table.

So this year we're going to move this forward to the virtual schools, to the -- to the home school associations, and the private schools.

We didn't touch them at all. You all know there's a lot of those. There's a lot of kids in -- in private schools in Baldwin County.

Next, please. So those are just some pictures. This will show you what was going on. These are the hundred and seventy-six 176) kids.

We had it set up as a signing day, like you would if you were an athlete. And they -- they loved that idea. So they had hats, and they had

T-shirts. And -- and it was a lot of fun.

What we hope to do this year is just blow the seams out of that room and -- and have three hundred (300) kids there. I -- I think we can -- we can do that.

You'll see along the sides here all the businesses that were represented at the table. We have a lot more that want to be involved now that the word is out about it.

Next, please. Real quickly, I -- I mentioned a few times in my presentation about apprenticeships. What we were able to do at the Chamber is to become a sponsor with the Department of Labor.

So we actually handle all of the paperwork within our office for a registered apprenticeship. That can be everything from a machine operator -- We saw in the other bison herder. There was an accordion maker. I mean, anything you can imagine, there's an apprenticeship for it.

We're working with a State Farm office on setting up apprenticeships within their operation. What that does is it allows a business to have a system whereby succession planning makes sense. How do I get from this position upward?

And this is the tax benefit that was just passed in the legislation this year. Each of these businesses for each EIN, for each individual business, they can have ten (10) apprentices. And

And I did for a minute, then I realized how special it was. I say that to say my livelihood comes from tourism. My -- SH Enterprises is Meyer Vacation Rentals, Century 21, Meyers Services in Foley.

And I live in Orange Beach. And that whole region is so near and dear to me. I want to spend the rest of my life here, retire here, and die here.

So as I -- I moved back from college and I got involved in the community in both of these chambers. It was really frustrating for me as a volunteer. And I know it's got to be for you guys as well. I felt pulled. I wanted to give of my time and give to my community, but I also had to work.

And so going to do diplomat programs and support one organization and turning around and doing the other was really frustrating.

And as I grew within the business -- And -- and I'm president of our organization today -- that frustration grew when I started getting requests from so many worthy organizations in the community, 501 nonprofits, and then -- and then our chambers.

So a few years ago, the Coastal Alabama
Business Chamber came up with ACA, which y'all are
aware of. And it had some really great, appealing
programs in it.

And -- and so we came off a lot of money that was substantial for us to commit to that program just to turn around a few years later and have South Baldwin create one that focused on the same really meaningful things for us.

And I was frustrated as a volunteer and someone would could give of my time and then as a businessperson who's expected to take care of people who have expectations of a paycheck and roof over their head and food and careers and have a good business but also financially be able to give back to my community for things that are meaningful, like workforce development, which is our number one issue, personally.

So when Gateway came up I was like, honestly, y'all have --

MS. DONNA WATTS: She --

MS. MICHELLE HODGES: -- got to rethink this; right? Like just a few miles down the road, they are working on this. Can we not come together and try to accomplish these things?

Well, fast forward to yesterday. And I will get chill bumps, because I feel like, as someone who loves this community and gets so tired of silos, whether it's Relay for Life silos or Chamber silos, the ability for these teams, these chambers, their staff and their CEO's to come together, recognize regional issues that we can't solve in a

vacuum independent of each other and say we are going to come together.

We're going to communicate. We're going to collaborate. We're -- we're not going to be fearful of each other or stealing ideas or stepping on toes. We're going to make sure we're on the same page. We're going to get our staff on the same page. We're going to join hands and do it together.

And the exec committees of both of these boards approved a Memorandum of Understanding to do just that, a program of work to do just that for the remaining three years of this campaign and the communication strategy.

And yesterday morning, Greg hosted an ACA investors meeting at the Wharf in Orange Beach. And had his fifty-seven (57) or so investors invited to that meeting, had a great turnout of over thirty (30) of those.

And we already have about half of his investors saying, one hundred percent (100%), we're going to take those funds and the remaining part of that initiative and we're going to be the biggest investor that Gateway has. We're going to get to work together to get this done.

So, again, from a volunteer standpoint, giving of my time, as a business person, giving of my finances, I'm really excited about the next three

years.

And I want y'all to know that that collaboration is taking place, and the excitement that we have as this collaboration is taking place. And I hope it alleviates maybe a little bit of concern that you guys have when you're trying to decipher who gets money. Everyone is requesting increases.

And, for me, it is really -- it's just a dream come true. It is. It's just -- it really gives me chill bumps, you know, that we're actually working together.

It seems like such a small thing. But to have such a huge region and investors now agreeing we can all get together, a chamber committee, and talk about what we want to do to.

But to know that the members and those investors are nodding their head up and down, they're going to continue investing in this for the next three years. And the South Baldwin Gateway investor committee meeting to roll this same thing out so that they know what they're doing happens on September 4th.

But that ball is rolling. And, as I said to this team, it feels like what we've done with Gateway set out on a four-way highway to accomplish all the things that Ed talked about.

And with ACA coming onboard, and Greg and

So we are a player. We're a big player. And we've got to be sure that when we ask at every level, Federal, State, and local, that we don't act like we're bashful about what we're doing, because you're doing great things.

And it's about us as a county being a partner in that. And I want us to -- if we could get the value from every fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) that we invest in organizations -- I mean, this is the shinning light of the ultimate result of a fifty -- Fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) is still a lot of money from a --

the match. So that's what I was going on.

And I have the letter, but it's from 1999. And I'll be happy to send y'all all a copy of it.

But in the letter -- And this is what I base this on. The BCC shall fully match all funds appropriated at the State level in this fiscal year and in all succeeding fiscal years for the Baldwin County Library Cooperative. So that's what I was going on. That's why you got this more money request.

But I wanted to tell you a little bit about what we do with the appropriations and what we will do with it if we get the extra money. We're going to buy books.

We ran a report of -- on our collection. And we -- The old -- the latest book in our collection is 2007. And for a library, that's -- that's pretty bad.

And for -- It concerns me, because we are the bookmobile library. So our patrons are the very old and the very young. And I have a horror of an elderly person getting bad information from one of our reference books.

So that's the -- the plan would be that we would -- we would buy new books. We haven't had a book budget in -- in about six years. Just haven't been able to afford one. And -- But we depend on donations from our patrons.

The L&N Depot

June 7, 1976... Little Ol' Bay Minette, a quiet sleepy town nestled in North Baldwin County was transformed by movie magic and forever changed the history of this quaint Alabama town.

In 1904 L & N Railroad constructed a new Depot in Bay Minette called "The Union" because it was built at the juncture of the Ft. Morgan Railroad line with the main railroad line. By 1908 Bay Minette was booming with 1,200 residents and in 1912 The Newport Mining Company located to North Baldwin County greatly boosting the economy. During the early and mid-20th Century, it was from this building that the telegraph office would keep

businesses and residents informed of news and events such as when the county courthouse moved to Bay Minette (that's another story you'll see later).

After having served many years in downtown Bay Minette for passenger rail service and later freight rail service, the Depot was abandoned by the railroad. After the Depot was abandoned and in much need of a face lift, the story goes that the City of Bay Minette was going to tear down

the old Depot, but the citizens would not allow that. You see there were many memories in this old building for many people in the area; the Depot was after all a movie star...

June 7, 1976... Little Ol' Bay Minette, a quiet sleepy town nestled in North Baldwin County was transformed by movie magic and forever changed the history of this quaint Alabama town.

Director Steven Spielberg and his film crew turned our little railroad

depot into the site of a train station located in Gillette, Wyoming for the film 'Close Encounters of the Third Kind.' Rumor has it, he was looking for a train station with gingerbread trim around the building's eaves and our L&N Railroad Station fit the bill.

Most townsfolk called it "organized chaos" those hot summer days but the allure of Hollywood in our small town didn't keep people away. Folks came from far and wide to get a glimpse of Hollywood. At the time it was the first movie ever filmed in South Alabama.

The scene filmed at the depot is known as the "Evacuation" scene from the film and lasted 10 days. Over 2,000 extras, many local's cars and a lot of local cattle were used. The extras, aka townspeople, were required to wear jeans and long sleeves even though it was the heat of the summer. For continuity, the dress code had to reflect seasonal Wyoming weather. One extra noted that the license plates on the cars were made from cardboard to accurately reflect location of the scene as well.

Even though the filming in Bay Minette was brief, if you ask anyone who was here those days, they'll tell you that while extras were financially compensated for their appearances some felt that being on set and becoming a part of the town's history was better than any financial payment.

Nostalgia saved the old L&N Depot. In 1984 a fundraiser began and it took over two

years of community interest and fundraising to complete this project to include contributions from businesses, individuals and even children; Our proud residents saved the iconic building by relocating the structure from the railway track along Railroad Street, and placed it at 301 McMeans Ave (right on Hwy 59) where it still stands today. Since the building was resettled and restored at its new location in 1987, it has served as a home to the North Baldwin Chamber of Commerce, welcoming visitors and businesses for over 30 years.

The "Removal" of the Baldwin County Seat

Bay Minette became the County Seat, but not without creating a legendary tale in Baldwin County...

If you're a Baldwin County Native more than likely you've heard multiple stories about **Bay Minette** "stealing" the courthouse from Daphne, if you're not a native then this is the only story you need to hear - the true story...

Legend has it that the courthouse was "stolen" from Daphne and moved to

Bay Minette in the middle of the night. While the relocation of the County Seat really did happen in a very dramatic fashion, none of it happened in the dark, contrary to the mural depicting the events located inside the Bay Minette Post Office.

In early 1901, leaders in Bay Minette circulated a petition requesting that the legislature move the Baldwin County Seat to Bay Minette from Daphne. Although a counter-petition circulated in Daphne, the Alabama legislature named Bay Minette the County's new center of government in February 1901.

Despite stout opposition from Daphne, construction began on Bay Minette's new courthouse on July 4, 1901, and the building was nearly completed by early October new county seat could not operate until the necessary fixtures of county government were moved from Daphne to Bay Minette, and the city fathers in Daphne refused to turn over these items. A **Bay Minette** based board of "courthouse commissioners" was charged with the task of

of that year.

acquiring these necessities and provisioning the new courthouse.

To that end, on October 10, 1901 a group of men departed Irwin's Livery Stable in Bay Minette in horse drawn wagons, bound for the outskirts of Daphne. Once there, they broke into two "companies" (Companies "C" and "D") and camped for the night. Two of the men, J.D. Hand and Daniel Hall, spent that night with Baldwin Times newspaper publisher Abner Smith, who warned them that Daphne was armed and prepared to defend its claim to the county seat with force.

Pearl Smith, Abner's wife, remembered the events of that night vividly thirty years later when she wrote to a friend in 1930 that Hand had arrived at her home



sometime after nine o'clock that evening. Hand brought with him Representative Daniel D. Hall, one of the men who belonged to the core group who organized the relocation. Pearl recalled that Hand and Hall slept in her home on the night before the removal while four-dozen others camped in the woods several miles east of Daphne. In addition to serving them dinner, Pearl warned the two men that, "The records would never be permitted to leave Daphne, fire arms of various descriptions were being gathered up [by the men of Daphne] for the purpose." Having been forewarned of this, Hand's group had arrived adequately armed for whatever resistance they may have encountered the following morning. Pearl Smith awoke the following morning, October 11, to Hand's request for a small breakfast. As the cook had not yet arrived, Pearl prepared the meal herself. Once they finished eating, Hand and Hall locked themselves in the living room, which had windows facing the courthouse, and stayed there until time came to meet up with the rest of

the group.

At nine a.m. on October 11, Hand and Hall left the Smith house to join up with the larger group, meeting about a mile east of Daphne where they separated into "Company C" under the command of J.D. Hand, and "Company D," which was

probably led by another courthouse commissioner. Their joint task was to descend upon the Baldwin County Jail and Courthouse, which shared the same roof, and remove and load into the wagons every conceivable item that could be of use to the new County seat in Bay Minette. "Company C" was in charge of the jail, while "Company D" was focused on the courthouse.

There was only one remaining obstacle to the removal: Sheriff George Bryant of Daphne. Joe Blackburn was the predetermined spokesman, and he had a plan to deal with Sheriff Bryant. Blackburn cited Act 267 and stated that his group's work was authorized by the Alabama Legislature, but Bryant was resolute in his objection. Knowing that he needed only for the sheriff to open the jailhouse door, Blackburn produced a young prisoner named Frederick Richardson, a man who was wanted for raping and assaulting a woman in Hurricane, Alabama, and told Bryant to lock him up. As soon as Bryant opened the door to the jail, men armed with various tools of destruction ranging from wire cutters to pick axes rushed in through the opening. Allowing themselves to be locked inside, the demolition crew began disassembling the jail from the inside out. Knowing that he was

outnumbered, Sheriff Bryant boarded a ferry to Mobile, many thought, to return with an injunction against the surprise raid.

While "Company C," or the demolition crew, was hard at work on the jail, "Company D" was hard at work on the courthouse proper. The extent to which the removalists "removed" from the courthouse and jail probably became the most well known aspect of the removal episode. According to one man who was at work disassembling the jailhouse, "I looked and saw Company D at the Court House, moving desks, chairs, benches, lamps, carpets, nails, tacks, spittoons, books, papers and everything else." Abner Smith's Baldwin Times painted a picture of complete confiscation. In addition to the removal of the jail cell bars and doors, which would be needed to complete new prison cells in Bay Minette, the removalists took "Every door...and every moveable thing from the judge's desk to the spittoons were removed and carried off in wagons... The steel workers were at work removing the barred windows and the cage in the second story."

Most of the physical removal was completed by the evening of October 11, although a few wagons were sent back as late as the 13th to finish the job. Pearl Smith probably expressed the feelings of many when she wrote that, "The ox carts sure looked funny climbing up and over the hill, and I for one drew a sigh of relief when they were out of sight with the contents of the courthouse and jail moved without bloodshed." It was fortunate too that bloodshed did not result on the evening following the removal.


According to some reports, a group of enraged citizens took a ferry across the Bay to Mobile where they planned to catch a train to Bay Minette and regain the county seat. Had several prominent Mobilians not discouraged, i.e. distracted them that evening (rumor has it that the citizens from Daphne were distracted



by the night life in the city and forgot about their task at hand), the situation may have truly escalated. Rumor had it that the men in Bay Minette were gathered, armed and waiting for just such an occasion... that never came.

Subsequent rulings of the Alabama Supreme Court confirmed

the propriety of the removal. October 11, 2016 will mark the 115th anniversary of "removal day" in Baldwin County, and the names of the courthouse commissioners who brought home the county seat are still visible in the southeast wall of the courthouse vestibule in Bay Minette.



"It's not like the Delta is Yosemite" he said to me somewhere in Northern Alabama, with the air of one who understood. The group I was with looked on in amusement.


"No you're right," I flipped back, "it's better."

A bold statement in any book. But not to someone from North Baldwin County - that wily, charismatic, well traveled, secretly well heeled, group of adventure loving, eco warriors, hunters and fisherman, who ooze southern charm and hold close to their hearts possibly some of the most diverse wilderness in North America. I wasn't about to regale my new found friend with the facts of the place,

we've all read the list: bio diverse, historical, cultural, and it goes on. Instead I felt we needed to look deeper.

"Good shoes get sold, great shoes get worn, it's all a marketing issue" I explained. To be honest, the reality is, this pair of shoes is being really well worn. A long, long time ago, in a land far, far away, north of the famous beaches of Alabama, south of the black brick road of interstate 65, but well within reach for a quick lunch date or an overnight getaway, lies a secret garden of historical, cultural and natural significance so dense, that every day spent there could fill a chapter of a book.

First identified and poetically praised for its beauty, botany and enormous trees, by famed naturalist William Bartram, who spent considerable time in what is now Stockton, Alabama. Bartram's book Travels would be read by John Muir nearly 100 years later, when his own famous connections lifted Yosemite to its national and international stardom. Further marketing of the area as a destination after Bartram's initial insights, quickly got lost in Native American battles, disease, failed towns, civil war and corporate greed. Usurped by their larger cousin to the South and East (Mobile), the inhabitants of the cities of Bay



Minette and the now lost city of Blakely, which has long since been swallowed up by the delta, have until recently been happy to keep the beauty of the area their own little secret.

As a destination of cultural and historical significance though, a little digging will take you down a mesmerizing journey. Let's start in 1800 B.C. when the first signs of human settlement in the area really start to take place. It was here that an integral trade route for many cultures would be first established, one that by 1200 A.D. the Mississippian tribes of today's Bottle Creek Mound Site, had expanded into an influence that

controlled as far West as New Orleans and East to Pensacola, with subjects thought to be in the thousands in the delta alone. Artifacts found in the delta suggest trade routes reaching north to Michigan and as far south as today's Mexico. A mound building culture, the Mississippian Bottle Creek site still has 18 mounds that can be found buried deep in the delta, upon which the tribe lived, playing sports, carrying out religious rituals and gambling. The mounds were built by hand, with mud and oyster shells, much like many of the oyster middens spread throughout the delta, however the tribes also made pottery, jewelry, farmed, hunted and fished.

Like all good locals, there is some speculation that they would summer at the beach, and winter in the Delta.

Moving forward, disease brought by Spanish Explorers cleared out many of the native tribes by the 1600 and 1700's, shortly before William Bartram started his journeys. At which point, for the first time in nearly 3000 years, North Baldwin was mostly uninhabited. The history comes quick and fast after this, with French traders moving into the area reestablishing trading routes, followed in the 1800's by the British, and then Americans. An attack on the Creek Indians by militia in the early 1800's created the revenge inspired







Massacre at Fort Mims - the largest massacre in the 19th Century by Native Americans.

The American Civil War soon engulfed our region, the famous Battle of Mobile Bay ending in North Baldwin's own Tensaw and Apalachee rivers, after the fall of Forts Huger and Tracy at the mouth of the Appalachee allowed the USS Glasgow to pass through the channel to Mobile. This led to the Battle of Blakely, fortifications from which can still be seen today. This battle fatefully occurred after Robert E. Lee had already surrendered the Confederate Forces and was effectively the last combined-force battle of the Civil War.

Logging and shipbuilding in the area became a huge draw, helping to improve trade and grow the region. The Champion Cypress, Alabama's largest, stands today as a lone remnant of the long lost giant forests of Coastal Alabama that Bartram had described in his essays.

By the 20th Century, North Baldwin would again feature in military circles, with the creation of a mothballed naval fleet by President Franklin Delano Roosevelt. This armada, to be hidden in plain view amongst the cypress swamps, would at one time number 347 ships, getting retrofitted on the banks of the Tensaw River. Perhaps fittingly called the Ghost Fleet by locals, the fleet would stay in the area until the mid 1970's providing much fodder for stories and assumptions.

Today in North Baldwin, our features extend far beyond the historical. Focusing more on the serenity and a growing outdoor adventure tourism trend, often reminding visitors of other places in a uniquely North Baldwin way. The Mobile-Tensaw Delta, mostly protected by the Forever Wild Land Trust and named a National Natural Landmark, is obviously a big part of who and what North Baldwin is. But this doesn't detract from the fertile soils that still support much of the

community.

We have the Champion Cypress, our version of a big city Skyscraper, and floating camping platforms on the Bartram Canoe Trail that may be a rustic reminder of Venice, complete with a chorus of opera provided by the delta at night. We have a little bit of Paris in our burgeoning Artist community in and around Bay Minette, and miles of hiking, biking and paddling trails.

The beauty of many of the world's famous public gardens may be found in our endless fields of wildflowers that blossom throughout the delta, many of which are found in shallow bays and bayous that may only be accessed by canoe or kayak, keeping them protected from the world. Live Oaks dot our landscape, like monuments to another time, Spanish Moss slowly fluttering in the wind. Normally found near access points to our endless water highways, with on ramps available at private and public launch points and county parks that invite you to simply sit a while.

For the more adventurous, a visit to Bottle Creek continues to serve as reminder of the great developers who once controlled the area. At last count, there are 22 styles of fishing regularly used by locals and the hunting is phenomenal, with multiple opportunities to hunt and fish a variety of species all possible in a single weekend. Stockton Heritage Museum – A walk through time...

The Stockton Heritage Museum is located in the earliest remaining mercantile stores in Stockton and North Baldwin County and was built in 1894 by Fredrick S. Bryars. It also served as the Stockton post office from 1894 until late in 1918 with three different post-masters: Fred Bryars; his wife, Lucy (McMillan) Bryars; and their nephew, Dugald Crosby, Sr., who purchased the business in 1912; and served as postmaster from 1913 to 1918. Crosby changed the name of the store from "The Fred Bryars Place", to the name of "D. Crosby Mercantile Co."

In 1918, Y. A. Cox, Sr. and P. A. Bryant assumed operation of the business with Dugald Crosby, Sr. retaining ownership of the building and the property. Another new sign went up on the store front, "Bryant and Cox Mercantile", and a new post office building was built across the road from the store. Bryant later left the business. Y. A. "Joby" Cox operated the store for 52 years, closing its doors in 1971.

The building remained vacant



until 1975 when the Stockton Five Arts Club obtained permission from the Crosby family to refurbish the old structure. It then assumed the name of the "Stockton Town Hall." It was used by the Stockton Double H. Club for several years, and later by the Stockton Civic Club until they built a new civic building in 2009.

In October 2011, the family of John Dugald Crosby graciously deeded ownership of the building and the land to the Stockton Heritage Association, Inc. for use as the Stockton Heritage Museum.

The association started "Stockton Sawmill Days" in 2013 to raise funds to restore the building for a museum. Today the Museum showcases the history of the community, from timber and logging to first settlers to the story of Fort Mims.

The Stockton Heritage Museum exists to showcase the relationship of the people, past, present, and future, to the land and events that shaped the course of Stockton's unique history, heritage, and culture. The Stockton Heritage Museum's mission is to collect, preserve, interpret and promote the historical and cultural artifacts from this North Baldwin community. They are committed to exhibitions and programs that will strengthen our community, honor the generations of the past, and connect present and future generations to their heritage.

The Stockton Heritage Museum is open by appointment and each Wednesday (11:00-2:00) and Sunday (12:30-2:00). For more information call 251-937-4633.


Aside from the enticing food,



NBI has expanded from its origins as a 12-bed medical center to a 70-bed medical center with modern facilities and cutting-edge equipment. NBI employs a team of healthcare professionals dedicated to delivering exceptional care.

The employee dedication does not end with patient care, but overflows into the community that NBI serves. Every year on the Saturday before Father's Day, Infirmary Health hosts RIDEYELLOW, the largest charity bike ride in the state, right here in Bay Minette, Alabama.

Since its inception, RIDEYELLOW has donated more than \$500,000 to various cancer charities. In 2014, RIDEYELLOW teamed up with Infirmary Health to host the 8th Annual RIDEYELLOW event and turn the reins over as the event had grown by leaps and bounds, and

Infirmary Health's partnership turned management of the event was a blessing, guaranteeing that hope will indeed ride on. In 2019, RIDEYELLOW will celebrate 12 years.

RIDEYELLOW supports Infirmary Health's goal of increasing health and wellness initiatives across the region. "We are proud to be a part of such a dynamic event and to have it held in the Bay Minette community," said Ben Hansert, North Baldwin Infirmary President.

While giving back to the community they serve through RIDEYELLOW and various other events in our region, the teams at NBI continue to consistently provide top notch medical care.

William Bose, M.D., Advanced Orthopaedics, now preforms orthopaedic surgeries at NBI. Dr. Bose specializes in knee, shoulder and hip surgery. He performs both arthroscopies and replacements of the shoulder, hip and knee.





In 2017, cardiologist, Megan T. Courtney, M.D., Diagnostic and Medical Clinic, began seeing patients requiring cardiology services on a full-time basis at NBI. Plans are underway now to implement full cardiac rehabilitation services at the North Baldwin Fitness Center, allowing local patients to rehab here in their community.

The state-of-the-art diagnostic and imaging center provides high-quality imaging services. Patients at NBI benefit from revolutionary open MRI, digital mammography and a state-of-the-art 64-slice CT system that can capture coronary complications with higher accuracy and in a less invasive manner. With the picture archiving and communication system, a patient's diagnostic images are immediately available for viewing by their physician.

In the 13-bed emergency department, a team of highly trained physicians and nurses are available 24-hours-a-day to respond and treat emergencies ranging from minor injuries and illnesses to cardiac events. Three cardiac exam rooms are set up to monitor potential heart attack patients and ensure prompt intervention.

The advanced surgical department includes preoperative and postoperative care areas and two gastroenterology rooms for endoscopies and colonoscopies. In some cases, patients are able to experience the convenience of an outpatient surgery.

The state-of-the-art birth center takes new mothers from prenatal to post-birth. Childbirth classes provide information about pregnancy, labor, newborn care, CPR and safety. A technically advanced infant security system is also in place. The fullservice labor, delivery, recovery and postpartum (LDRP) suites - among the largest in the region - allow mother and baby to remain in the same room throughout their stay. NBI offers a full-time lactation specialist that offers a variety of breastfeeding tips, classes and supplies.

NBI is a designated BABY-FRIENDLY facility. That means that NBI meets the highest standards for maternity care and infant feeding offering skin to skin contact, breastfeeding support and keeping mom and baby in a room together from start to end of stay. Currently there are 454 active Baby-Friendly hospitals and birth centers in the United States. North Baldwin Infirmary is one of only six hospitals in the state of Alabama that have been given this distinction and the only hospital in both Mobile and Baldwin counties with this distinction. The "Baby-Friendly" designation is given after a rigorous on-site survey is completed. The award is maintained by continuing to practice the Ten Steps as demonstrated by quality processes.

The Senior Behavioral Health program provides patients with complete access to a full-range of hospital services and psychiatric care.



Individualized care for seniors is offered and, upon admission, a thorough evaluation is conducted to help determine the cause of behavioral and mental changes and a course of treatment plan is developed. Treatment includes individual meetings with our psychiatrist and group therapy with other seniors with similar healthcare needs. Skilled nurses, psychiatrists, trained counselors and social workers help with all aspects of a person's life.

Also, unique to the hospital is a skilled nursing facility, Oakwood—North Baldwin's Center for Living. Oakwood is a 75-bed licensed skilled nursing facility located on the campus of North Baldwin Infirmary. The staff provides round-the-clock care in a comfortable and home-like environment. Established in 1991, the facility includes both private and semi-private accommodations for both long and short-term care.

Discover North Baldwin: Baldwin County Public Schools


Baldwin County is the location of the first public school in Alabama, built in 1799 by the community of Tensaw right here in North Baldwin. Now the Baldwin County Public School System is home to 45 school campuses, a virtual school and educates more than 32,000 students (and growing) each year.

The mission of the Baldwin County Public School is to prepare ALL students to graduate College and Career Ready through a culture of equality and opportunity. Led by Superintendent Eddie Tyler, school leaders work hard to ensure students are college or work-force ready, through working towards the vision to foster a nurturing environment with high expectations for students to achieve their potential and graduate with countless opportunities.

That effort has paid off with the class of 2018 earning more than \$85 million in scholarships.

With approximately 3,800 employees, the Baldwin County School System is the largest employer in the county. Classroom teachers routinely win national teaching honors for their progressive, 21st Century classroom instruction that puts the student in the center of the learning experience.

The 45 campuses in the county are located in seven areas identified as "feeder patterns" -- the educational path a student takes from kindergarten through 12th grade. The North Baldwin Feeder Pattern has more than 4,200 students on eight school campuses including Baldwin County High

School, Bay Minette Middle, Bay Minette Elementary, Perdido School, Pine Grove, Stapleton, and Delta elementary schools. The North Baldwin Center for Technology, located in Bay Minette, serves students from BCHS as well as Daphne and Spanish Fort high Schools.

In 2018, Scholastic Reading awarded the Baldwin County School System its national Lighthouse District award recognizing the school system's guided reading initiatives. Baldwin County Public Schools is one of three districts in the county to receive the award.

The North Baldwin Coalition for Excellence in Education foundation works with all eight schools to provide additional resources and enrichment opportunities for students and faculty, as well as annual Teacher Grant allotments. In addition, the education foundation sponsors more than a dozen summer camps for children ranging from conservation and engineering to sewing and cooking.
